Background

FY2021 Appropriations Act allows Tribes and Tribally Designated Housing Entities (TDHEs) to apply for CoC program funding and allows formula areas to be added to CoC geographic area or to become their own CoC



Tribal Consultations

Three Tribal Consultations held 2021-2022 to receive feedback from tribes on how SNAPs can best integrate Tribes and Tribally Designated Housing Entities (TDHEs) into the CoC program

- March 24, 2021
- May 25, 2021
- January 11, 2022

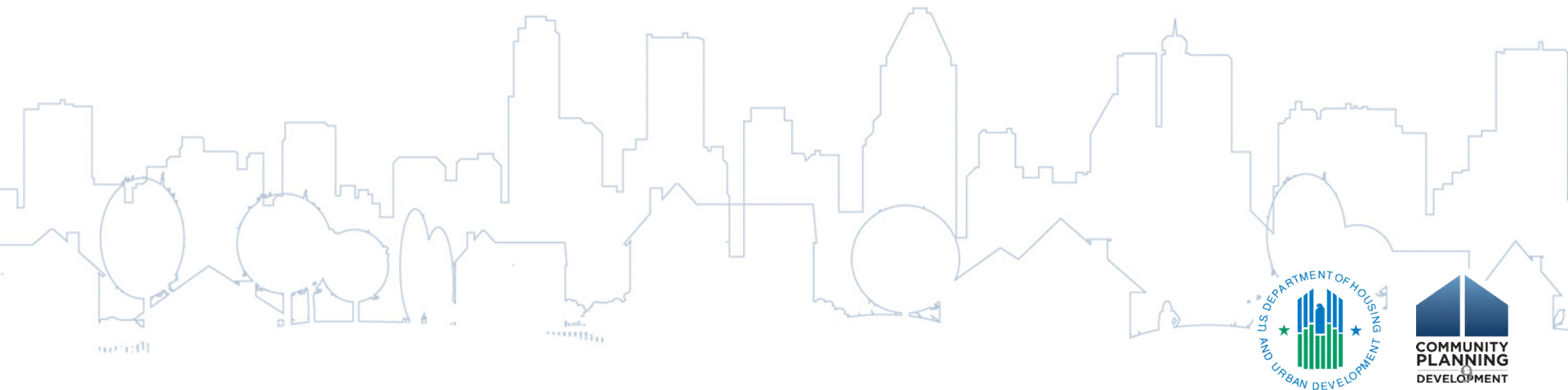

Program Overview

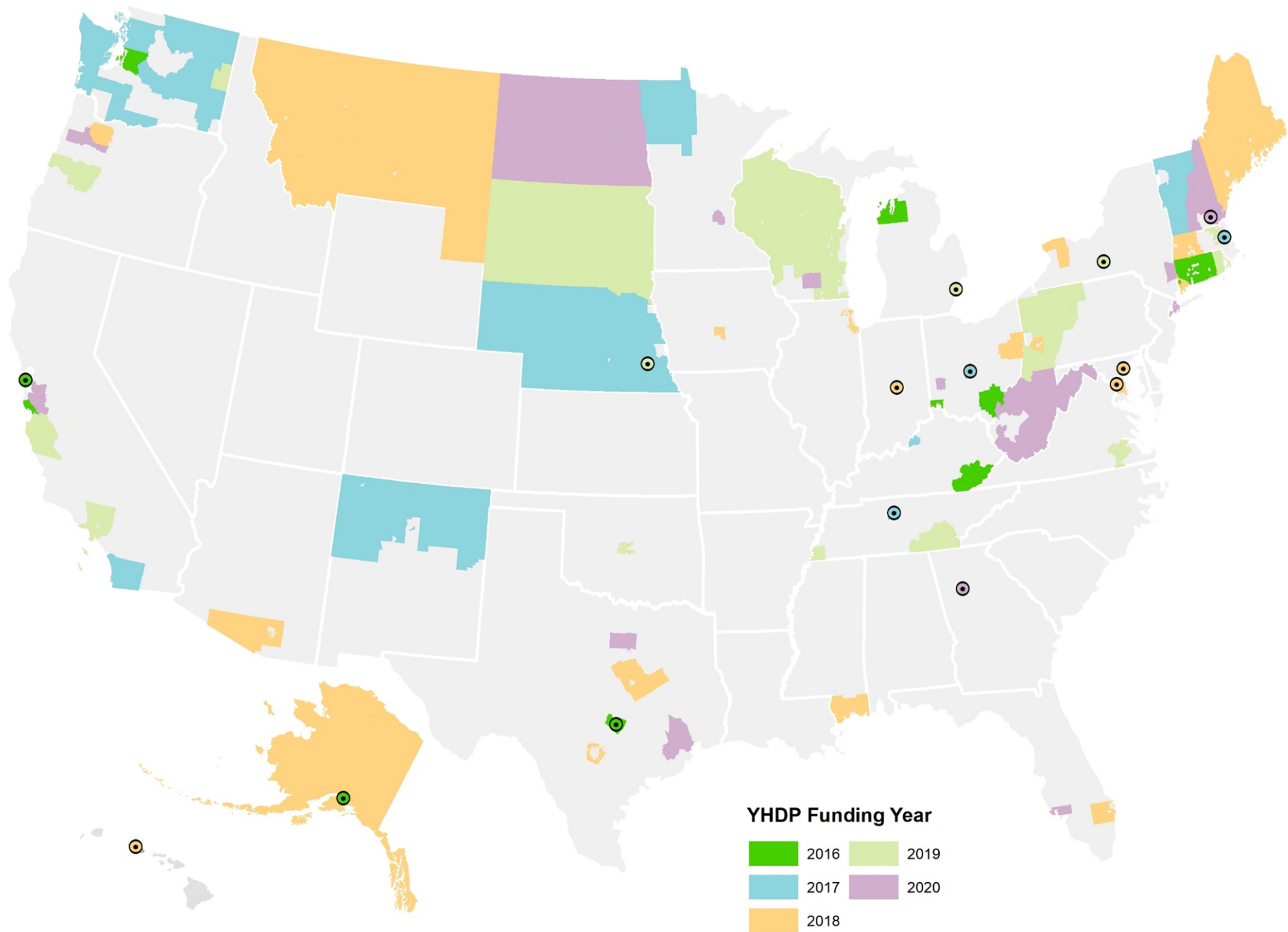


About YHDP

Goal: The goal of the YHDP NOFO is to support up to 25 communities in the development and implementation of a coordinated community approach to prevent and end youth homelessness and sharing that experience with and mobilizing communities around the country toward the same end.

Population to be Served: this demonstration program serves youth experiencing homelessness, including unaccompanied and pregnant or parenting youth, where no member of the household is older than 24.





FY2021 YHDP NOFO

- HUD will award approximately \$72 million to 25 communities
 - The NOFO offers a priority for communities with substantial rural populations in up to 8 locations
- Maximum award: \$15 million
- Minimum award: \$1 million
- Funding can be used for any project eligible under CoC regulations, including planning, housing, and services.
 - Project funds, except planning and hard costs, renewable under future CoC competitions



Overview of YHDP process

YHDP Community Designation

- Working with other community partners, CoC Collaborative Applicants respond to Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO)
- NOFO awards announced, including total funding available to community after intensive planning process

Summer
2022

Coordinated Community Plan (CCP)

