ii. Executive Summary of the Annual PHA Plan

The Chicopee Housing Authority has prepared an Agency Plan in conjunction with residents and local leaders. For the first time we have conducted public meetings with the City of Chicopee Office of Community Development. Our goal in this effort is to better address the needs of our larger community as contained in the Consolidated Plan. This plan reflects the needs of our community and resident population. The Plan is designed to comply with the requirements of the Quality Housing and Work Responsibility Act of 1998 and requirements of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

This plan is subject to annual review and revision in order to remain current with all statutory requirements and local needs.

A mission statement has been adopted to guide the management activities of the Chicopee Housing Authority. The Annual Plan, its objectives and goals are reflective of our mission statement. The Plan represents a comprehensive statement of strategies in community building that correspond to our communities Consolidated Plan.

The Annual Plan of the Chicopee Housing Authority includes the following:

Goals and Objectives that are consistent with local needs of our residents and the community as a whole, designed to maintain the current housing stock as an asset to our community. Waiting list preferences and priorities that reflect the need of the community and population served.

Deconcentration initiatives that provide for the support and encourage growth in the resident population. An operating budget and capital fund program that maximize our financial resources to better enable us to preserve affordable housing in Chicopee. Management of housing choice vouchers in order to provide the maximum number of assisted units to families in our jurisdiction. A tenancy preservation component to assure that our residents impacted by the poor lifestyle choices or unseen disabilities have an opportunity to work within the system to improve their lives and their futures. Initiatives to enable the elderly and frail to maintain the maximum level of independence.

Our plan includes the continued operation of the activities previously funded through the Public Housing Drug Elimination Program (as funding permits) as an essential part of our provision of a safe and healthy environment of the families we serve. This program has resulted in the elimination of street corner drug dealing and the presence of the type of adverse traffic such dealing attracts. We are now focused on the promotion and maintenance of a drug free neighborhood. Educational and activity programming for the youth are an integral part of this approach.

Physical improvement of our developments and improvement in CHA management systems continues through the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's Capital Fund Program. The eight (8) years of participation in this program have resulted in significant improvements to our physical plant as well as improvements to our service delivery systems.

The Plan contains information on housing availability, affordability and make-up of the rental population based on 2000 census data currently available. This data appears outdated based on our experience with the housing market but has improved over that available last year. Our plan takes into account our current knowledge of the rental market and the 2000 Census information.

ATTACHMENT "A"

CHICOPEE HOUSING AUTHORITY

POLICY ESTABLISHING A

COMMUNITY SERVICE PROGRAM

Effective July 1, 2001 residents of the Chicopee Housing Authority who are otherwise non-exempt from obligations imposed through the Regulations prescribed by HUD for Community Service Activities or Self Sufficiency Programs (Part 960, Subpart F) shall be required as a condition of their lease to participate in a program, administered through the CHA, designed to improve educational level and employment potential for a minimum of eight hours per month.

The Chicopee Housing Authority, through its Capital Fund Program and the Public Housing Drug Elimination Grant Program provides a GED Program, English as a Second Language and sub GED level remedial programs for residents of federally-aided public housing developments. These programs shall be available, and funded additionally through the annual operating budget, to accommodate residents covered by the Community Service Program requirement.

At the time of annual recertification of eligibility, or interim recertification, the Project Clerk shall be charged with the responsibility of identifying adult household members who are not exempt from the Community Service Requirement as established by HUD. Those adult residents identified as eligible for the program shall be referred to the PHDEP Coordinator at the end of each given month for processing and scheduling of enrollment in the program.

No later than the fifteenth day of each month following the inception of the program the PHDEP Coordinator shall provide the CHA with a list of residents enrolled and certified attendance records for all participants. Participants failing to attend shall be informed of their obligation in writing.

Sixty days prior to the end of the initial enrollment period (recertification date) the Project Clerk shall review the attendance record, send written notice of non-compliance with program requirements and refer the family to the Assistant Executive Director who shall notify the family of the non-renewal of their dwelling lease in accordance with program requirements.

