HUD's Office of Healthy Homes and Lead Hazard Control

- ▶ Enforces HUD's lead based paint regulations
- ▶ Provides grants to local and state governments and Native American Tribes to make housing lead safe
- ▶ Provides healthy homes demonstration grants
- ▶ Fund technical studies related to lead based paint and other environmental health hazards related to housing
- ▶ Public Education
- ▶ Development of policy and implementation of federal initiatives through participation with other federal agencies (principally CDC, EPA & USDA Extension)



HUD Lead Based Paint Regulations Apply to Housing Built Prior to 1978

- ▶ Lead Disclosure Rule (24 CFR Part 35 Subpart A)
 - Disclose known reports & location of lead based paint
 - Does not require a lead based paint inspection
 - Penalty of up to \$11,000 per violation
- ▶ Lead Safe Housing Rule (24 CFR Part 35 Subparts B-R)
Established requirements for
 - Inspection of properties, including risk assessments
 - When interim controls or abatement is required & clearance
 - Worker training
 - Safe work practices & prohibited work practices
 - Tenant notification

Lead Based Paint Fair Housing Issues

- ▶ A property owner in leasing rental units may affirmatively market lead free & lead safe units
- ▶ A rental property owner can not
 - Refuse to rent or show families with young children housing units that contain or are presumed to contain lead based paint
 - Require the family to provide information regarding the blood lead level of a child or pregnant woman, or to take a blood lead test, as a condition of considering an application or leasing housing
 - Terminate the lease of a tenant simply because a child is identified with a elevated blood lead level, or lead hazards are identified at the property

Lead Hazard Control Grant Program

- ▶ Eligible applicants –
 - Local governments (city, town, county)
 - State Governments & Tribes with EPA certification authority
- ▶ Funding
 - Up to \$3 million with up to 3 year implementation period
 - Match required – may be
 - Applicant funds including in-kind and CDBG
 - Partner contributions and commitments from property owners
 - Focus on elimination of identified lead hazards to make property lead safe, but not necessarily lead free
 - May use funds to purchase XRF



Lead Hazard Control Grant Program

- ▶ Eligible Housing
 - constructed prior to 1978 with lead paint present
 - Owner occupied –
 - income less than 80% median income
 - 90% of owner units must have a child less than 6 years of age
 - Rental housing –
 - vacant or occupied by tenants with income less than 80% median income, including units receiving tenant based rent assistance
 - Owner agrees to make available to low income tenants for not less than 3 years & market to families with children
- ▶ Ineligible Housing – Public Housing & Section 8 project based properties with owners receiving rent payments directly from HUD



Lead Hazard Control Grant Program

- ▶ Required Activities
 - Blood lead testing of children
 - Assuring units are occupied by eligible households
 - Lead paint inspections and lead risk assessments of housing
 - Specification writing & monitoring of contractor work
 - Elimination of all identified lead hazards in housing assisted
 - Training of lead workers and evaluators
 - Public education
- ▶ Ineligible Activities
 - Acquisition of real property, or equipment over \$5,000
 - Provision of medical treatment

- ▶ Goal – Develop, demonstrate and promotes cost-effective, preventive measures to correct multiple residential safety and health hazards that produce serious diseases and injuries in children and other sensitive subgroups such as the elderly, with a particular focus on low income households.
- ▶ Objectives -
 - Carry out inspections and direct remediations in housing focusing on residential safety & health hazards
 - Deliver education and outreach activities
 - Build capacity to assure Healthy Homes projects are sustained and integrating strategies into other programs.
 - Identify cost-benefits of specific effective remediation action



Healthy Homes Demonstration Grants

- ▶ 2008 NOFA
 - Funding provided through cooperative agreements
 - Maximum funding of \$875,000
 - Maximum implementation period of 36 months
 - No Match required
 - 65% of funds to be used on activities related to undertaking direct remediations or delivery of services within the home
 - Lead hazard reduction work for de minimis levels only

HUD Healthy Homes Initiative

- ▶ Mission – “To reduce health & safety hazards in housing in a comprehensive and cost effective manner, with a particular focus on protecting the health of children and other sensitive populations in low income households”

Focus of Healthy Homes Initiative

- ▶ Lead Based Paint Hazards
- ▶ Mold & Moisture
- ▶ Asbestos
- ▶ Allergens related to dust, roaches & vermin
- ▶ Carbon Monoxide
- ▶ Radon gas
- ▶ Indoor & outdoor pesticides
- ▶ Volatile Organic Compounds from cleaning products
- ▶ Second hand smoke
- ▶ Safety within the home



1999 Healthy Homes Preliminary Plan Objectives

- ▶ Identification of homes where interventions would be appropriate
- ▶ Development of appropriately scaled & efficient intervention strategies
- ▶ Select strategies for evaluating intervention effectiveness
- ▶ Development of local capacity to operate sustainable programs to prevent & control toxic mold hazards in residences of low income households
- ▶ Determination of biomarkers to address health threshold levels for exposure to mold

Support Healthy Housing Research

- ▶ Assessment of effectiveness of intervention protocols on health of individuals (e.g., respiratory health, injury prevention)
- ▶ Improve sampling and assessment methods
- ▶ Cost-benefit analyses of Healthy Homes interventions
- ▶ Improved knowledge of residential hazards
- ▶ Health benefits of green construction



Mainstream Healthy Housing Principles

- ▶ Promote development of new and improved and housing maintenance and construction codes, and increased enforcement of existing codes
- ▶ Promote integration of Healthy Homes principles into construction, rehabilitation, weatherization and maintenance methods
- ▶ Create public awareness and adoption of Integrated pest management methods
- ▶ Promote designation of smoke-free multifamily housing
- ▶ Promote inclusion of health outcomes in housing policy and energy efficiency programs.



Support for Healthy Homes Initiatives

- ▶ Develop and support effective training and information exchange for health and housing professionals
- ▶ Identify and facilitate dissemination of best practices
- ▶ Enhance the ability of OHHLHC funded lead hazard control programs to address Healthy Homes issues

Considerations in Planning & Undertaking a Healthy Homes Initiative

- ▶ Identification of key planning participants
- ▶ Develop understanding of healthy homes issues
- ▶ Undertake Community Assessment
 - Age, type, and condition of housing
 - Age of population, potential housing related health issues
 - Knowledge of builders, remodelers, medical providers
- ▶ Evaluate Best Practices in relation to setting
- ▶ Identify needs and prioritize efforts
- ▶ Identify leaders and potential resources
- ▶ Develop a process to evaluate effort
