REPORT OF ACTIVITIES TOWARDS GOAL DURING FY 2002: The KWAHA acquired Key Plaza, Site A, containing 28 units of elderly housing as phase one of a larger project. Those 28 units have been fully leased up and operate under Home property. The KWAHA acquired property Site B during FY 2001 (May, 2001) with 44 units of multi-family for lease, 28 of which are under Section 8 voucher with the remaining being affordable units.

REPORT OF ACTIVITIES FOR FY 2002: For FY ending 12/31/00, the KWHHA had a PHAS score of 84. PHAS score for FY 2001 not yet available. No demolition of public housing was done in FY 2002 through July 31st.

REPORT OF ACTIVITIES FOR FY 2002: The KWHHA developed and implemented a landlord outreach campaign to voucher landlords. The campaign has proven successful in improving voucher lease up rate to over 78%. The Voucher Homeownership program has been investigated but not implemented. The KWHHA will investigate increasing voucher payment standards.

REPORT OF ACTIVITIES FOR FY 2002: The KWAH developed an Operations Manual for Public Housing which includes a component for Security. The Security Coordinator has begun training additional staff to obtain their security Class II D licenses and began training staff on CPR.

REPORT ON ACTIVITIES FOR FY 2002: The KWAH continued the Campus South Program which provides employment counseling to residents. The Escrow Program was established wherein a portion of an enrolled resident's rent during their enrollment in the program is set aside, and when they graduate, they receive a check to buy a home or obtain other assets to promote their self-sufficiency. Additionally, the KWAH has been working to develop a Neighborhood Network Center to promote resident self-sufficiency through education and job readiness and placement services.

- **Maintain the high annual level of rents collected to rents charged (Goal changed from :Increase rent collection by 2% per year of baseline set on 12/31/99.)**

REPORT ON ACTIVITIES FOR FY 2002: In FY 1999, 99% of rent charged was collected (\$1,674,513 of \$1,685,998 billed). In FY 2000, 99% of rent charged also was collected (\$1,753,4000 of \$1,770,931 charged). In FY 2001, Key West collected \$1,812,365.32, again 99% of rents billed. These statistics indicate that the rent collection process and procedures at the KWHHA are excellent and cannot increase by 2% annually. The goal is reworded to: "Maintain the high annual level of rents collected to rents charged."

- **Maintain vacancy management and occupancy levels at the 99% capacity set at baseline levels in 1999 (Goal reworded in 2001 from original stated goal of "Improve vacancy management and increase occupancy levels by 1% per year of baseline set on 12/31/99.")**

REPORT ON ACTIVITIES FOR FY 2002: During FY 2001, total number of units vacated and turned around for lease was 164, one more than the previous year. The average number of days for the turnaround from vacancy to new occupancy was 27, slightly higher than the previous year total of 23.5 days. The vacancy rate was 4%, so occupancy rate was 96%.

- In FY 1999, the total number of units vacated and turned around for lease was 124.
- In FY 2000, the total number of units vacated and turned around for lease was 163. Although there were 39 more units which became vacant during the FY 2000, in all instances, the average number of days for the turnaround from vacancy to new occupancy was 23.5 days

These statistics clearly indicate that the KWHHA has an active waiting list and does not have a vacancy problem. Occupancy levels are at very high capacity at all times, and no unit is vacant for over 30 days.

- **Develop and implement Public Housing Operations Desk Manual to reflect recently adopted Admissions and Continued Occupancy Policy within one year.**

REPORT ON ACTIVITIES FOR FY 2002: This Manual is nearly completed and will be available by year end 2002.

- **Develop and implement site-based property management performance reports within one year.**

REPORT ON ACTIVITIES FOR FY 2002: The KWHHA has developed and implemented a monthly Housing Management Report system. These reports are distributed to the Board and being consistently implemented.

REPORT ON ACTIVITIES FOR FY 2002: The SEMAP score for FY ending 12/31/2000 is 84. This score is considerably above the 75% score projected earlier in this Planning process. Scores for 2001 are not yet available.

- **Develop and implement Section 8 Operations Desk Manual to reflect newly adopted Administrative Plan within one year.**

REPORT ON ACTIVITY FOR FY 2002: This Manual is under development and is expected to be completed and available by year end 2002.