ATTACHMENT "B"

CHICOPEE HOUSING AUTHORITY
Chicopee, Massachusetts

PET POLICY

APPLICABLE ONLY TO FEDERALLY-AIDED DEVELOPMENTS MA 8-1, MA 8-2 AND MA 8-3

The Chicopee Housing Authority allows for pet ownership in its developments with the written pre-approval of the Housing Authority. In exchange for this right, resident assumes full responsibility and liability for the pet and agrees to hold the Chicopee Housing Authority harmless from any claims caused by an action or inaction of the pet.

Residents are responsible for any damage caused by their pet, including the cost of any pet-related insect infestation in the their unit. The Chicopee Housing authority reserves the right to exterminate and charge the resident.

Residents must have the prior written approval of the Housing Authority before moving a pet into their unit. Residents must request approval on the "Authorization for Pet Ownership Form" that must be fully completed before the Housing Authority will approve the request.

RULES GOVERNING PETS: All residents with pet permits shall comply with the following:

1. Permitted are domesticated dogs or cats only.
2. Only one (1) pet per household will be permitted.
- 3 Dogs must be licensed yearly with the City of Chicopee (office of the City Clerk).
3. Pet must be appropriately inoculated against rabies, distemper or boosters, as applicable and certification signed by a licensed veterinarian shall be annually filed with the Chicopee Housing Authority to attest to the inoculations.
4. All dogs and cats shall remain inside the resident's unit. No animal shall be permitted to be loose in hallways, lobby areas, Laundromats, community rooms, yards or other common areas of the facility.
5. When taken outside the unit, dogs and cats must be kept on a leash, controlled by an adult and be in complete accordance with the "Dog Leash Law" of the City of Chicopee.
6. Pit bulls, Doberman Pinchers, or any other animal of a vicious or intimidating nature as determined by the CHA will not be allowed.

7. Residents shall not permit their pet to disturb, interfere or diminish the peaceful enjoyment of other residents. The terms “disturb, interfere, and diminish” shall include, but not be limited to barking, howling, biting, scratching, and other like activities.
8. Residents must provide waterproof litter boxes for cat waste, which must be kept in the dwelling unit. Residents shall not permit refuse from litter boxes to accumulate nor to become unsightly or unsanitary.
9. Residents are solely responsible for disposing of dog and cat waste by placing it in a plastic bag and then wrapped in paper and placed in a container outside the building for regular scheduled trash pick-up.
10. Residents shall take adequate precautions and measures necessary to eliminate pet odors within or around the unit and shall maintain the unit in a sanitary condition at all times.
11. If pets are left unattended for a period of twenty-four (24) hours or more, the CHA may enter the dwelling unit, remove the pet and transfer it to the proper authorities, subject to the provisions of Chapter 140, and applicable orders of the Massachusetts General Laws and pertinent local ordinances. The Housing Authority accepts no responsibility for the animal under such circumstances.
12. Residents shall not alter their unit, patio, or unit area in order to create an enclosure for any pet.
13. Residents are responsible for all damages caused by their pets, including the cost of cleaning carpets, and/or fumigation of units.
14. Residents are prohibited from feeding or harboring stray animals. The feeding of stray animals shall constitute having a pet without written permission of the CHA.
15. Resident owner agrees to hold CHA harmless from any liability incurred as a result of their pet ownership.
16. Should any pet housed in a CHA facility under Section 227 give birth to a litter, the resident shall remove from the premises all said pets, as the tenant would be in violation of this policy.
17. Residents must identify an alternate custodian for pets in the event of resident illness or other absence from the dwelling unit. This identification of an alternate custodian must occur prior to the Housing Authority issuing a pet registration permit.
18. Pet bedding shall not be washed in any common laundry facilities.
19. Residents must take appropriate actions to protect their pets from fleas and ticks
20. Resident shall physically control or confine his/her pet during the times when Housing Authority employees, agents of the Housing Authority or others must enter the pet owner’s apartment to conduct business, provide services, enforce lease terms, etc.
21. If pet causes harm to any person, the pet’s owner shall be required to permanently remove the pet from the Housing Authority’s property within 24 hours of written notice from the Housing Authority. The pet owner may also be subject to termination of his/her dwelling lease.

