The repositioning of Riverside Apartments as a stable asset remains a high priority for the Authority. This may entail full demolition of the remaining 119 units and implementation of a replacement housing plan unless some financing plan can be identified that allows for the full investment required to bring the units back to a viable standard of condition.

Brief Statement of Progress in Meeting 5-Year Plan Mission and Goals

A new Executive Director, James J. Finnucan, was appointed in January of 2007. Prior to his arrival, the Board of Commissioners engaged Mapplan Associates for the purpose of developing a Master Plan for the redevelopment of Riverside Apartments. As a function of that process, nine monthly meetings were held with the residents of Riverside to discuss elements of the plan.

The Authority has received approval from HUD for the demolition of buildings one, two, and six. There are a total of 46 units in the three buildings. The units have been safely vacated and secured six months ahead of schedule. The majority of the residents relocated, selected Section Eight vouchers and secured apartments. The remaining residents chose to transfer to other Riverside buildings or other Authority Senior developments.

A number of modernization projects have been completed. The paving of the sidewalks at 15-3 has eliminated a safety hazard for the elderly residents. Additionally, the installation of fencing at the rear of the 15-3 Community Center has prevented youths from entering the property on dangerous bicycles and skate boards. The exteriors of four buildings in the 15-3 complex have been painted. The remaining structures are scheduled for painting in spring 2008.

The repair of the rear sidewalk at 15-2 has also eliminated a safety problem for the elderly. The exterior of the 15-2 complex has been freshly painted in the fall of 2007.

Attachment B – Pet Policy

No animals or pets of any kind shall be kept or allowed within an apartment or on the property of the Authority, except as provided and herein described in this policy relative to elderly/handicapped residents of John J. Stevens Apartments and Monsignor Hynes Apartments only, to the extent provided by 24 CFR Section 942.3(c). Absolutely no animals are permitted to be kept within an apartment or on the property of the Authority at Riverside Apartments (Olson Drive).

- A. Pets permitted include only the following: dog, household cat, birds, hamsters, fish and turtles. All pets must be properly caged or housed. Non-aquatic pets, except cats and dogs, shall be limited to two. One dog or cat is permitted, but not one of each.
- B. Before a dog or cat enters the home, the resident must receive written permission from the AHA. The AHA shall be provided with a description of the pet, the pet's name, weight and any other distinguishing marks. The resident must also sign a Pet Registration, a Pet Aftercare Agreement, and acknowledge receipt of the Pet Policy.
- C. Dogs must be spayed/neutered not later than eight months of age and cats not later than six months of age. Verifications of this must be provided to the AHA.
- D. Dogs and cats must be leashed at all times when outside.
- E. Dogs and cats must be inoculated as required by veterinarians for the following: 1. Dogs – rabies, distemper, hepatitis, parainfluenza, leptosporosis and parvo virus; 2. Cats - rabies, feline distemper, rhinotracheitis, calici virus and panleukopenia virus. The resident must provide the AHA with yearly vaccination updates at each annual review.
- F. Dogs must be licensed by the City of Ansonia, and the resident must provide the AHA with a copy of the license.
- G. Dogs and cats must have their nails clipped regularly. Dogs may not weigh over 15 pounds.
- H. The resident must clean up after their pet (including feces, vomit, furballs, etc.), both inside and outside the unit. Cat litter and animal waste must be properly disposed of by the resident.
- I. During annual income recertification, the resident must re-register their pet with the AHA and provide updated vaccination information.
- J. Resident is liable for any damages or injuries caused by their pet. The AHA assumes no responsibility for any damages or injuries to a person or property which is caused by the resident's pet.
- K. No pet may make excessive noise which interferes with their neighbor's peaceful enjoyment of their accommodations. Should complaints or problems arise as a result of a pet's occupancy of the unit, one warning will be issued to the resident. Further problems will result in the AHA requiring the resident to move the pet from the unit and premises permanently. Failure to comply may result in termination of tenancy.

- L. No pet that bites or attacks will be permitted. Pit bulls, Rottweilers and Dobermans are strictly prohibited.
- M. Pet visitation is allowed; however, the visitation becomes the liability of the resident. All rules are applicable to visiting pets with regard to size, number, vaccination, control and cleanup.
- N. No “pet houses” will be allowed outdoors on AHA property. Food and water dishes must be inside the unit and maintained in a clean and sanitary condition.
- O. These rules shall be rigidly enforced by the AHA. Failure to comply with these provisions can result in the removal of the pet or eviction of the resident.

