The Mission of the Oak Park Housing Authority is to provide very low income households and families of all ages, races and backgrounds with affordable, safe, and sanitary housing while complying with HUD Federal Regulations and working within the Village of Oak Park's housing values, policies, and standards.

The goals of the Oak Park Housing Authority are:

- A. Continue to effectively utilize HUD funds for Mils Park Tower and the Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher Program.
- B. Continue to provide Section 8 resources throughout Oak Park on a scattered, non-concentrated basis
- C. Work with OPHA's community Partners to determine the feasibility of increasing Oak Park's housing stock, and making available additional rental units within Fair Market Rents and scattered throughout the community.
- D. Improve OPHA's fiscal strength and organizational capacity.
- E. Shape OPHA into a recognized community resource.

In cooperation with the Village of Oak Park, OPHA has identified priority community housing needs. OPHA concludes that the two key issues faced by households on OPHA's waiting lists are: lack of affordable housing units and/or HUD Fair Market Rents which are too low; and the lack of sufficient supply of units with two, three or more bedrooms.

Annual Advisory Board Meeting 2004

Held on Wednesday, August 12, 2004

Ken Southward: Introduction of himself, Executive Director Ed Solan and the OPHA staff.

Ed Solan: Opening statement and brief introduction on new program that will allow voucher holders to become homeowners. Explained that all details were not available at the present moment and a meeting with detailed information would be scheduled in about 60 days.

Ken Southward: Opens floor for questions and comments concerning program.

Rita London: I have been a resident for 10 years. The problem is that I have had problems in my apartment for the last two years and I thought the assistant landlord was supposed to do the maintenance. I complained to the landlord and the assistant came over with no notice and I was not there. His name is Gerald and he told me that he was very stressed out because he had too much work. He said that there were two landlords, and that they were overloaded with other buildings. He told me to stop calling, I felt disrespected and neglected.

Ken Southward: I will address this problem with you in private at a later time, (Ken went on to explain the complaint procedure).

Robert Burke: This comment is to Ken and Deidre. I fear you. You hurt people. I submitted my paperwork and you violate my privacy. You know what I am talking about you hurt people. When I come into the office my skin crawls and my inner voice tells me "get out!, get out!, get out!".

Ed Solan: Sir, I would be happy to meet with you to address your concerns in private.

Robert Burke: You denounce me in public, I denounce you. To everyone here, "get out!, get out!, get out!".

Angela Franklin: I am pleased with the program and have no complaints.

Annie Brown: I think that people feel low in the program and that people look down on them. You should not, I think that people should work together and cooperate together.

Delores Burton: I am satisfied with the program, I feel really blessed. I want to say a special thank you to Deidre and Ken. I am however not satisfied with my current apartment and is looking for another apartment.

Willa Smith: I have been in the program since the 1980's. I feel others are envious of program and look down on me. There are also some people that are ashamed of the program. There should be a self sufficiency program to help people to get off. I have heard of a program that saves money for the person and when they reach \$5000, the program gives them the money toward a home. I do not think people should be able to stay on the program.

Ken Southward: There is no set program that saves money or a self sufficiency program but as Ed mentioned earlier there is a new program that is in the works.

Ed Solan: As I mentioned earlier there is a new program that would assist people with buying homes. We will have a meeting with more details in the about 60 days.

Deshonda Webster: Good program, transfer from Maywood. Oak Park has more to offer, as far as with my children. When I first moved here I felt intimidated. But Oak Park had better schools and after-school programs. I feel that this program can help or hinder you. Don't stop working and progressing. People should work and continue to grow. The staff has great communication skills, I feel comfortable with them. I was able to receive my associates' degree while on the program.

Nelson Roberts: Hello, I am here all dirty because I work as a mechanic. I just want to say that you can work and continue on. Deidre has helped a lot because my wife has been sick. She went out of her way to help. Thank you Deidre!!!

Clomene Prophet: Thank you Ken and Deidre. I am single mother with three children. I am finishing college, the program is helping me so that I can finish school.

Emma Cobbs: I am a new resident in Oak Park. It is so nice here and I just want to say that I appreciate the program.

Betty Delaney: I have lived in Oak Park for a little over a year. I find no fault in the board. I would like to thank you Deidre for your politeness, and say thank you Ken.

Angela Priestly: This program has definitely been a plus for me. I have been on the program since my son was 4 and he is now 17. I was able to get my bachelors and masters degree but I have not yet found a job. I cannot complain about the program. I appreciate the compassion, respect and professionalism

that I receive from Ken and Deidre; I have not yet met Jessica. I am grateful for the open door of communication.

Roberta King: I have a great landlord and no complaints.

Sarah Stokes: I am happy to be Oak Park. Deidre has helped me out a lot. I am a senior, I do not live in a senior home but there are seniors in my building and I feel that I can walk around comfortably. I just want to say thank you to all.

Ed Solan: I would like to introduce Fred Pospisil from the Board of Commissioners. I am very glad that he can join us.