22. No animal may exceed thirty (30) pounds in weight projected to full size.

The privilege of maintaining a pet in the facility operated by CHA shall be subject to the rules set forth in RULES GOVERNING PETS mentioned herein. This privilege may be revoked at any time subject to the Housing Authority Hearing Procedures if the animal shall become destructive, create a nuisance, represent a threat to the safety and security of other residents, or create a problem in the area of cleanliness and sanitation.

A pet owner who violates any other condition(s) of this policy may be required to remove his/her pet from the development within 10 days of written notice from the Housing Authority. The pet owner may also be subject to termination of his/her dwelling lease.

Should a BREACH OF THE RULES SET FORTH OCCUR, the CHA may also exercise any remedy granted it in accordance with Chapter 140 and applicable order to the Massachusetts General Laws.

The Housing Authority's grievance procedures shall be applicable to all individual grievances or disputes arising out of violations or alleged violations of this policy.

I HAVE READ AND UNDERSTAND THE ABOVE POLICY PROVISIONS REGARDING THE KEEPING OF PETS AND AGREE TO ABIDE BY THOSE PROVISIONS.

Meeting was called to order at 4:00 p.m.

Ms. Kidwell, Director, Office of Community Development informed those in attendance that the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program has been in existence for the past 30 years and stated that this meeting serves as the needs hearing which starts the process of putting together the CDBG Annual Consolidated Plan for the upcoming fiscal year July 2005 – June 2006 in conjunction with our 5-year plan. A draft of the 5-year plan will be available for review in January 2005 and those who attended the focus group meetings will be automatically sent an email copy. She added that the

City is working jointly with the Chicopee Housing Authority (CHA) on the Annual Plan Process.

Ms. Kidwell stated that the City CDBG program is awaiting word from HUD on the allocation it will receive but was informed that it will be slightly less than last years funding. The City continues to focus its funding assistance on where the needs are greatest and they are public housing, subsidized housing and family self sufficiency.

She added that the RFP is a new format which stresses requests to be more needs specific and strongly encouraged interaction, coordination and networking among community based agencies and requested that requests for funding should be specific in regards to needs and should emphasize how programs are addressing the changing needs of the City.

Ms. Patricia Murry, Assistant Executive Director, Chicopee Housing Authority stated that they also submit an Annual Plan that states their mission and goals for their upcoming funding year. She stated that the CHA Annual Plan is submitted separately from the City plan and they also solicit comments from CHA tenants and the public. She continued that CHA works closely with the Office of Community Development (OCD) and their main focus is to provide needed services to low income residents, many of whom reside in their public housing and subsidized facilities.

Those present asked what the City/CHA see as the most pressing need.

Ms. Kidwell replied that a demographic study by neighborhood from 1990 – 2000 showed the city is a very diverse community with a increase in the Latino population, along with Asian, Russian and Ukranian. The city consists of 6 neighborhoods and three are stable and three comprise lower income. The city is fortunate that the community is very stable compared to other surrounding cities/towns and the goal is to improve and make an even more stable base which affords more opportunities to its residents.

The three less stable neighborhoods show a large portion of female-headed households earning an annual income under \$10,000. There is also a large elder population. She stated that the Council on Aging is finishing their elder needs survey providing for their future needs. She added that there may be the need to make changes in the elder public housing which could be to provide supportive services. Also she noted that a large portion of those in elder public housing are not elders.

Ms. Murry stated that the CHA would like to see more emphasis on families by providing them with more education opportunities such as money management and possible homeownership. Many residents of the public and private subsidized housing require many supportive services. The goal of CHA is to help them move forward and make public/subsidized housing truly transitional housing. She continued that the elders could also use education, particularly internet/computer experience.

Ms. Murry added that CHA is working with Holyoke Community College on programs for their residents. She stated that CHA would also love to get some help/assistance from Elms College with tutors for parents and students.