Mr. James Finnucan began the meeting reviewing the Mission Statement in the 5 year plan. The Mission Statement is going to be rewritten. The final plan will contain the same principals such as equal opportunity and access to safe and affordable housing and homeownership opportunities. The Mission Statement will be presented to the Board of Commissioners for final approval.

Goals 1: The Public Housing Authority goal is to expand the supply of assisted housing and supporting principals are checked off.

There were no questions or comments for this goal.

Goal 2: Improve the quality of assisted housing, all but the last box has been checked off.

There were no questions or comments for this goal

Goal 3: To increase housing choices. The following goals are to provide an approved living environment, promote self sufficiency and asset development of assisted households and to ensure equal opportunity and affirmatively further fair housing.

The next statement is progress in meeting the 5 year plan of admissions and goals. That will be brought up to date. We will now move on to the annual plan.

Mr. Larry Thomas stated that the purpose of this meeting is to get resident and program participant's input for the agency plan. Resident Advisory Board provides the housing authority and the residents with a form for sharing information about the Ansonia Housing Authority's Annual Plan. A requirement under regulation 24cfr part 903 the PHA must establish a resident advisory board as part of the housing authority plans process. Resident Advisory Board Membership is comprised of individuals who reflect and represent the residents assisted by the authority either Public Housing or Section 8. The role of the advisory board is to assist the authority in developing the agencies plan and making modifications of the plan. There will be modifications and changes to the plan. Last years changes consisted of procedures and policies that we had in place, but needed to be modified. This year's modifications will pretty much encompass redevelopment, new establishments, and non-profits. The changes may be different this year.

The role of the Resident Advisory Board is to make recommendations. That is why we are soliciting your input in the development of the authority's plan. In order to facilitate collaboration, we will encourage you to participate in the planning process. Hopefully if you have questions now or anytime please notify the Ansonia Housing Authority. This can be done up until the time the plan is submitted.

There were no questions or comments.

Public Housing Statement of Housing Needs for Public Housing

Gwen Sims stated that our waiting list shows that we have more of a need for one and two bedroom units. Page 7, under Housing Needs for Families on the waiting list, 100% are low income families, 94 families are on our waiting list which includes those who are not elderly and 27 elderly families, 76 disabled families, the need for 1 bedroom 157, two bedroom is 158 total 205. Three and four bedroom has the least about of need. Our waiting list is currently closed. We are still accepting applications for elderly housing.

Mr. Steve Nakano stated that the Section 8 Waiting List totals are comprised figures from the Agency Plan. We are in the process of updating them. As you can see the large percentage of applicants on the waiting list do fall under the extremely low income category. Section 8 works with Low Income and Very Low Income. We follow HUDS guidelines that for every 4 people that we lease up at least 3 falls under the extremely low income category, which comprises 75% of the lease ups that HUD requires. The majority of people that we have on the waiting list by bedroom size fall under the 1 bedroom and 2 bedroom categories the next category 3 bedroom. The waiting list is currently closed and has been closed since December 1, 2006. We do not plan on opening the list in the coming year. There are certain cases on a case by case that could be placed on the waiting list even though it is closed. This might be reasonable accommodations.

Mr. Finnucan brought attention to the section of identifying needs and coming up with strategies to meet the needs. Need, is the shortage of affordable housing for all eligible populations; strategy is trying to maximize the number of affordable units available with our current resources, and trying to provide more housing for families at or below 40% of the average median income. Our strategy is to target all the available assistance we have to families at or below 30%. We need to target available needs to the elderly by trying to seek designation of public housing for the elderly and to give preference to the elderly in the housing choice voucher program. Families with disabilities, the strategy is to target the needs of families with disabilities. Races and ethnicity, with disproportionate housing needs would be to increase awareness of public housing authority resources among families of races and ethnicity with disproportionate needs.

Another strategy would be to conduct activities to affirmatively further fair housing. Reasons for selecting the strategies, as to how those strategies were chosen.

Financial Resources. There are three columns, which list the program source of income that comes into the authority and where it comes from. Column 1, lists program and source, column 2 lists income coming into the authority and where it comes from, such as public housing capital fund for modernization, management improvement and activities authorized under that program.

Section E is Section 8 population. Money that goes out in housing assistance payments and 494,000 administration fee authorities receives for running the program. The next item is FSS. The authority is not currently receiving funds for that program this year however; we have applied to be included for 2008.

