Lewiston Housing Authority will continue to optimize the use of its current programs by reducing public housing vacancies and actively marketing its Section 8 programs. We foresee no loss of public housing units. Funding cuts in the Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher program are causing us to assist fewer families and we would apply for additional units if they became available. We believe that the continued presence of project based Section 8 is important to the community.

The Lewiston Housing Authority has thirty-three employees in five departments. Three of these departments are located at the Authority’s main office at 1 College Street. The Executive Department, consisting of the Executive Director, Administrative Assistant, and Modernization Coordinator, provides planning and direction to the other departments and carries out the policies adopted by the Board of Commissioners.

The Eligibility and Occupancy Department, headed by the Rental Programs Manager, has a staff of seven and performs all of the waiting list, lease-up, and rent determination functions for both the Section 8 and public housing programs. This department is responsible for inspections of dwelling units.

The Accounting Department, consisting of the Controller and three staff, performs budgeting, accounting, and financial reporting for the agency as well as personnel, systems management, and compliance functions.

The Resident Services Department is located at the Hillview Community Center and is directed by the Manager of Resident Services who uses a staff of four to manage all of the public housing developments and to provide social, educational, and supportive services to residents.

The Maintenance Department, located at 47 Avon Street, is directed by the Manager of Physical Plant. The staff of twelve provides maintenance, grounds-keeping and janitorial services for the agency on a twenty-four hour on call basis.

At the time of this writing, the amount of the LHA's FFY 07 Capital Fund allocation is not yet known. It is known that there has been a steady decline in funding for this program since 2001. For planning purposes, we have projected a 2007 funding amount of \$590,244, which represents decrease from what we have so far been allocated for 2006.

For 2008-2011, we have projected an amount based on the President's 2008 budget which calls for a 17% reduction in the Capital Fund. We are estimating that we will receive \$491,452 per year for a total over four years of \$1,965,808. 10% of this total, or \$196,580, has been earmarked for administration, 20% of this total, or \$393,160, has been budgeted for operations, and the remainder for capital improvements and replacements. If the amount budgeted for operations is not needed for that purpose, then it would be re-programmed for physical improvements.

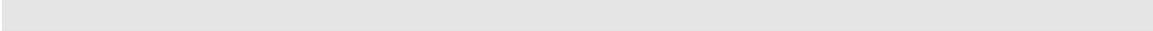

DECONCENTRATION POLICY

It is Lewiston Housing Authority's policy to provide for deconcentration of poverty and encourage income mixing by bringing higher income families into lower income developments and lower income families into higher income developments. Toward this end, we will skip families on the waiting list to reach other families with a lower or higher income. We will accomplish this in a uniform and non-discriminating manner.

The Lewiston Housing Authority will affirmatively market our housing to all eligible income groups. Lower income residents will not be steered toward lower income developments and higher income people will not be steered toward higher income developments.

Prior to the beginning of each fiscal year, we will analyze the income levels of families residing in each of our developments, the income levels of census tracts in which our developments are located, and the income levels of the families on the waiting list. Based on this analysis, we will determine the level of marketing strategies and deconcentration incentives to implement.

The Lewiston Housing Authority may offer one or more incentives to encourage applicant families whose income classification would help to meet the deconcentration goals of a particular development.

Various incentives may be used at different times, or under different conditions, but will always be provided in a consistent and nondiscriminatory manner.

- How the exemptions will be verified, both at the beginning of the program and as an ongoing part of program administration
- How compliance will be determined
- How non-compliance will be treated
- LHA's cooperation with other organizations.

Each year at the time of their annual recertification resident compliance with the community service requirement will be determined and exemption status will be reverified. Residents will be notified of this at least 90 days before the recertification date and required documentation will be specified in the notice. If a resident does not complete community service as required he or she will have one additional year to make up the required service. If the non-compliant resident does not do so or leaves the unit, lease termination proceedings will commence.

LHA has implemented the policy using the range of alternatives described in the regulations. The authority will directly administer some activities and make others available through contractors or partners.

The policy includes a description of qualifying work and self-sufficiency activities. These activities include: unsubsidized employment, subsidized private or public sector employment, on the job training, job search and job readiness assistance, vocational educational training, job skills training, education directly related to employment, attendance at a secondary school or GED program or provision of child care services to an individual participating in a community service program.

Pet Policy – Summary

Lewiston Housing Authority maintains separate pet policies for its elderly developments, pursuant to 24 CFR 5.300 – 380, and its family developments, pursuant to 24 CFR 960.701 – 707. Under the policy for the elderly developments, Blake Street Towers and Meadowview, common household pets are allowed with certain restrictions. Prior approval is required, only one pet per unit is allowed, pets are limited to 15 lbs., no dogs are allowed above the first floor, all pets must be spayed or neutered, evidence of registration and inoculations must be provided annually to LHA, all pets must be leashed if outside the unit, and a refundable pet deposit of \$100 is charged to offset any damages the pet may cause. Pet owners are required to clean up after their pets and responsible for controlling noise, odor, and infestations associated with pets. Pet owners must sign an agreement to hold the Lewiston Housing Authority harmless from any claims caused by an action or inaction of the pet. Assistive and companion animals for persons with disabilities are not covered by this policy as long as a member of the household has a disability and the animal assists with or is necessitated by the disability. Third party documentation is required.