- **Increase the number of affordable housing units, rental and home ownership, available to very low, low and moderate income families by increasing the affordable housing supply.**

REPORT ON ACTIVITY FOR FY 2002: The KWHHA now manages 144 units of affordable housing at Poincianna for the City (since 2000). Additionally, during FY 2000, 28 units of elderly housing were leased in Key Plaza Site A. During FY 2001, the KWHHA acquired property Site B during FY 2001 (May, 2001) with 44 units of multi-family for lease, 28 of which are under Section 8 voucher with the remaining being affordable units.

- **Acquire and make available funds to serve as a financial "bridge" to assist income eligible public housing residents become homeowners.**

REPORT ON ACTIVITY FOR FY 2002: The KWHHA implemented Escrow Programs at Campus South during FY 2000 & 2001 to assist public housing residents become homeowners. There have been 75 participants in the program since July 1, 2000. 32 have graduated and 31 released from the program (18 involuntarily and 13 voluntarily). There are now 12 in the program.

- **Develop a marketing and outreach plan for potential Section 8 voucher landlords within one year.**

REPORT ON ACTIVITY FOR FY 2002: This program was implemented during FY 2001 and 2002, resulting in a higher percentage of vouchers being used and increasing the lease up rate.

- **Increase Section 8 voucher payment standards within one year.**

REPORT ON ACTIVITY FOR FY 2002: This increase was under review during FY 2001 and 2002 to develop a mechanism to determine how effective an increase will be. The standards are expected to be increased during the coming year.

- **Increase the number of KWHHA public housing residents that are employed fulltime each year.**

REPORT ON ACTIVITY FOR FY 2002: During FY 2001, the number of employed KWHHA public housing residents was 268, of which 215 are employed full time and 53 part time. This figure is almost identical to the prior year (FY 2000) of 271, 217 full time and 54 part time. In the KWHHA, employment has substantially increased (by 100+) over the FY 1999 figure of 166 employed.

ii. Executive Summary of the Annual PHA Plan

(24 CFR Part 903.7 9 (r))

The Key West Housing Authority's priorities for FY 2003 are to continue to provide safe, secure housing to low-income residents and to maintain its high performer status.

Because of the very tight housing market in Key West, the KWHHA has designated the City and its adjacent islands as one census tract. It has implemented a landlord outreach program which has successfully attracted more landlords for the Section 8 low income housing program, thereby increasing the number of affordable rental units available and greatly improving the voucher lease-up rate. Additionally, the Key West Housing Authority increased the number of available low-income units -- both elderly and multi-family. The KWHHA now manages 144 units of affordable housing at Poincianna for the City. Additionally, during FY 2000, 28 units of elderly housing were leased in Key Plaza Site A, and during May, 2001, the KWHHA acquired Site B with 44 units of multi-family for lease, 28 of which are under Section 8 voucher with the remaining being affordable units. Also, the KWHHA applied for and received a designation of elderly occupancy at Senior Citizen Plaza in order to provide housing for a population segment which has few housing alternatives.

The KWHHA will continue during FY 2003 to focus on providing resident services and maintaining its high rated operational and fiscal procedures. Specifically regarding Service Programs, the KWHHA will continue the Campus South Program where to date, 75 enrollees have participated in an Escrow Program in which a portion of the resident's rent during enrollment is set aside, and upon graduation they receive a check to buy a home or obtain other assets to promote their self-

sufficiency. Additionally, the KWAH will continue to respond to HUD's changes which made the Community Service Program for residents a voluntary program.

During the coming FY 2003, the KWAH will continue to streamline its operations, as it has in the past year when it eliminated all site based waiting lists, implemented flat rents, and ensured the rent reasonableness and rent comparisons were updated to reflect current market standards.

Also concerning operations during the upcoming year, the KWAH will work to maintain its excellent record of rent collection at 99% collected. It will also strive to maintain the low vacancy rate of 4% and high occupancy rate of 96% as in FY2001 and 2002. The KWAH will also work to maintain the turnaround rate from vacancy to occupancy as low as it was during FY 2001, when total number of units vacated and turned around for lease was 164, one more than the previous year, and the average number of days for the turnaround from vacancy to new occupancy was 27, slightly higher than the previous year total of 23.5 days. These statistics clearly indicate that the KWAH has an active waiting list and does not have a vacancy problem.