The 558,645 is income for housing units, income from laundry, enterprise fee for running derby and Milford section 8 programs. The bottom shows the total amount of resources that comes into the Authority. These amounts will be updated before we submit the annual plan.

The next section is Public Housing Authority Policies concerning resident's eligibility, how they are selected, how they are admitted. Gwen will cover this area.

Gwen Sims: The Housing Authority first verifies applicant eligibility. As a family nears the top 4 of the waiting list, the housing authority at that time checks criminal background and credit report. We check with local housing authorities. We do not check with the FBI. We are not accepting applications for the family waiting list. We are accepting applications for elderly and disabled.

Gwen explained how rent is determined. What the housing authority charges for rent and ceiling rents.

Question: Larissa Watt

What about preference for homeless families?

Gwen responded:

Bill Passage asked how a preference is given.

Gwen responded:

Steve Nakano stated that as in public housing, Section 8 must also be sure that applicants meet eligibility criteria. The housing authority looks for prior program violations, drug charges, and outstanding program violations from other authorities. Families owing money to another housing authority would not be eligible to receive funding from another housing authority. Section 8 does not send out for criminal history, we do however check with the department of public safety. Sharing information with the Landlord, basically, the housing authority can only share information with the landlord if the tenant signs a release form giving permission to disclose information. Extensions for search time. The Ansonia Housing Authority does grant extensions. Vouchers are issued for 120 days, required by HUD. Admissions preferences. We do provide a preference to residents who work and live in the Ansonia area. Applicants are selected by a random lottery drawing. We use a person who has no affiliation with the Ansonia Housing Authority. When orientations are conducted, we explain the Section 8 Policies and Procedures.

Steve asked for questions. No questions.

Jim Finnucan then moved on to how rents for public housing are determined. Jim asked for questions.

Gwen stated that we do not have a minimum rent requirement. Anyone reporting 0 incomes must come in every 30 days for certification.

There were no comments or questions.

Jim Finnucan introduced Section B. Same information pertains to Section 8 how payments are determined.

Steve Nakano stated we use a payment standard that determines the housing subsidy. Every year payment standards change. We are at 90% of current fair market rent.

The housing authority needs to be assured that the fair market rents are reasonable enough for voucher holders to successfully secure an apartment.

There were no comments or questions.

Jim Finnucan introduced Section 5 Operations and Management.

Management structure of the Ansonia Housing Authority. This starts with the Board of Commissioners. The Board sets the policies it explains who reports to whom. We will get an organization chart together and finalize it. Section B indicates the HUD programs that are under the management of the housing authority. We do not have FSS this particular year but we will be applying and hopefully have it in 2008. Section C list policies that public housing authority has and have been adopted by the board of commissioners.

There were no comments or questions.

Jim Finnucan introduced Section 6 Grievance Procedure Part A

Gwen responded: The housing authority does have a grievance procedure. For admissions, any applicant who is denied housing may file a grievance requesting a hearing. A hearing will be scheduled giving the applicant the right to present documentation or other materials to assist the authority in deciding for the applicant.

There were no comments or questions.

Steve Nakano stated that Section 8 has a grievance procedure in place for applicants and participants. The regulations are found in CFR 24.982.551.

There were no comments or questions.

Jim Finnucan introduced Section 7 Capital Improvement Needs

Bill Passage, Modernization Coordinator stated we provide copies of current plans that are enforced every year and we also ask for the current ones for the next year. We look at what we would like to do and put it in the next 5 year plan hoping for more money than we usually receive. As the buildings, age needing more repairs but the money we get goes down every year. Ten years ago, we received a million dollars a year for capital improvements. We receive now a little under \$400,000 a year. We get less and less money for more requirements. The roofs at 15-1 are in terrible shape. We replaced one last year for 74,000.00. We had bids to replace two more of them but we do not have the funds. This year and last year we have spent approximately 80,000 most of it has gone to replace the boilers at 15-1. This is 7 or 8 percent of total budget. The boiler is in poor shape but we have to keep it running. The fire marshal looked at 15 -3. We spent 20,000 to improve and bring 15-3 up to code. We spent funds on upgrades, repairs, unexpected repairs and replacement. The playgrounds at 15-1 will be made safer, equipment will not be replaced. We have a relocation contract, it can't be used for demolition, but it may be used towards building new buildings. Modernization is an ongoing process. There is always upkeep.