The family policy is similar except that dogs are limited to 30 lbs and are not restricted to the first floor. Rottweilers, pit bulls, and attack or fight trained dogs are specifically excluded. In addition to the pet deposit, a non-refundable fee of \$60 will be charged annually. A waste removal fee of \$25 is charged for failure to dispose of pet waste properly.

Progress in Meeting the 5-Year Plan Mission and Goals

These achievements have served to increase the availability and quality of assisted housing.

Section 8 Project Based Vouchers**

Lewiston Housing Authority intends to use up to 90 vouchers as project based vouchers. These may be used in census tracts with a poverty rate of less than 20%, but consideration will be given in the selection process to projects in the Enterprise Community, i.e. Census Tracts 201 & 204, which the City of Lewiston has prioritized for housing rehabilitation and development. These vouchers will be used to promote development of housing which meets needs not normally met by tenant based vouchers. Examples would be housing development or rehabilitation projects or housing for persons with disabilities.

Comments of the Resident Advisory Board**

The Resident Advisory Board decided to meet in two separate groups, one for Section 8 and the other for public housing. Each group held a series of meetings and developed extensive comments.

Section 8 Comments

The board recommends that Lewiston Housing Authority establish a local preference for a Lewiston resident who has lived in the City of Lewiston for six months prior to the taking of applications.

The board recommends that five vouchers a year be reserved for citizens of Lewiston who have been displaced by fire, flood or natural disaster.

The board recommends that Lewiston Housing Authority include in their orientation packet information on renters insurance.

Lewiston Housing Authority responses to Section 8 comments

Lewiston Housing Authority believes that these are good, constructive suggestions and will further pursue these ideas.

Public Housing Comments

ME5-1 Blake Street Towers

Residents want a service coordinator. One resident wanted help with medications. Another suggested arranging for a public health nurse to come. There was concern that too many meals participants were eating in their apts and not coming down for meals. Several residents voiced concerns about conditions in their apartments such as walls that hadn't been painted since they moved in, floor tiles that had cracked, bathroom ceiling tiles that were cracked or deteriorated, and closet doors that come off tracks. One resident requested some of the old color of white paint so she could touch up her kitchen without repainting the whole room. It was reported that when the window contractors painted around the newly installed windows they did not paint the window sills. Two residents said they thought their smoke detectors were not working. Several tenants complained of odors of cigarette smoke. It was suggested that a fold-down chair be installed in the elevator. Residents asked for more information about the emergency phones in the elevators. One resident questioned whether a cell phone could open the front door. One resident stated that the tone of the memos announcing the \$25 fee for open windows was disrespectful.

ME5-2 Meadowview

Residents reported that the assignment of parking spaces was an improvement. The assessment of \$25 fees for open windows caused considerable concern. It was reported that the second floor apartments tended to be too hot and residents felt they should be permitted to open windows, at least briefly, to ventilate units. It was also reported that the units were quite dry and some residents operated humidifiers to combat the dryness. Cigarette odors were also cited as a cause for open windows. Some residents reported difficulty operating the new windows, especially the

bedroom windows, and reported problems with the installation of the windows such as trim that wasn't completed and hand prints left by the installers. It was observed that the casement windows in the bedrooms could not be washed from within the unit and that this was especially problematic for the second floor apartments. One resident complained that people were feeding squirrels. Runoff and moisture problems were reported in two locations in Circle 2. Water accumulates at the entry door to 281, freezing in winter. A damp smell comes up from the basement at this entry. The area around the dumpster in Parking Lot 2 is poorly drained. Water from the roof drain on the neighboring building flows into the dumpster area and freezes. The dumpster is not always returned to its pad. The nearby Friendly's dumpster often overflows and trash blows into the parking lot. In Parking Lot 3 the storm sewer appears to be clogged. Fern Cloutier's dumpster is often overflowing and the trash blows into the parking lot. The large tree overhangs the Parking Lot 3 dumpster and looks like the overhanging limbs could fall on cars. Additional lighting is requested for Parking Lot's 4 and 5. It was reported that two of the floodlights illuminating the sidewalk to Parking Lot 4 were out. Residents are not hearing the horns that are supposed to announce snow removal. Residents reported that Maintenance was not getting the snow cleared all the way down to the pavement and this was resulting in some icing on sidewalks.

ME5-3 Hillview, Rosedale, Lafayette Park

Residents would like a roto-tiller for their gardening activities. It was reported that young children were damaging the soccer nets and suggested that a stronger material be found. Fees for open windows generated concerns. The fairness of the charges and whether they were being uniformly assessed was questioned. Second floor rooms were said to be too hot. Caulking around new window was said to be insufficient and some windows were drafty as a result. Replacement of apartment doors, also drafty, was requested. One resident reported that her floor was replaced three years ago and needed to be replaced again because the tiles were not properly installed. A resident complained that Maintenance had blown snow (as well as pebbles and sand) on her window during snow removal in the last storm and thought that was careless and potentially dangerous. Lack of parental support and participation was cited as a potential limiting factor for future harvest dinners. Likewise it was observed that kids pull clothes off the clotheslines and their parents don't seem to stop them.

ME 5-5 & 5-6 Park, Ash, Whipple, Shawmut, Horton, Oak, Sabattus

It was suggested that additional storage rooms be created in the basement of 40 Whipple St. It was reported that the front hallway heater was not working. It was reported that although the driveway was opened up during a snowstorm, the plowing was not completed until the following day.

LHA Response to Public Housing Comments

LHA intends to address these concerns through a combination of ordinary maintenance and Capital Fund activities.
