Butler Metropolitan Housing Authority (“BMHA”) is uncertain about the funds we will receive from HUD, as well as where we are with all of the changes that are being suggested which is supposed to make everything work better. With this in mind we will do what ever necessary to provide the best possible services to our clientele.

BMHA is tearing down Bambo Harris and is hiring a developer and consultants to rebuild units through tax credits and other methods to re place the housing stock. We will again apply for a HOPE VI, if the funds are made available, we will not hire a consultant to do the application but we will put our application together with in house staff. This application will possibly focus on phasing in Riverside Homes to address revitalizing our two oldest developments.

We have reduced our staff by three employees and more than \$150,000.00 in an attempt to manage the cuts we have received and hope to see the positive results to our bottom line in the upcoming year. These are a few of the things that BMHA is doing to cut costs. The Authority is also continually taking suggestions from employees to help the agency save money.

BMHA will allow only domesticated dogs, cats, birds, and fish in aquariums (no larger than 20 gallons) in units. All dogs and cats must be neutered or spayed. Only one (1) pet per unit allowed.

Any animal deemed to be potentially harmful to the health or safety of others, including attack or fight trained dogs, or dangerous breeds will not be allowed. Dangerous breeds include but are not limited to, Pit Bulls, Chows, Akita's, Rottweillers, Dobermans, German Shepherds or any fighter breeds that are prohibited by local or state ordinance.

No animal may exceed thirty (30) pounds in weight nor exceed fifteen (15) inches shoulder to floor.

Pets must be appropriately inoculated against rabies and other conditions prescribed by local ordinances. Tenant must obtain a licensed veterinarian's certification that all shots for the animal are current; that the animal has no communicable diseases and that it is "pest-free".

A pet deposit of \$250.00 is required at the time of registering a pet. The deposit is refundable when the pet or the family vacates the unit, less any amounts owed due to damage beyond normal wear and tear.

Tony Blaine called the meeting to order at 1:30 p.m. and explained to everyone that this meeting was to discuss Butler Metropolitan Housing Authority's 2007 Annual and Five Year Plan.

Darlena Dishman requested a list of the 2007 Resident Council Officers. Janet Martin said she would mail her one.

Jeff Ranck explained about the Capital Fund Budget and asked if anyone had any questions.

Darlena Dishman brought up that there was a roach problem at J. Ross Hunt. She stated that when the exterminator came once a month there was no problem but since coming every three months the roaches are back.

Jim Rogers stated that this is not a complaint session and that everyone should know the complaint procedure. He said this meeting is to discuss the Annual Plan.

Dallas Moore stated that one of the most important things is the maintenance and that the properties need to be kept up. Deteriorating properties only causes low rentals.

Henry Dishman said they try to make the new residents feel welcome and that they have a Welcoming Committee that greets all new residents.

Joan Wright from Petty Plaza said that the residents tear down any signs that are posted.

Mr. Dishman stated that they need another maintenance man at their building. He stated that Jack does a good job but his back-up does not do as good a job. They are having some problems with the lock on the front door.

Jeff Ranck explained the budget with last year's amount. When the new amount comes out we are expecting a 20% cut.

Jim Rogers asked why we needed a new roof. Jeff stated that it was shot. Mr. Rogers asked how much it cost and Jeff stated a lot but he didn't know the exact amount.

Ron Powell asked about the container on the side of the building and when it would be removed. Jeff said he talked to the contractor yesterday (March 7th). Mr. Dallas asked Ms. Martin to see if you could get it removed.

Joan Wright asked about replacement of stoves. Jeff said there is money in the budget. He stated that new stoves and refrigerators were installed in Dayton Lane Gardens about six or seven years ago when Jim Avery, our consultant was still working with BMHA.

It was asked how they get a new stove or refrigerator. Mr. Ranck stated he did not know the procedure. Laverne Turner suggested the inspectors check them out and make a suggestion on whether a new one is justified or not.

Joan Wright asked if snow removal was in the CFP budget. It was stated that the Authority has a separate contract for snow removal.

Mr. Dishman asked about the elevators at J. Ross Hunt. Jeff stated he had all the elevators inspected by a consultant and was told that all elevators were okay. The consultant also stated that the Authority did not need to put a lot of money into them but to tighten the elevator maintenance contract. Also, a lot of the problems happen from the people abusing them.

Jim Rogers asked about the wheelchair residents on upper floors. Mr. Ranck said, per the Fire Marshall, the best place to be if there is a fire is in your apartment; put a towel under the door; and stay put until rescued from the balcony.

In going over the budget Mr. Blaine explained about a chiller going out that cost a lot of money and was not in the budget therefore putting other items on the back burner.

Jeff explained about the deteriorating at the Townhouse (cement blocks) which will cost a large chunk of change and will be a major job. Mr. Ranck also explained how hard it is to get contractors to do housing authority work.

Jim Rogers asked what is planned for the Dayton Lane Gardens in the next few years. Mr. Ranck stated: sliders on the balcony doors the first year 2008; furnaces replaced the second year; boilers replaced the third year; intercom system fixed in the fourth year. Later the rubber roof will be replaced and site lights.

Jeff Ranck explained the input on items comes from the residents, maintenance men and Property Managers.

Henry Dishman said he has had complaints on the lights not working properly in the back coming into the driveway. The Middletown Property Manager will notify maintenance and have them take a look and see what is wrong.

Darlana Dishman asked about beautification in front of the building. Mr. Ranck told her there is no budget for that. Mr. Blaine suggested contacting the 4H, Weed & Seed or any garden club to help. Jeff is to check out the water faucet in front of the building.

Tony Blaine informed everyone there would be a public meeting on March 15, 2007 @ 6:00 p.m. at the central office facility, 4110 Hamilton-Middletown Road, to discuss BMHA's 2007 Annual Plan and all is welcome to attend.

Mr. Blaine thanked everyone for coming and the meeting adjourned at 2:30 p.m.


