A. PHA Progress in Meeting the Mission and Goals Described in the 5-Year Plan

STATEMENT OF PROGRESS

- 1) **EXPAND THE SUPPLY OF EXISTING HOUSING**
 - *Apply for an additional 30 Vouchers by 6/01 – 20 Incremental Vouchers were received in December 2000, following that the funds available were restricted to special types of Vouchers which were not feasible for our agency; this continues to the present time.*
 - *Reduce vacancy rate to 2% by 6/01 – The public housing vacancy rate has gone from 96.5% in 2001 to as low as 91.5% in 2003 and back to 95% in 2004; largely due to unit renovations under CFP. This has recently improved to 96% and we continue to strive for our goal of 98%.*
 - *Increase the Emergency Shelter program by one apartment – The program now uses two apartments locally for temporary/emergency housing.*
 - *Build 14 elderly homeowner units – Significant progress has been made on this project – the entire site has been acquired; hazardous structures have been demolished; plans and specifications have been prepared; the City has approved the site as a Planned Use Development site; and we are currently working with the City to install the infrastructure at the site.*

- 2) **IMPROVE THE QUALITY OF ASSISTED HOUSING**
 - *Achieve a PHAS score of 98 – This has not been achieved yet; the score has improved slightly to 89 over the five-year period*
 - *Achieve a SEMAP score of 95 – This goal was achieved in 2003.*
 - *Increase customer satisfaction – This has continually improved by RASS measures and by more active participation of residents in a Tenants' Association in the elderly project.*
 - *Continue capital fund goals – these goals have all been met and future work will be accomplished by means of participation in a Capital Fund Bond Pool – the first of its kind in New York State;*

through the New York State Public Housing Authorities Directors' Association.

- 3) **INCREASE ASSISTED HOUSING CHOICES**
 - Review payment standards annually – this has been done regularly and at the present time the standards are being reviewed more frequently due to new funding constraints
 - Implement Voucher homeownership program with local CAP agency – this has taken place only through referrals to that agency; the Executive Director participates as a member of the Advisory Group for the homeowner program
 - Develop elderly homeowner program – see (1) above.
 - Maintain site-based waiting lists – this continues to be our policy for all programs.
- 4) **PROVIDE AN IMPROVED LIVING ENVIRONMENT**
 - Install security camera systems in both public housing projects- this has been accomplished and has been successfully utilized for investigation of tenant disturbances and complaints, fraud investigations, and criminal activities by the Authority and local Police and Sheriff's departments.
- 5) **PROMOTE SELF-SUFFICIENCY AND ASSET DEVELOPMENT OF ASSISTED HOUSEHOLDS**
 - Provide supportive services by sponsoring Adult Day Care in our elderly project – this sponsorship has continued and participation in the program is increasing, by tenants and community persons. This is a partnership with the County Area Agency on Aging.
- 6) **ENSURE EQUAL OPPORTUNITY AND AFFIRMATIVELY FURTHER FAIR HOUSING**
 - Construct 14 units of fully accessible elderly homeowner housing – see (1) above.