There were no comments or questions.

Bill referred to 15-1, 15-2, and 15-3., Jim Finnucan explained, those are HUD codes assigned to each development. The Ansonia Housing Authority is housing authority number 15. 1 being Riverside, 2 being John J. Stevens and 3 being Monsignor Hynes.

Jim introduced Section 8, Demolition, and Disposition.

The boxes checked reflect what has happened to date. The AHA has received approval from HUD to demolish buildings. 1, 2, and 6 at Riverside Apts. As Bill indicated the board of commissioners engaged a consultant to study and evaluate the entire Riverside site. Proposals and recommendations will be forwarded to commissioners at the September meeting. The boxes designated explain where we are today.

There were no comments or questions

Jim introduced Section 9 Designation of Public Housing for occupancy by elderly families or families with disabilities.

Jim asked for questions. No questions.

Jim introduced Section 10 conversion of public housing to tenant based assistance. We are not involved in that.

Jim introduced Section 11 Homeownership Programs administered by the public housing authority. Does not apply..

Jim introduced Section 12 Public Housing Authority Community Service and Self Sufficiency Programs.

Vicky explained coordination efforts between agencies and tenants. We can't release any information without a release form. Services and Programs we did have an FSS Program, we do not have the funding at this time but we will have funding in place next year. The program is still ongoing.

Steve Nakano clarified the FSS issue.

Vicky explained we coordinate economic and self sufficiency programs. We do have a GED program run out of the Tinney Community Center. We run the after school program.

Vicky explained the safety procedures for public housing residents. The Ansonia Housing Authority at one time did have security officers at one time. That stopped based on funding cuts. We still work on safety and crime prevention measures; however, we rely on the tenants to inform us of incidents. We have a hearing procedure. It's difficult to enforce. We ask for tenant participation regarding crime. We send surveys, HUD requires us to send surveys. HUD does question the residents. Something more than a domestic dispute, we ask for assistance through the Ansonia Police Department. We had at one time the DEG program stopped. We still try to provide youth with activities to keep children off the street. Seniors are involved in block patrols. The housing authority coordinates with the Police.

Jim asked for questions. No questions.

Jim introduced Section 18 this is the annual report where recommendation from the advisory board will be included as an attachment. There is a provision wanting to know what the Authority plans to do with the recommendations.

Jim asked for comments.

Marisol Lugo-Sullivan inquired about the Tinny Center. She had heard that staff was let go.

Vicky responded that the staff is still in place. It is normal to release employees at the end of the year however we hire them back for the summer program.

Jim asked for further comments. No further comments.

Larry stated that the public hearing will be the 26th of July. We look for input. We are going to include all meetings that we have had throughout the year.

**ATTACHMENT S
RESIDENT ASSESSMENT (RASS) FOLLOW-UP PLAN**

SAFETY (not required, but added by Authority due to its high level of priority in operations)

- 1. The Housing Authority's approaches to making people feel safe.**
 - a. AHA has implemented a new pilot program with the Ansonia Police Department to work directly with AHA staff and security personnel, and provide a greater, more visible police presence at all of our public housing complexes.**
 - b. We have implemented new techniques regarding community policing at the AHA. This allows police officers to walk with AHA security throughout our complexes, whereby the police officers get to know our residents individually. The approach appears to be paying off. We see more cooperation between staff, police and our residents.**

- 2. The Housing Authority's approaches to making people feel safe and secure in their own homes.**
 - a. Senior staff people meet weekly to discuss any safety concerns or activity at the developments. We are reviewing and inspecting all locking devices in an effort to report and replace all defective locking devices.**
 - b. Better communication is developing between staff and residents through senior managers' attendance of monthly resident meetings, where concerns are heard and responded to.**
 - c. Improve police and security effectiveness by increasing presence and patrolling during varying hours.**
 - d. Improve staff visibility by conducting of frequent walk-through for each development.**

- 3. The Housing Authority's approaches to making people feel safe by improving poor lighting.**
 - a. Security has been instructed to report anytime a light is out.**
 - b. Maintenance has been instructed to report and fix all broken lighting.**
 - c. Residents have been instructed to notify the main office when lights are out.**
 - d. Modernization department will review whether more lighting can and should be installed in exterior and porch areas.**
 - e. A United Illuminating grant was sought and received to install improved lighting.**

- 4. The Housing Authority's approaches to making people feel safe by adequate screening of potential tenants.**