Delores Burton: I think this program takes people out of the slum and brings people to better surroundings. I cannot imagine where I would be if it were not for the Section 8 program and I am very happy to be a part of it.

Deshonda Webster: Are the opportunities for tenants to help or to work in the office because we are on the program and are a product of it.

Ed Solan: Right now we do not have the budget to hire you. However you should write to the Congress and express concerns and comments. The Alderman is Ed Smith and you are welcome to call the office and we will provide you with the address.

Bernie King: Well where I came from was dirt, so now I try my hardest to keep the area clean. When I go outside I pick up paper and garbage and other people should do the same to keep the area clean.

Annie Brown: I came from the city and I think that the intimidation comes from "order". The Oak Park Housing Authority has one on one relationship with clients and is very business oriented.

Robert Burke: I would like to know what is the annual budget? Then I would like to ask how many people are on the voucher program? Is it true that people cannot move because you will not assist them or you make the housing authority where they come from pay and they cannot afford it?

Ed Solan: You asked a number of questions allow me to address the last one first. Funding is being cut. The Housing Authorities do not have administrative funds to transport clients. But that is something that you all do not have to worry about it will not effect you. There are about 510 vouchers are in use, 427 allocated to Oak Park Housing Authority about 50 vouchers for disability and we have people constantly moving up. Our annual budget is about \$3,300,000.00.

Betty Delaney: I moved from the city and Elmwood Park is very proud of current status. Oak Park has a good program. Tom Nichol is very professional, Deidre

and Jessica both very polite. Ken Southward showed concern, I am very appreciative.

Ed Solan: I would like to introduce Gus Kustopolis who has decided to join us. Mr. Kustopolis is a member of the Board of Trustees.

Keena Bonds: I am grateful for the program. I have been on the program for 3 years. I have not had any problems. I make sure that I have everything ready for my recertification and everyone else should also. I also want to say that people should not become dependent on the program forever. I am grateful because I could not afford to pay \$900 or a \$1000 for two bedrooms on my own.

Nancy Tate: I am a new resident from Maywood. I have been here for about 45 days. Jessica and Ken helped me to move. I work and go to school. I think a lot of us feel looked down upon and that people in Oak Park are very stereotypical. I live in a four flat and I feel intimidated. I am afraid to let my son play and make noise because the people will report me. I feel that my neighbors and the landlord look down on me. I also feel like the OPHA feel that I am hiding something and are always digging for more information. I report what I am supposed to and wish they would stop thinking I am hiding more. I really feel like others look down on me.

Angela Priestly: Oak Park is not a warm place. The people are not welcoming at all. The landlords are very stereotypical. You have to look for a landlord who gives you respect. You have to get involved in different things to break the stereotypes. I have become very active and involved in the school and my son has benefited from this, stereotypes have been broken and he has been exposed to more opportunities. I had a lot of insecurities with the program and myself but I was able to get over them.

Janice Evans: Does the Oak Park Housing Authority have meetings with the landlords. Landlords go up on rent when they know people have vouchers. You can get one price and when they find out you have a voucher they raise the price. I feel there should be meetings on how the program works.

Ken Southward: We meet with the owners twice a year. However, you have the right to negotiate your rent. If you feel that you are being discriminated against or if the landlord is being unreasonable you should definitely report this.

Rita London: I am wondering with the Condominiums coming up, what is the effect on the community?

Ed Solan: There are two sides to this. This is good that they are coming up because the neighborhood does need to grow, however there may be a decrease in affordable housing.

Leroy Pughe: I feel blessed in this village. I refuse to let others look down on me because of a federal subsidized program. I like this program because you are not confined to one area or location. Whatever program that you may get in is no stronger than the Oak Park Housing Authority. The staff is doing a superb job. I see that a lot of buildings are going Condo. My question is that if after a landlord submits an increase, can a tenant protest?

Ken Southward: (explains the process of rent increases). Does anyone else have a comment or concern?

Ed Solan: If not, thank you all for coming out. (makes closing remarks).

REQUEST FOR FUNDS

The Oak Park Housing Authority is requesting funds for Service Coordinator at Mills Park Tower (IL103 Low Rent Public Housing). The funds requested are in the amount of **\$44,000.00** which includes salary and fringe benefits of a full time employee (Service Coordinator).

- Develop programs within Mills Park Tower that may better assist residents in being informed of community resources.
- Link residents with all area agencies and village departments to provide affordability and improved quality of life.
- Develop programs and attend training that may better assist residents in being informed of community resources and available services.
- Refer residents to appropriate government programs which they may be entitled to receive.

QUALIFICATIONS

- Bachelor's degree in social work, gerontology, psychology or life experience in fields relating to the provision of social services.
- Two to three years of experience in social services delivery with seniors or disabled persons.
- Training is desirable in elderly/disabled issues, drug and alcohol abuse by the elderly and mental health issues.
- Demonstrated working knowledge of services and sources in the Oak Park area. Demonstrated ability to advocate, organize and problem-solve for the elderly And disabled.