Ms. Ward from Elms College stated that they do have some programs in Cabot Manor and also assist the Bowe and Holy Name schools.

Ms. Lovell from WestMass ElderCare added that their organization collaborates with the Council on Aging and the CHA providing elder and handicap meals along with the congregate meals (supper club) program at Birch Bark Place.

Alderman At Large Robert Zygarowski posed the following questions: How much is the grant? Does the city's stability hurt our funding? Is the entire amount of the grant used for the community? Can you use it for housing? Does the downtown section qualify for funding?

Ms. Kidwell replied that the city is receiving approximately \$10,000± less that last year. Yes the stability of the city is a factor in determining funding but the city had a 3% increase in the poverty rate. Yes the entire amount of the grant is used on the community: 15% for public services, 20% for administration/planning and 65% remaining amount is spend on roads and sidewalks, parks, demolition, etc. The city can use the grant for housing but generally the city uses HOME (a separate pool of funds) for housing.

Ms. Kidwell added that preliminary goals and objectives have been drafted after a series of focus group meetings that were held during this past summer and fall. One of the objectives is a redevelopment effort in the downtown area.

Ms. Georgantas from Bowe school stated that there are 3 struggling schools with 90% of students as walkers of which Bowe school is one. Bowe is in need of play structures and would appreciate a hand from the community in obtaining equipment for their children and the neighborhood. She noted that some people have cited the concern of security, safety and vandalism as reasons for not having the play structures but other schools have them and there does not seem to be a problem. She added that other schools have playgrounds and would hope that new playground equipment would help to encourage positive parent children interaction during after school hours.

Ms. Betsy Daly of the Boys and Girls Club stated that they have play structures along with a new basketball court and there has been no problem with vandalism. She added that it has only been an asset for the Club and the only problem is keeping enough mulch in place.

Ms. Daly added that the Club has just received a 2 year grant for a gang prevention program and that there will be a 2-day training to help in the identification of children at risk and head them off before they join gangs along with the implementation of outreach.

Ms. Melinda Thomas from Womanshelter/Companeras stated that they are emphasizing direct services with their 24/7 hotline, shelter services and the development of further work with Chicopee Village Townhomes (CVT), Cabot Manor and interventions.

Ms. Murry stated that the CHA is looking from outreach from the middle man. The need for outreach is great. A sense of trust and belief has to be built with our residents.

Ms. Kidwell thanked all in attendance and informed them that funding proposal forms were now available along with a copy of the upcoming years draft planning schedule.

Pat Murry opened the meeting explaining that the plan would be ready for public review on January 31, 2005 for 45 days and that this period is for the Chicopee residents and tenants of CHA adequate time to review the plan and supporting documents and submit any comments they may have.

A notice will be published in the local newspaper on January 31, 2005 stating that the plan is available for review and comments along with the date of the public meeting which is scheduled for March 18, 2005 at 2:00 at the community center on 664 Meadow St., Chicopee, MA.

Mr. Lynch explained that CHA was working closely with Community Development in assessing the needs of low to moderate-income families in the city. The assessment is necessary to formulate a plan to address the needs of families and assist them in achieving self-sufficiency. There have been discussions with several agencies in Chicopee and the surrounding areas in regards to programs towards reaching this goal. Also, it has been realized that outreach programs are needed to reach the needy and CHA and the Community Development office are working on putting this in place.

Mr. Zawidowski from the Community Development office stated in a recent survey that it was found that the city had a substantial increase over the previous years in female single parent families.

Mr. Dunn spoke of the Capital Funds program and that meetings are being scheduled at all Federal Developments to discuss the monies CHA has and projects that need to be done. He explained how important it was to get the tenant's input on what they thought the money should be spent on in their development.

The meeting closed at approximately 2:37 pm and the next meeting has been scheduled for February 15, 2005 at 2:00 pm.

Meeting was called to order at 5:00 p.m.