- a. **Housing Authority performs a criminal history check from the State's database for all applicants, as well as a credit report which also indicates known arrests and/or convictions, evictions, and poor rental or payment histories.**
 - b. **When available or necessary, local, out-of-state and federal checks are also performed.**
 - c. **The LIPH Admissions and Continued Occupancy Plan is being reviewed and will be updated to provide strict written policies outlining causes of denial and/or termination of tenancy, and time frames for denial of applicants for various causes.**
5. **The Housing Authority's approaches to make people feel safe through educational seminars to alert residents of existing crime prevention programs.**
 - a. **Staff attending resident meetings to open communication for resident input into safety issues.**
 - b. **AHA will hold security and/or crime prevention meetings with the local police. This has already been implemented and is a large success. Resident representatives may be asked to attend to provide input in the future.**

NEIGHBORHOOD APPEARANCE

1. **The Housing Authority's approaches to improve our residents' perceptions of their homes.**
 - a. **AHA is reviewing the feasibility of purchasing or leasing a portable toilet in an effort to deter public urination and defecation in stairwells, walkways and hallways**
 - b. **Resident meetings, questionnaires or surveys may be conducted to determine their concerns and perceptions on these issues.**
 - c. **Residents have been notified to remove all trash from stairwells and balconies outside their units, and AHA maintenance staff will remove garbage or belongings from these areas at resident expense if not maintained.**
 - d. **The number of maintenance staff has been increased to improve site conditions.**
2. **The Housing Authority's approaches to improve our residents' perception of the exterior of their buildings.**
 - a. **All balconies are power washed on a routine and as-needed basis.**
 - b. **Maintenance staff conducts a walk through and notes each development's condition daily, and allots time and staff as required to keep grounds and buildings clean.**

- c. Security personnel report any unusual or notably poor conditions.
 - d. Graffiti is removed within 24 hours.
 - e. Additional dumpsters or more frequent trash pickup is being looked into to decrease garbage collecting around the dumpster areas and decrease rodent activity.
 - f. A litter vacuum has been procured which significantly improves pickup of even small debris such as broken glass, and will dramatically decrease the time and staff needed to clean a development thoroughly. This vacuum can be used as frequently as required to keep the developments clean.
3. The Housing Authority's approaches to improving our residents' perceptions of parking areas.
- a. A contract has been entered into for removal of abandoned cars.
 - b. Security has been notified to keep written reports on all vehicles that appear abandoned.
 - c. Logs are maintained by security personnel regarding abandoned cars, trash, or glass or anything that is potentially dangerous in common and parking areas.
4. The Housing Authority's approach to improving our residents' perceptions of unnecessary noise.
- a. Grievance hearings are conducted frequently, addressing all complaints regarding tenants who do not abide by the provisions of their lease. Residents are held accountable for the conduct of their household members as well as their guests.
 - b. All tenants who do not respect the quiet enjoyment of the other tenants are placed under eviction.
5. The Housing Authority's approaches to improving our residents' perceptions of pest control.
- a. Work orders are reviewed daily and on a weekly basis for completion, with pest control and infestation issues given high priority.
 - b. Residents will receive educational information on what they may be able to do to aide in pest and infestation prevention.
 - c. A quarterly contract is being sought for infestation/pest control.
6. The Housing Authority's approaches to improving our residents' perceptions of trash and litter problems.
- a. Unit turn-around has been improved through increased staffing.
 - b. A full-time groundskeeper has been employed and is visible and onsite at developments every day.

- c. Correspondence and dialogue with residents and the tenant associations, as many complaints regarding litter/trash are actually due to tenant behavior which better internal neighborhood monitoring and self-policing would vastly improve.

COMMUNICATION

1. The Housing Authority's approaches to improve our residents' perceptions of our responsiveness to their questions and concerns:
 - a. Distribute a quarterly newsletter informing residents of planned and completed projects at the various properties.
 - b. Provide better notice of special events and invite suggestions from residents for same.
2. The Housing Authority's approach to improve our residents' perceptions of whether we are courteous or professional:
 - a. Stress the need to be professional and courteous at weekly staff meetings.
 - b. Answer all questions and letters from residents in a professional and timely manner.
 - c. Encourage residents to report incidents of non-professional behavior to management.
3. The Housing Authority's approach to improve our residents' perceptions of our support to the resident/tenant organization:
 - a. Encourage staff to attend resident/tenant meetings to answer questions and show Authority support of the organization.

