Include a report on the progress the PHA has made in meeting the goals and objectives described in the previous 5-Year Plan.</p> <p>The Hollywood Housing Authority’s (HHA) first Goal is to expand the supply of Assisted Housing in the next five years by:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Goal number 1, applying for Additional Vouchers during the next five years, specifically an increase of 100 vouchers or more. 2. Goal number Two, leverage private or other public funds to create additional housing opportunities by acquisition or building of units. 3. The Third Goal is to retain high performance status in Public Housing Management (PHAS score), retain high performance status under the Voucher Management (SEMAP score system) and renovate or modernize public housing units. 4. The Fourth Goal is to increase assisted housing choices by providing voucher mobility counseling, conduct outreach efforts to potential voucher landlords thereby increasing quantity and quality of choice. 5. The Fifth Goal is to improve community quality of life and economic vitality. Objectives for this Goal include; Implementing measures to de-concentrate poverty by bringing higher income households in Public Housing units and blend them with lower income households, implementing public housing security improvements, designating development or certain buildings for potential resident groups i.e. Senior only Bldg. 6. PHA Goal number Six is to promote self-sufficiency and asset development of assisted households. The objective here will be to assist our families in providing supportive services to improve employability and to utilize excess land to enable our affiliate to create a senior complex with low income tax credits and other future projects. 7. The Seventh and final Goal is to ensure equal opportunity to Housing for all persons. PHA Goals include taking measures to ensure access to assisted housing regardless of race, color, religion, nationality, sex, familial status and disability and to take affirmative measures to provide a suitable living environment for families living in assisted housing regardless of race, color, religion, national origin, sex, familial status, and disability. <p style="text-align: center;"><u>Progress Report on Former Five Year Plan</u></p> <p>PHA Goal 1. Increasing the supply of assisted housing was accomplished by adding 100 additional vouchers during this time frame (2005-2009). By leveraging private and public funds our proposed ALF was modified and we were awarded tax credits for a senior complex financed by 9% housing tax credits in the amount of 2 million dollars thereby, allowing us to build 120 new housing units consisting of 60 one bedrooms and 60 two bedroom units.</p> <p>PHA Goal 2. Increasing the quality of assisted living objectives: High performing agency status was reached for public housing management by obtaining a PHAS score for high performer 2005-2009. Voucher management (SEMAP) was obtained by receiving high performance status 2005-2009. Increased customer satisfaction was assisted by having a quarterly newsletter to residents of public housing. Renovation of public housing units was accomplished during the aforementioned timeframe by filing for various grants. Grants from Broward County totaled \$100,000 for Apollo Terrace (family public Housing) installing central air conditioning and the replacements of roofs at that complex. During 2008 the HHA applied for and was awarded \$400, 000.00 for window and door replacement with high impact glass at Driftwood Terrace. Serving as both storm protection and security. In 2009 HHA received \$198,000 in Federal Stimulus funds, which will be used to refurbish all the bathrooms at Driftwood Terrace. In addition, eight cameras throughout this complex will add additional security for the complex. Further, all common areas will be retiled and roof repairs will be made.</p> <p>PHA Goal 3. Increase housing choices reflect objectives to provide voucher mobility counseling, outreach to potential landlords and implementing home ownership program. In a partnership with the City of Hollywood’s Lease Purchase program the HHA has bought four houses with financial assistance from the City. The first potential homeowner will be assuming the mortgage and title in February of 2010. All four homes were bought in the last five years. In addition, the HHA initiated a Voluntary FSS Program approximately nine years ago. The HHA has received grants for this process since its inception. HHA received no vouchers from HUD and is only the 3rd HA in the state with a voluntary program. This program allows the Housing Authority to help assist a participant in building a bank account. The HHA FSS coordinator monitors the clients’ increased earned income. Twenty-two participants have bought homes two have bought cars and ten have improved their finances so that they voluntarily have left the Section 8 program. In addition the HHA applied for and received \$200,000 from the State of Florida to serve 14 families for two years with temporary vouchers following Hurricane Wilma.</p> <p>PHA Goal 4. Provide an improved quality of life and economic vitality. As described in our last 2005-2009 five year plan our program has implemented incoming mixing in both our Senior Project and Multi-Family project known as Apollo Terrace Apartments. Implementation of increased security has taken the form at Driftwood by security cameras and a card entry system. When finished there will be a total of eight cameras both interior and exterior on the grounds. For Driftwood Terrace (resident requested) Designation of Driftwood Terrace was to be Senior only (62 or above). All disabled clients in the building or on our Waiting List were allowed to stay beyond the designation date.</p> <p>PHA Goal 5. Promote self-sufficiency of assisted families and individuals. See above FSS program and the building of 120 units for Senior Housing. In addition Apollo Terrace (Multi-Family) has a preference for working families.</p> <p>PHA Goal 6. and PHA Goal 7. Ensure Equal Opportunity and affirmatively further Fair Housing. Measures taken towards this goal include doubling the number of landlords on the Section 8 Program by advertising our Section 8 Program. This was accomplished by advertising on the City of Hollywood cable station and seeking out groups of Realtors to increase the pool of housing for all clients. In addition the Housing Authority has created its own web page so that prospective clients may review information on the programs available and the availability of units accepting voucher holders. This helps to insure access to assisted housing. In addition training from Hope Inc, NAHRO, SERC and HUD to HHA staff provide knowledge of Federal Regulations and State law involving access to assisted housing free of discrimination from race, color, religion, national origin, sex, familial status or disability. The HHA further takes all steps possible in assisting clients in complaints involving Fair Housing by assisting with complaint forms to the Miami Field Office, Atlanta office and Broward County. In 2005 the Hollywood Housing Authority partnered with Henderson Mental Health Center and with financial assistance from Broward County and HUD started the first and only SRO project in the County. The project is a former hotel that has been rehabbed and consists of forty units of permanent housing.</p>