Ms. Kidwell, Director, Office of Community Development informed those in attendance that this is the final hearing in the funding process and that the CDCAC will be meeting next week to finalize their recommendations to the Mayor and then submitting the plan to Holyoke on May 15, 2005. She added that the office is still keeping track of CDBG cuts and the possibility of redoing the formula/reworking the program. She stated that if the program goes into the Department of Commerce there will be no public service portion of the program.

She continued that the focus on this years funding is to give priority to family self-sufficiency especially to those in public and subsidized housing. She then opened the meeting for comments.

Mr. David Scanlin of Abilities Unlimited stated that there are different ways they can handle their program and want to work more closely with the Chicopee Housing Authority and service targeted families.

Ms. Kidwell stated that the intent of this years funding will be to sit down with agencies as a group working together with a lead agency and doing a block of services targeted towards a particular group. There will be discussions to fine tune the scope of services and budget.

Ms. Lisa Lovell, WestMass ElderCare thanked Community Development for their continued support and funding and added that they are also taking a different approach to their program this year by doing more outreach in public and subsidized housing and trying to coordinate the use of their services and other services to support the family caregivers as well as the client. She added that they are actively trying to find new clients, not just the current clients.

Mr. Vernon Campbell, Chicopee Visiting Nurse Association, stated that they are concentrating their efforts on the falls risk assessment program/balance clinic. He continued that 3,000 of the 9,000 elders in the city are susceptible to falling and he stated that WestMass ElderCare is helping in the fall risk assessment with their outreach programs. He added that by preventing falls it ultimately prevents injury, hospitalization and helps to cut down on medical costs.

Mr. James Lynch, Executive Director, Chicopee Housing Authority, stated that they are not only an agency that seeks funding from Community Development but is also a partner in the delivery of services. He stated that they have 1,199 units of housing in 13 developments and their goal is help their residents maintain independent lives. He added that the elderly in their developments are getting older and the other tenants are getting younger and there is a major need for education services.

Mr. Lynch stated that their capital fund program which provides for physical improvements to the developments along with tenant services has been decreasing over the past three years and is ultimately limited them the ability to expand the capital fund program.

He continued that the federally funded developments receive a large amount of funding assistance while the state funded developments do not. He added that the CHA provides summer youth activities, including intern employment and educational services and a great deal of funding on community policing resources all within the Cabot Manor development.

He added that they also administer the Section 8 Voucher for 393 units throughout the city. He stated that the Section 8 program has been cut by 10% and the program has capped the number of dollars that can be spent on each unit so that the number of vouchers is down to 383 and they are proposing another 6-10% cut.

He stated that the CHA survives on a very tight budget and they need to contract for services for their tenants to help ensure a better more stabile community which in the long run gives growth and stability to the city as a whole.



MISSION GOALS AND PROGRESS REPORT

The mission statement of the Chicopee Housing Authority, as provided in our original Five Year Plan, remains the guide to our provision of services to low-income residents in our community. Through this past year we have worked diligently to maintain and improve the physical quality of our housing stock and we have implemented new initiatives to improve the quality of life of our residents and other persons of low income in the community. These include a renewal of our contract with the Tenancy Preservation Program to provide assistance to residents in danger of losing their housing by rehabilitating marginal tenancies as undiagnosed impairments are addressed with support services and a continued collaboration with the Gandara Center with the "Serenity Program" which provides rehabilitation and family reunification services to women who have suffered from substance abuse.

In a continued effort to enable the self sufficiency of low-income individuals and families in our community the Chicopee Housing Authority has actively participated as a member of the Chicopee Adult Basic Education Advisory Board/Planning Committee organized by the Valley Opportunity Council. The purpose of this group is to maintain the availability of educational programs for eligible individuals in our community and to obtain additional resources to augment current programs. Again in the past year, the economic downturn has caused the number employed residents to decrease slightly. We intend to support educational opportunities for our residents in order to increase the potential of employability.

The CHA will continue to provide first-time homebuyer classes to our public housing tenants and voucher program participants with the intent of expanding housing opportunities to those we serve. This initiative is carried out in cooperation with the City of Chicopee Office of Community Development. In the next year we hope to include non-traditional partners in the delivery of this program in order to diversify the range of participants.