ATTACHMENT T - Community Service Policy

GENERAL

In order to be eligible for continued occupancy, each adult family member must either (1) contribute eight hours per month of community service (not including political activities) within the community in which the public housing development is located, or (2) participate in an economic self-sufficiency program unless they are exempt from this requirement

EXEMPTIONS

The following adult family members of tenant families are exempt from this requirement.

- A. Family members who are 62 or older
- B. Family members who are blind or disabled
- C. Family members who are the primary care giver for someone who is blind or disabled
- D. Family members engaged in work activity
- E. Family members who are exempt from work activity under part A title IV of the Social Security Act or under any other State welfare program, including the welfare-to-work program
- F. Family members receiving assistance under a State program funded under part A title IV of the Social Security Act or under any other State welfare program, including welfare-to-work and who are in compliance with that program

NOTIFICATION OF THE REQUIREMENT

The Ansonia Housing Authority shall identify all adult family members who are apparently not exempt from the community service requirement.

The Ansonia Housing Authority shall notify all such family members of the community service requirement and of the categories of individuals who are exempt from the requirement. The notification will provide the opportunity for family members to claim and explain an exempt status. The Ansonia Housing Authority shall verify such claims.

The notification will advise families that their community service obligation will begin upon the effective date of their first annual reexamination on or after 10/1/99. For family's paying a flat rent, the obligation begins on the date their annual reexamination would have been effective had an annual reexamination taken place. It will also advise

them that failure to comply with the community service requirement will result in ineligibility for continued occupancy at the time of any subsequent annual reexamination.

VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES

Community service includes performing work or duties in the public benefit that serve to improve the quality of life and/or enhance resident self-sufficiency, and/or increase the self-responsibility of the resident within the community.

An economic self sufficiency program is one that is designed to encourage, assist, train or facilitate the economic independence of participants and their families or to provide work for participants. These programs may include programs for job training, work placement, basic skills training, education, English proficiency, work fare, financial or household management, apprenticeship, and any program necessary to ready a participant to work (such as substance abuse or mental health treatment).

The Ansonia Housing Authority will coordinate with social service agencies, local schools, and the Human Resources Office in identifying a list of volunteer community service positions.

Together with the resident advisory councils, the Ansonia Housing Authority may create volunteer positions such as hall monitoring, litter patrols, and supervising and record keeping for volunteers.

THE PROCESS

At the first annual reexamination on or after October 1, 1999, and each annual reexamination thereafter, the Ansonia Housing Authority will do the following:

- A. Provide a list of volunteer opportunities to the family members.
- B. Provide information about obtaining suitable volunteer positions.
- C. Provide a volunteer time sheet to the family member. Instructions for the time sheet require the individual to complete the form and have a supervisor date and sign for each period of work.
- D. Assign family members to a volunteer coordinator who will assist the family members in identifying appropriate volunteer positions and in meeting their responsibilities. The volunteer coordinator will track the family member's progress monthly and will meet with the family member as needed to best encourage compliance.
- E. The volunteer coordinator will advise the Ansonia Housing Authority on a monthly basis whether each applicable adult family member is in compliance with the community service requirement.

NOTIFICATION OF NON-COMPLIANCE WITH COMMUNITY SERVICE REQUIREMENT

The Ansonia Housing Authority will notify any family found to be in noncompliance of the following:

- A. The family member(s) has been determined to be in noncompliance;
- B. That the determination is subject to the grievance procedure; and
- C. That, unless the family member(s) enter into an agreement to comply, the lease will not be renewed or will be terminated.

OPPORTUNITY FOR CURE

The Ansonia Housing Authority will offer the family member(s) the opportunity to enter into an agreement prior to the anniversary of the lease. The agreement shall state that the family member(s) agrees to enter into an economic self-sufficiency program or agrees to contribute to community service for as many hours as needed to comply with the requirement over the past 12-month period. The cure shall occur over the 12-month period beginning with the date of the agreement and the resident shall at the same time stay current with that year's community service requirement. The first hours a resident earns goes toward the current commitment until the current year's commitment is made.

The volunteer coordinator will assist the family member in identifying volunteer opportunities and will track compliance on a monthly basis.

If any applicable family member does not accept the terms of the agreement, does not fulfill their obligation to participate in an economic self-sufficiency program, or falls behind in their obligation under the agreement to perform community service by more than three (3) hours after three (3) months, the Ansonia Housing Authority shall take action to terminate the lease.
