Resident comments – the Resident Advisory Board was in complete agreement regarding the priorities for the 2008 fiscal year as presented by HRHA staff. Long-term goals as presented in the Five-Year Plan were also agreed to. Individual comments are presented in the body of the Plan.

PET POLICY

I. POLICY STATEMENTS

A. This order serves as Hopewell Redevelopment and Housing Authority's (HRHA) guide for carrying out the requirements of the Quality Housing and Work Responsibility Act which provides for the ownership and keeping of common household pets in federally assisted public housing.

B. Exclusion

No part of this order will be applicable to animals that assist the handicapped. These animals are not considered to be pets, but rather, aids necessary to ensure the independence of handicapped individuals. HRHA requires that the need for an animal that assists a handicapped individual be attested to by a certified health care practitioner. HRHA also requires that a handicapped individual must properly care for the animal. Proper care includes, but is not limited to feeding and exercising the animal, and the immediate clean up of animal feces. The following provisions of the Pet Policy also apply to residents who maintain a specially trained animal as a handicapped aid:

- Licensure and Tags
- Registration Process - excluding requirement of having animal altered)
- Liability
- Alternate Caretaker
- Sanitation
- Pet Behavior
- Leashes
- Sick or injured pets
- Rule enforcement

II. DEFINITIONS

A. Common household pet means any domesticated small animal traditionally kept in the home for pleasure rather than for utility or commercial purposes.

"Pet" is understood to be limited to dogs under 20 lbs., (certain breeds such as Dalmatians, German Shepherds, Pit Bulls, Rotweillers, Greyhounds, Dobermans, and Afghans will not be allowed), litter-box trained domestic cats, birds (specifically parakeets, canaries or finches), small caged rodents (specifically hamsters or guinea pigs), and fish. No other type of animal may be maintained in HRHA housing or on HRHA property. These rules, in compliance with federal regulations, distinguish cats and dogs, from other pets, as "fur bearing" animals. Except where otherwise indicated, these rules apply principally to dogs and cats.

III. PET RESTRICTIONS

No more than one fur bearing pet is permitted in an apartment. There may be no more than two birds or small caged animals per apartment. No limit is placed on the number of fish; however, the size of the fish tank may not exceed 20 gallons. Guests are not permitted to bring any type of pet onto the premises.

IV. LOCATION OF PETS IN BUILDINGS

There is no restriction on the total number of pets in any building. There will be no restriction on the location of the fish, small birds and small caged animals in the building. Pets will not be permitted in public meeting or community rooms, dining areas, laundry rooms or other public gathering places. Dogs must be properly leashed at all times when outside rental units and on HRHA premises. All pets must reside in owner's residence; pets may not be left unattended outside the apartment.

V. SIZES

Dogs shall weigh no more than 20 pounds at time of maturity and stand no more than 24 inches at the shoulders. Pets acquired as puppies shall be understood to mature at the height and weight not to exceed the height and weight restrictions. The American Kennel Club's standards shall determine the height and weight after maturity of the breed. A non-documented animal will be assumed to mature to that which has been determined by veterinarian evidence and sent to management in a signed letter.

VI. LICENSURE AND TAGS

Every dog and cat must wear the appropriate local animal license, a valid rabies tag and a tag bearing owner's name, address and phone number. All licenses and tags must be current.

VII. ADMISSION OF PETS

Pets will be permitted after the resident has met all of the requirements. Subsequent to the adoption of the Pet Policy, no resident will be permitted to have pet, unless all of the requirements outlined in Sections I through XIX have been met.

VIII. REGISTRATION PROCESS

Prior to admittance of any pet into the facility, residents or applicants will be required to complete the "Pet Ownership Application" form (refer to Form "A"). Every dog and cat must be registered (refer to Form "B" - Pet Ownership Determination), with Management prior to admission, and thereafter, during the annual recertification of income and family composition. Registration of dogs and cats requires proof of current dog and cat licensure, including up-to-date proof on inoculations. Cats must have current inoculations, as appropriate to the species, including, but not limited to, feline distemper shots, worm shots and rabies shots. Dogs shall have certificates of appropriate inoculations for heartworm, parvo, distemper and rabies. Such tests, vaccines or shots shall be maintained on an annual basis, unless otherwise specified by a veterinarian. A verification letter that a cat or dog had been spayed or neutered is required prior to admission. The Veterinarian verification form exhibited as Form "C" shall be completed and signed by a Veterinarian in order to fulfill the requirements referenced above. Evidence of a flea control program and verification of an alternate caretaker are also required as discussed below. The above-stated requirements for registration shall be compiled with at the residents expense.