Building of the project will necessitate filing an Application with the Special Application Center for the Demolition and/or Disposition as the present Housing Authority's Administrative building must be demolished to make room for the new mid-rise six floor building. Homeownership programs consist of HHA's FSS program and the Lease Purchase Program which were reviewed in 5.2 of this Plan.</p>

The shortage of 3 bedroom units is largely a historical issue as Hollywood was primarily a retirement area thus, 3 bedroom units which are code compliant are fewer in number than one and two bedrooms. The south-central quadrant of the City has the largest concentration of racial minorities and a lack of affordable rental units. At present the continuing problems of Foreclosures thru-out the City has temporarily increased the rental numbers of single family homes. There are in excess of 22,000 rental units within the City of Hollywood. The majority of residential structures were built prior to 1969.</p>

Our voluntary FSS program has assisted participants to become homeowners and promote self-sufficiency by the award of HUD grants to the PHA. 2. The Gardens at Driftwood is a Tax Credit property which will consist of a total of 120 units split between one and two bedrooms. Closing to be held before the end of 2009. Projected cost is 19.5 million. Thereby increasing the affordable housing in our jurisdiction. 3. Maintain high performer status on SEMAP and PHAS. 4. One Hundred Housing Vouchers awarded to HHA from 2005 thru 2009. 5. Applied and awarded \$200,000 from state of Florida for Hurricane Vouchers (2 year duration). 6. - (c) To record a budget revision on a previously approved open grant or CFFP, e.g., additions or deletions of work items, modification of budgeted amounts that have been undertaken since the submission of the last Annual Plan. The Capital Fund Program Annual Statement/Performance and Evaluation Report must be submitted annually.

In accordance with Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) of 2005, the HHA is committed to providing tenant based rental assistance as well as Public Housing assistance to victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault or stalking in the HHA's jurisdiction. Specifically, the HHA acknowledges that a victim of domestic violence may have an unfavorable history that would warrant denial under the HHA's general policies (i.e. income, assets, history of public housing eviction). In the event a determination to deny admission to an applicant is made, the HHA will include in its Notice of Denial a certification form of Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, Sexual Assault or Stalking HUD 50066. The applicant is offered the opportunity to provide documentation affirming that the cause of the unfavorable history is that a member of the applicant family is or has been a victim of domestic violence. The HHA also prohibits the eviction or the removal of assistance from persons living in Section 8 rental assistance if the asserted grounds for such actions(s) or act(s) are of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault or stalking as those terms are defined in the VAWA Act of 2005. All new participants are informed of the Violence Against Women's Act (VAWA) at the Section 8 and Public Housing "Orientation" session as well as annually in the re-certification packet for current participants. Section 8 landlords are informed that they may be required to terminate a lease to ensure the continued safety and protection of the victim and or family members afflicted by domestic violence.

Staff members at HHA continue to attend Seminars held by the Domestic Violence Division of the Broward County Clerk of Courts. Written materials from these seminars are distributed to clients in both English and Spanish. Referrals are made to Women in Distress and Legal Services of Broward County for assistance, thereby affirmatively marketing to local agencies that assist victims with domestic violence as well as educating staff to the rights and protection afforded under the Violence Against Women and Department of Justice Reenactment Act of 2005 (VAWA).




Resident Advisory Board (RAB) Comments

Comments received by the RAB Board overwhelmingly centered around available parking in regards to the new Senior complex. The Housing Authority has recently partnered with the Gatehouse Corporation to develop Gardens at Driftwood a Tax Credit project (Senior complex). The RAB Board was advised that a written agreement with Gatehouse will develop additional parking first, before construction begins on the proposed site. A map of the proposed site was also viewed showing the parking areas for public housing tenants.

Second issue raised was when would the security cameras be installed at Driftwood Terrace which we discussed end of last year. Response made was that a contractor had been decided on and we were only awaiting permits from the City. Reviewed areas of the building where cameras would be placed.

Discussion ensued on new chairs to be placed in laundry room. Responded that we will put this on list for next year.

Update was given in refurbishing of bathrooms at Driftwood Terrace. Contractor will be chosen by August of 2009. Last issue involved the paving of the parking lot at Driftwood Terrace. This will be delayed until construction of new parking lot is completed. Estimated time to finish is Jan. 2010.