KWHA INCOME DECONCENTRATION ANALYSIS

Explanation

The J Y Porter Place public housing development has adjusted income in the range of 74.69%, which is below 85% of the average adjusted income of all public housing developments in the analysis.

It should be noted that over 50% of occupied J Y Porter Place units are one bedroom units. Applying the Income Adjustment Factor of .85 to this large concentration of one bedroom units drastically lowers the average adjusted income in this development when compared with the total mix of units which contain many 3 and 4 bedroom units in the other developments in the analysis.

No income deconcentration policy will be adopted by KWHA, because the median income of each of the developments lies within the HUD benchmark of 30% of the area's median income. The Median Household Income for Key West (FY 2000) is \$51,200. 30% of that is \$15,360. The median adjusted household income for JY Porter is \$9,836; for Fort Village is \$13,932; for Robert Gabriel is \$15,076; and for George Allen is \$15,288. All these fall below the 30% range.

- **INTERNAL RECORD KEEPING DEVELOPED:** The KWHA maintains its internal record-keeping for community service records for voluntary resident participation.
- **STAFF TRAINING:** The KWHA trained staff at each development to answer questions on the program and program updates and to monitor voluntary resident participation.
- **RESIDENTS NOTIFIED COMMUNITY SERVICE OPTIONAL:** The KWHA notified residents of the new HUD ruling that participation in the Community Service Program is optional. The KWHA will continue to make service programs available and monitor those residents who opt to participate.

The pet owner must submit and enter into a Pet Agreement with the KWHA (i.e., Pet Addendum to the Dwelling Lease).

Registration of Pets

Pets must be registered with the KWHA before they are brought onto the premises. Registration includes certificate signed by a licensed veterinarian or State/local authority that the pet has received all inoculations required by State or local law, and that the pet has no communicable disease(s) and is pest-free.

Dogs and cats must be spayed or neutered.

Execution of a Pet Addendum with the KWHA stating that the tenant acknowledges complete responsibility for the care and cleaning of the pet will be required.

Registration must be renewed and will be coordinated with the annual recertification date.

Approval for the keeping of a pet shall not be extended pending the completion of these requirements.

Current license(s) for the pet in compliance with local ordinances and requirements.

Refusal To Register Pets

The KWHA may not refuse to register a pet based on the determination that the pet owner is financially unable to care for the pet. If the KWHA refuses to register a pet, a written notification will be sent to the pet owner stating the reason for denial and shall be served in accordance with HUD Notice requirements.

The KWHA will refuse to register a pet if:

The pet is not a *common household pet* as defined in this policy;

Keeping the pet would violate any Pet Policies;

The pet owner fails to provide complete pet registration information, or fails to update the registration annually;

The KWHA reasonably determines that the pet owner is unable to keep the pet in compliance with the pet rules and other lease obligations. The pet's temperament and behavior may be considered as a factor in determining the pet owner's ability to comply with provisions of the lease.

The notice of refusal may be combined with a notice of a pet violation.

A resident who cares for another resident's pet must notify the KWHA and agree to abide by all of the pet rules in writing.

B. STANDARDS FOR PETS

Pet rules will not be applied to animals who assist persons with disabilities.

Persons With Disabilities

The resident/pet owner will be required to qualify animals for exclusion from the pet policy who assist persons with disabilities. To be excluded from the pet policy, the resident/pet owner must certify:

That there is a person with disabilities in the household;

That the animal has been trained to assist with the specified disability; and

That the animal actually assists the person with the disability.

Types of Pets Allowed

No types of pets other than the following warm-blooded mammals may be kept by a resident:

1. **Dogs**

Maximum adult weight: 25 pounds

Maximum of 12 inches shoulder height at mature growth

Must be housebroken

Must be spayed or neutered

Must have all required inoculations

Must be licensed as specified now or in the future by State law and local ordinance

2. **Cats**

Must be spayed or neutered

Must have all required inoculations

Must be licensed as specified now or in the future by State law or local ordinance

3. **Birds**

Must be enclosed in a cage at all times

C. PETS TEMPORARILY ON THE PREMISES

Pets which are not owned by a tenant will not be allowed. Residents are prohibited from feeding or harboring stray animals.

D. ADDITIONAL FEES AND DEPOSITS FOR PETS

Tenants with animals must pay a refundable pet deposit of \$100.00 for the purpose of defraying all reasonable costs directly attributable to the presence of a pet. KWHHA reserves the right to change or increase the required deposit by amendment to these rules..