IX. ALTERING

Female dogs and cats over six months of age must be spayed, and males over six months must be neutered, unless a letter is received from a licensed veterinarian giving a medical reason why such action is detrimental to the pet's health.

X. LIABILITY

Residents owning pets shall be liable for the entire amount of all damages to HRHA property caused by their pet and all cleaning, de-fleaing and deodorizing required because of such pet. Pet owner's shall be strictly and solely liable for the entire amount of any injury to the person or property of other residents, staff of visitors of HRHA caused by their pet, and shall indemnify HRHA for all costs of litigation and attorney's fees resulting from such damage.

XI. SECURITY DEPOSIT

Prior to the admittance of any pet, the resident or applicant must pay a pet security deposit of \$100. This sum will be held until the pet is removed from the premises. Management will assess any damage(s) created by the pet against the pet security deposit.

XII. ALTERNATE CARETAKER

Prior to the admittance of any pet, the resident or the applicant must provide to HRHA a notarized agreement between the resident and another person who agrees to serve as an Alternate Caretaker (refer to Form "D" for the Alternate Caretaker Form). The Alternate Caretaker shall have the responsibility to act as a temporary or permanent caretaker for the pet, if the resident is unable to care for the pet. Family residents cannot be alternate caretakers unless they care for the pet in the elderly/handicapped building where the pet owner resides. If the health or safety of a pet is threatened by the death or incapacitation of the pet owner, or by other factors that may render the pet owner unable to care for their pet, HRHA may contact the responsible party listed in the above-referenced agreement and have them remove the pet from the premises. If HRHA has made reasonable efforts to contact the Alternate Caretaker, but that party is unable or unwilling to care for the pet, then HRHA may enter the dwelling unit, remove the pet and place the pet with a facility that will provide care and shelter at the resident's expense for no more than 14 days. At the expiration of the 14-day period, said pet may be disposed of at the residents expense, i.e., euthanasia or giving said pet to any person willing to accept it. In no event will HRHA be responsible for the pet during transport or acceptance of the pet by the shelter facility. Costs will be deducted from the pet security deposit.

XIII. SANITATION

Dogs and cats are required to be "house-broke". Cats must be litter-box trained, and dogs must be able to exercise outside the building. Pet owners shall be responsible for the immediate clean up of feces after the exercise of their dog. Resident dog owners must bag and securely tie the dog feces and deposit it in the trash totes. Cat owners shall bag "kitty litter", tie it securely and drop it in specified trash receptacles. An example of improperly disposed waste includes, but is not limited to, flushing the kitty litter in the toilet. Pet owners must, at all times, keep their apartment free from odors resulting from pet excrement and urine. If an odor problem is persistent, then the resident, at their expense, will have their apartment deodorized.

XIV. PET BEHAVIOR

Certain characteristics of pets may be very offensive to other residents. To ensure the health, safety and peaceful enjoyment of other residents, the following list includes, but is not limited to, examples of pet behavior that will be unacceptable in HRHA Housing and would result in lease termination:

1. Barking and/or whining dogs.
2. Crying and/or "catwauling" cats.

3. Biting, attacking or other displays of aggressive behavior.

XV. LEASHES

Dogs shall be on hand-held leashes at all times when outside the confines of the pet's own apartment.

XVI. SICK OR INJURED PETS

No sick or injured pets will be accepted for occupancy without consultation and written acknowledgment of a veterinarian as to the condition of the pet's ability to live in an apartment situation. Acceptance regardless of documentation and consultation is the prerogative of the management. Admitted pets which suffer illness or injury must be immediately taken for veterinary care at the resident's pet owner's expense.

