

Eleanor Smith, Concrete Change, Decatur, GA

Eleanor Smith is the founder and central organizer of Concrete Change, a national group working for basic disability access to become a standard practice of new home construction. Since founding Concrete Change in 1986, Smith has helped popularize the practicality of and need for this change, for which she later adopted the term “Visitability.” During two decades of this work, she has gained practical information about accessible architecture and has produced several educational media on VISIBLE construction. In 1999, Smith, who has used a wheelchair since having polio at age three, received a Best Practices award from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development and in 2004 the Housing Champion award from the Georgia Department of Community Affairs.

Danise Levine, IDEA Center, Buffalo, NY

Danise Levine is the assistant director at the IDEA Center. She is also the project director for the Model Homes Project and Technical Assistance program for the RERC on Universal Design. She holds a Master’s degree in Architecture from the State University of New York in Buffalo and a Bachelor’s degree in Fine Arts from the University at Albany, State University of New York. With more than 14 years of architectural practice experience, Levine is an expert in the areas of ADA compliance, universal design and accessible design. She recently completed designs for six newly constructed, universally designed homes, including two model homes, which have been exhibited in the 2003 and 2005 Horizon Parade of Homes.
