Homeownership was investigated through attendance of various informational seminars and through contact with PHA's with operating programs. Since the size of the PHA limits such a program's viability, there has been no move to institute such a program. As a more feasible option the PHA is looking to convert some of its existing units to FSS. Should the FSS program be successful, then this could act as a basis for a Voucher Homeownership Program.

Policies concerning Program Mission, Program Size, Quality of Service, Fair Housing, and preferences were endorsed by a large majority of respondents.

We added a question this year regarding additional opinions on the possibility of the Housing Agency converting existing units into Family Self-Sufficiency units. The majority of respondents answered favorably to this although there were some comments as to what the program would entail and if this should be a function of the Housing Agency. The PHA believes this to be a viable option.

Home ownership was endorsed by a majority of the respondents, but not in the overwhelming majority as the other issues. There continued to be comments about the affordability of such an undertaking on the tenant's part. Further, as a small PHA, the potential success of this program is extremely limited.