XVII. RULE ENFORCEMENT

Any resident who receives a letter of violation of these Pet Rules and letter of intent describing the violation(s) from HRHA's Management may be required, after private conference, to remove the pet from the premises and provide Management with an affidavit stating that the dog or cat is no longer on the premises and will not return in the future. Misrepresentation of this affidavit will be grounds for eviction of the resident. Management exercises the right to act immediately in insisting that an offending pet be removed forthwith in situations deemed to be of an emergency nature. In such instances, Management will act as specified in Section XIV "Alternate Caretaker" in removing sick, diseased, injured and/or aggressive animals. The failure of the pet owner to cooperate with any of the above operations will result in the termination of the lease agreement between HRHA and the pet-owning resident.

XVIII. UNIT IDENTIFICATION

Resident owner of properly registered fur bearing pet must display HRHA provided decal on their window as directed by Maintenance Department personnel.

Pet Policy remains in effect. Required statement as follows:

1. policy was effective April 1, 2001

2. Pets must be registered with the Authority with evidence of registration, vaccinations and neutering/spaying
3. definition of “pets” is provided in the Policy
4. limits one fur-bearing pet per household.
5. established a 20-pound weight limit for dogs
6. requires a \$100 refundable security deposit

Community Service Requirements – re-implemented 10/01/2004. Required statement as follows

1. policy was made effective April 1, 2001, suspended in 2002 and re-implemented following appropriate notice to residents.

3. requires 8 hours of service and allows greatest choice possible in identifying opportunities including self-certification.

In general, residents refuse to cooperate. Records of participation are maintained. Files are being prepared as suggested during Sept. review. Proper re-coding being accomplished as well.

5-year goals and objectives:

1. Alliances and communication – continue to do well maintaining old relationships while cultivating new ones. New relationships important in securing new grant for senior programs.
2. Occupancy goals not realized due to continuing high turnover. Aggressive lease turnover due to one-strike actions is a significant factor.
3. UPCS implemented in Maintenance
4. Reduction in crime is being maintained but only because of afterglow of PHDEP which has been discontinued.

5. Outreach efforts and Fair Housing Forums were of limited success. Different delivery mechanisms and cooperation with the City may help.
6. High performer status not realized and it is not likely to be realized because of budget cuts adversely affecting financial indicator, resident-installed a/c units adversely affecting physical indicator, and high turnover rate affecting both. High performer status for the physical indicator is not attainable due to scoring criteria and inspection methodology.

Resident Commissioner – Ms. Queen Harris, 1A Texas Street, Hopewell, VA 23860 continues to serve and will be reappointed in October 2008

RASS – (from 06, 07 scores not published) A 70% rating was noted in “appearance” category. Pending availability of funds, property beautification efforts will commence with the start of the spring grounds maintenance program. A 73% rating was noted in “safety.” We will redouble our efforts to work with law enforcement to enhance the perception of safety in our properties. (Same circumstance as in 07-08 Plan.)

Deconcentration – No change. The Housing Authority gathers and assesses the resident characteristics of its public housing stock, including information regarding household income. This analysis is used to determine if there has been a significant change in the income characteristics of a particular project. The most recent annual analysis showed that all family developments had average family income within the established income range (average incomes above or below 85% to 115% of the average incomes of all housing authority developments.) Furthermore, all family developments have average family income under 30% of the area median income. Therefore, no development is to be redesignated as a higher or lower income development and the Authority

has met its deconcentration goals. (Had the analysis indicated a need for a particular designation, the Authority would have used its flat rent policy to facilitate deconcentration.)

Voluntary Conversion – No change. Required assessments were completed for Davisville (96 units), Thomas Rolfe Court(76 units), Bland Court (24 units), Thomas Rolfe Court Extension (60 units), Langston Park (36 units) and Piper Square (103 units). In all cases, it was found that conversion

would be inappropriate because it would have an adverse impact upon the community and would adversely impact the availability of affordable housing in the community.

Audit/corrective action plan – There were no findings in the audit for the fiscal year ended March 31, 2007 and no corrective plan is needed. There are no findings from previous audit years with findings which have not been cleared.