The KWHHA will refund the Pet Deposit to the tenant, less any damage caused by the pet to the dwelling unit, upon removal of the pet or the owner from the unit.

The KWHHA will return the Pet Deposit to the former tenant or to the person designated by the former tenant in the event of the former tenant's incapacitation or death.

The KWHHA will provide the tenant or designee identified above with a written list of any charges against the pet deposit. If the tenant disagrees with the amount charged to the pet deposit, the HA will provide a meeting to discuss the charges.

E. ALTERATIONS TO UNIT

Residents/pet owners shall not alter their unit, patio, premises or common areas to create an enclosure for any animal. Installation of pet doors is prohibited.

F. PET WASTE REMOVAL CHARGE

Pet deposit and pet waste removal charges are not part of rent payable by the resident.

All reasonable expenses incurred by the KWA as the result of damages directly attributable to the presence of the pet will be the responsibility of the resident, including:

The cost of repairs and replacements to the dwelling unit;

Fumigation of the dwelling unit.

If the tenant is in occupancy when such costs occur, the tenant shall be billed for such costs as a current charge.

If such expenses occur as the result of a move-out inspection, they will be deducted from the pet deposit. The resident will be billed for any amount which exceeds the pet deposit.

The pet deposit will be refunded when the resident moves out or no longer has a pet on the premises, whichever occurs first.

The expense of flea deinfestation shall be the responsibility of the resident.

G. PET AREA RESTRICTIONS

Pets must be maintained within the resident's unit. When outside of the unit (within the building or on the grounds) dogs and cats must be kept on a leash no longer than five (5) feet long, or carried and under the control of the resident or other responsible individual at all times **Pets are not permitted in common areas including lobbies, community rooms and laundry areas.**

An area of the development grounds has been designated as the area in which to exercise animals and to permit dogs to relieve themselves of bodily wastes. Residents shall be solely responsible for insuring that any debris or damage caused by the pet is properly disposed of in designated containers. If at any time the pet is found outside the Resident's home and not in compliance with this policy, the Resident will be served a Lease Violation and be required to request a meeting for continued occupancy.

Residents/Pet Owners are not permitted to exercise pets or permit pets to deposit waste on project premises outside of the areas designated for such purposes.

H. NOISE

Pet owners must agree to control the noise of pets so that such noise does not constitute a nuisance to other residents or interrupt their peaceful enjoyment of their housing unit or premises. This includes, but is not limited to loud or continuous barking, howling, whining, biting, scratching, chirping, or other such activities.

I. CLEANLINESS REQUIREMENTS

Removal of Waste From Other Locations. The Resident/Pet Owner shall be responsible for the removal of waste from the exercise area by placing it in a sealed plastic bag and disposing of it in an outside trash bin.

The resident/pet owner shall take adequate precautions to eliminate any pet odors within or around the unit and to maintain the unit in a sanitary condition at all times.

J. PET CARE

No pet shall be left unattended in any apartment for a period in excess of 12 hours.

Residents/pet owners must recognize that other residents may have chemical sensitivities or allergies related to pets, or may be easily frightened or disoriented by animals. Pet owners must agree to exercise courtesy with respect to other residents.

K. RESPONSIBLE PARTIES

The resident/pet owner will be required to designate two responsible parties for the care of the pet if the health or safety of the pet is threatened by the death or incapacity of the pet owner, or by other factors that render the pet owner unable to care for the pet.

L. INSPECTIONS

The KWHHA may enter and inspect the unit only if a written complaint is received alleging that the conduct or condition of the pet in the unit constitutes a nuisance or threat to the health or safety of the other occupants or other persons in the community under applicable State or local law.

J. PET RULE VIOLATION NOTICE

If a determination is made on objective facts supported by written statements, that a resident/pet owner has violated the Pet Policy, written notice will be served.

The Notice will contain a brief statement of the factual basis for the determination and the pet rule(s) which were violated. The notice will also state:

That the resident/pet owner has 7 days from the effective date of the service of notice to correct the violation or make written request for a meeting to discuss the violation;

That the resident pet owner is entitled to be accompanied by another person of his or her choice at the meeting; and

That the resident/pet owner's failure to correct the violation, request a meeting, or appear at a requested meeting may result in initiation of procedures to terminate the pet owner's tenancy.