In an increased effort to prepare our families for homeownership the CHA will also continue to support budget counseling sessions for our public housing residents and Section 8 participants. These sessions, conducted by Solutions, Inc., a local non-profit specializing in economic improvement for disadvantaged families have proven to be very worthwhile in fostering economic improvement.

We have continued to work towards our specific goals over the last year by maintaining a high standard of performance, focusing on improving the rate of unit turn over in public housing and by increasing the percentage for lease up of Section 8 Vouchers. The number of families that we are able to assist in our Housing Choice Voucher Program has been adversely affected by the recent change in the budgeting process. It appears that this trend will continue with a gradual shrinking of the program.

Quality of life improvements within public housing developments have continued through our efforts to provide police patrols within the family developments and by the continuation of educational programs for youths and adults as well as activity programs for youth in our family development. We have indicated our intent to maintain these activities if the funding for them remains available in the next budget year. The youth educational and activity programs have experienced a significant growth in participation in the last year.

Police patrols will be extended to the Memorial Apartments (MA 8-2) in order to address increasing concerns about disruptive behavior voiced by residents of the development at our planning meetings.

In the past year we have attempted to increase communication with our residents through notices on matters of importance and by alternating the scheduling of public meetings at the developments. This has met with mixed results and we will continue to make efforts to reach out to our tenant population, especially at Cabot Manor. Communications are translated to Spanish, the predominant language of the resident population in order to increase successful communication.

Also, in response to the Resident Assessment Survey conducted by the Real Estate Assessment Center the CHA is utilizing services available through the Hampden County Sheriff's Department's "Community Corrections" program. Through this program their participants from the community provide services that enable us to present an improved neighborhood appearance.

The Chicopee Housing Authority has now opened a Community Resource Center at our Cabot Manor Apartments. The provision of daycare services to approximately 35 children has already begun last year. This facility also serves to provide educational and computer learning space on site and an office for community policing. We have continued to make our space available for School Department activities such as a pre-school reading program and teacher/parent functions. A new community room was dedicated at a family development site, the Chester A. Korzeniowski Community Resource Center. It is our intent to attract programming for youth and families to this site that will be administered by the Chicopee Boys & Girls Club.

This year the CHA and the City of Chicopee Office of Community Development have collaborated further on the development of our annual plans by combining public hearings. This effort is intended to enhance services to our residents and to prevent any potential duplication of efforts so that we can maximize use of our resources. The OCD is placing increased emphasis on self sufficiency for low income residents in their program funding during the next year. This new emphasis will result in the grouping of services from six local providers, through the administrative services of the Chicopee Boys and Girls Club, Inc. These providers and their services are:

A survey of elder needs in the community has been completed in partnership with the Council on Aging, Chicopee Visiting Nurses and Hawthorn Services (a local elder services provider), and a survey of our low income residents in the Willimansett section of the city has similarly been completed through a collaboration between the CHA and Office of Community Development. The results of these surveys will be incorporated in our work this year.

An opportunity has arisen this year to work with our City to revitalize a major entry corridor to the City. An abandoned commercial site adjacent to our Cabot Manor Development has been proposed for commercial re-development. If successful the re-development would result in new construction on that site, the razing on an adjacent dilapidated three story building and general clean-up of the area. The CHA owns several plots of land abutting this site that are remote from the developed section of our housing site and are excess to the needs of the CHA. The sale of these plots to a potential new owner of the commercial site would enhance the overall development of this area and significantly improve the entry corridor to our city. The Commissioner's of the Housing Authority have endorsed this sale.

The looming financial crises for local housing authorities caused by the decreases in the Housing Choice Voucher Program, inadequate levels of federal subsidy funding for conventional programs and the toll taken by three years of level funded state housing budgets will pose a significant challenge in the next year. It is expected that the number of families assisted in the rental assistance program will decrease and that some level of services to residents will be affected if the trend increases.