Significant Deviation _ Per 24 CFR 903.7®, the Authority's definition of substantial deviation and significant amendment or modification of the 5-year plan and the annual plan is as follows:

1. changes to rent or admissions policies or organization of the waiting list
2. additions of non-emergency work items (items not intended in the current 5-year action plan or the current annual statement, as appropriate) or change in the use of replacement reserve funds under the Capital Fund
3. any change with regard to demolition or disposition, designation, homeownership programs or conversion activities.

The following was incorporated into the Section 8 Administrative Plan and the Public Housing Admissions and Continued Occupancy Policy

Violence Against Women Act(VAWA)

In January 2006, President Bush signed a law known as the Violence Against Women and Department of Justice Reauthorization Act of 2005. This law creates new protections for victims of domestic violence, dating violence and stalking who are residents in public housing.

The following are set forth as the HRHA VAWA POLICY

1. **Admissions:**

- HA may not deny admission to a public housing project to any applicant on the basis that the applicant is or has been the victim of domestic violence, dating violence, or stalking.

2. **Lease Terms:**

- An incident or incidents of actual or threatened domestic violence, dating violence, or stalking will not be considered to be a “serious or repeated” violation of the lease by the victim or threatened victim of that violence and will not be good cause for terminating the tenancy or occupancy rights of the victim of that violence.
- Tenancy will not be terminated as a result of criminal activity, if that criminal activity is directly related to domestic violence, dating violence or stalking engaged in by a member of household, a guest or another person under tenants control, and tenant or an immediate family member is the victim

Limitations:

- Tenancy **may be** terminated if the housing authority can demonstrate “an actual and imminent threat” to other tenants or to persons employed at or providing services to the development.
- So long as a more demanding standard is not applied, tenancy **may be** terminated for lease violations that are not based on an incident or incidents of domestic violence, dating violence or stalking for which VAWA provides protections.
- Claims of protection under VAWA against termination of tenancy must be accompanied by a certification concerning the incident or incidents that may raise VAWA protections.

Failure to deliver this certification within the time allowed, will result in forfeiture of legal protections under VAWA

3. **Certification:** Certification may be by completion of a HUD-approved form, provided by the housing authority, or a police report or court record, or a professional person having been consulted about the domestic violence, dating violence or stalking provide documentation. **Certification, in one of these three ways, must be received within 14 business days after receipt of the housing authority's request for certification.**
4. **Confidentiality:** Information provided about an incident or incidents of domestic violence, dating violence or stalking will be held by the housing authority in confidence and not shared without consent, except that this information may be disclosed in an eviction proceeding or otherwise necessary to meet the requirements of law.
5. **Removal of Perpetrator of Physical Violence:** VAWA contains a new provision of federal law that allows that housing authority to terminate the tenancy of, and evict, an individual tenant or other lawful occupant who engages in criminal acts of physical violence against family members. This action may be taken against the individual alone, without evicting, terminating the tenancy of, removing or otherwise penalizing other household members.

Definitions of Terms:

Domestic Violence: Includes felony or misdemeanor crimes of violence committed by a current or former spouse of the victim, by a person with whom the victim share a child in common, by a person who is cohabitated with or has cohabited with the victim as a spouse, by a person similarly situated to a spouse of the victim under the domestic or family violence laws of the jurisdiction receiving grant monies, or by any other person against an adult or youth victim who is protected from that person's acts under the domestic or family violence laws of the jurisdiction.

Dating Violence: Violence committed by a person:

- (A) who is or has been in a social relationship of a romantic or intimate nature with the victim; and
- (B) where the existence of such a relationship shall be determined based on a consideration of the following factors: (i) the length of the relationship; (ii) the type of relationship; and (iii) the frequency of interaction between the persons involved in the relationship.

Stalking: to follow, pursue, or repeatedly commit acts with the intent to kill, injure, harass, or intimidate; or to place under surveillance with the intent to kill, injure, harass, or intimidate another person; and in the course of, or as a result of, such following, pursuit, surveillance, or repeatedly committed acts, to place a person in reasonable fear of the death of, or serious bodily injury to, or to cause substantial emotional harm to (i) that person; (ii) a member of the immediate family of that person; or (iii) the spouse or intimate partner of that person.

Immediate Family Member: a spouse, parent, brother or sister, or child of the person or an individual to whom that person stands in loco parentis (in place of a parent); or any other person living in the household of that person and related to that person by blood or marriage.