K. NOTICE FOR PET REMOVAL

If the resident/pet owner and the KWHHA are unable to resolve the violation at the meeting or the pet owner fails to correct the violation in the time period allotted by the KWHHA, the KWHHA may serve notice to remove the pet.

The Notice shall contain:

A brief statement of the factual basis for the KWHHA's determination of the Pet Policy that has been violated;

The requirement that the resident /pet owner must remove the pet within 7 days of the notice; and

A statement that failure to remove the pet may result in the initiation of termination of tenancy procedures.

L. TERMINATION OF TENANCY

The KWHHA may initiate procedures for termination of tenancy based on a pet rule violation if:

The pet owner has failed to remove the pet or correct a pet rule violation within the time period specified; and

The pet rule violation is sufficient to begin procedures to terminate tenancy under terms of the lease.

M. PET REMOVAL

If the death or incapacity of the pet owner threatens the health or safety of the pet, or other factors occur that render the owner unable to care for the pet, the situation will be reported to the Responsible Party designated by the resident/pet owner. Includes pets who are poorly cared for or have been left unattended for over 12 hours.

If the responsible party is unwilling or unable to care for the pet, or if the KWHHA after reasonable efforts cannot contact the responsible party, the KWHHA may contact the appropriate State or local agency and request the removal of the pet.

N. EMERGENCIES

The KWHHA will take all necessary steps to insure that pets which become vicious, display symptoms of severe illness, or demonstrate behavior that constitutes an immediate threat to the health or safety of others, are referred to the appropriate State or local entity authorized to remove such animals.

(2) DECONCENTRATION OF POVERTY AND INCOME-MIXING

The KWA's admission policy is designed to provide for deconcentration of poverty and income-mixing by bringing higher income tenants into lower income projects and lower income tenants into higher income projects.

Gross annual income is used for income limits at admission and for income-mixing purposes.

Skipping of a family on the waiting list specifically to reach another family with a lower or higher income is not to be considered an adverse action to the family. Such skipping will be uniformly applied until the target threshold is met.

The PHA uses gathered tenant income information in its assessment of public housing developments to determine the appropriate designation to be assigned to the project for the purpose of assisting the KWA in its deconcentration goals.

Deconcentration and Income-Mixing Goals

Admission policies related to the deconcentration efforts of the KWA do not impose specific quotas. Therefore, the KWA will not set specific quotas, but will strive to achieve deconcentration and income-mixing in its developments.

Project Designation Methodology

The KWA determines and compares tenant incomes at all of its PH developments. On analyzing its findings the KWA will apply the policies, measures and incentives listed in this Chapter to bring higher income families into lower income developments and lower income families into higher income developments.

Our goal is to have eligible families with higher incomes occupy dwelling units in projects occupied predominantly by eligible families having lower incomes, and eligible families with lower incomes occupy dwelling units in projects predominantly occupied by eligible families having higher incomes. The waiting list statistics indicate there are sufficient extremely low income (129 of 203) and very low (59 of 203) income persons to balance incomes in developments designated higher income developments.

KWA uses the "Aggregate Average Method" to achieve its deconcentration objectives. The KWA reviews the annual resident income of all of its sites. Using the incomes of all families in all developments as a baseline, the KWA then determines the average income of all of its resident families, by development. This information is kept on file in the KWA. The KWA will designate higher income developments those with average income above the aggregate average. The KWA will designate lower income developments those with average income below the aggregate average.

(3) ASSESSMENT OF DEMOGRAPHIC CHANGES IN HOUSING AUTHORITY PROPERTIES— FY 2002

Effective FY 2001, the Key West Housing Authority integrated site based wait lists into one waiting list. The KWA maintains on file a confidential breakdown of property demographics by site for FY 2000 when it had wait lists, and for FY 2002, with an integrated list.

The KWHW strives to maintain full rentals and promote racial, ethnic and economic diversity in all its properties.

In the J. Y. Peters Place, full occupancy has been achieved with an improvement in our ethnic diversity and our economic diversity, including a mix of higher income residents who can act as role models for low and very low income residents. An overall improvement in ethnic and economic diversity has been accompanied by a slight decrease in racial diversity.

In the Senior Citizens Plaza, we have maintained full occupancy and have improved ethnic diversity with no decline in racial or income distribution.