- Communities must establish a planning team, including youth with lived experience, CoC and ESG recipients, child welfare agencies and other stakeholders in youth homelessness
- Communities analyze need and current youth homelessness system
- Communities may only apply for planning projects prior to approval of CCP

Fall 2022-
Spring 2023

Project Application

- Organizations in community apply for projects that are identified in the CCP, including projects focused on housing, services, and system supports
- SNAPS staff reviews project applications and fund individual projects

Spring-
Summer 2023

Funding Process

Ranking process:

- HUD will rank all applications based on the rating factors.

Funding process:

- HUD will select the 16 highest ranking communities and run the funding formula as outlined in II.C of the FY2021 YHDP NOFO
- If sufficient funds remain, HUD will add an additional community and re-run the funding formula
- HUD will repeat this process until not enough funds remain for another community or 25 communities are selected, whichever happens first



Rating Criteria

Rating Factor	Points
Leadership Capacity	15
Community Need	20
Collaboration	15
Youth Collaboration	30
Data and Evaluation Capacity	20
Total	100
Rural Bonus	10



Applicant Eligibility

Eligible Applicant: CoC Collaborative Applicants

- A Collaborative Applicant is the entity that has been designated by the CoC during the most recent CoC Program Registration Process to apply for a grant on behalf of the CoC, including those formed by Tribes and TDHEs. The Collaborative Applicant must be the "Applicant" for each community applying for participation in the demonstration.

Collaborative Applicants may apply for:

- any community located within its CoC's geographic area
- multiple communities located within its CoC's geographic area
 - Only one application per CoC will be selected for funding

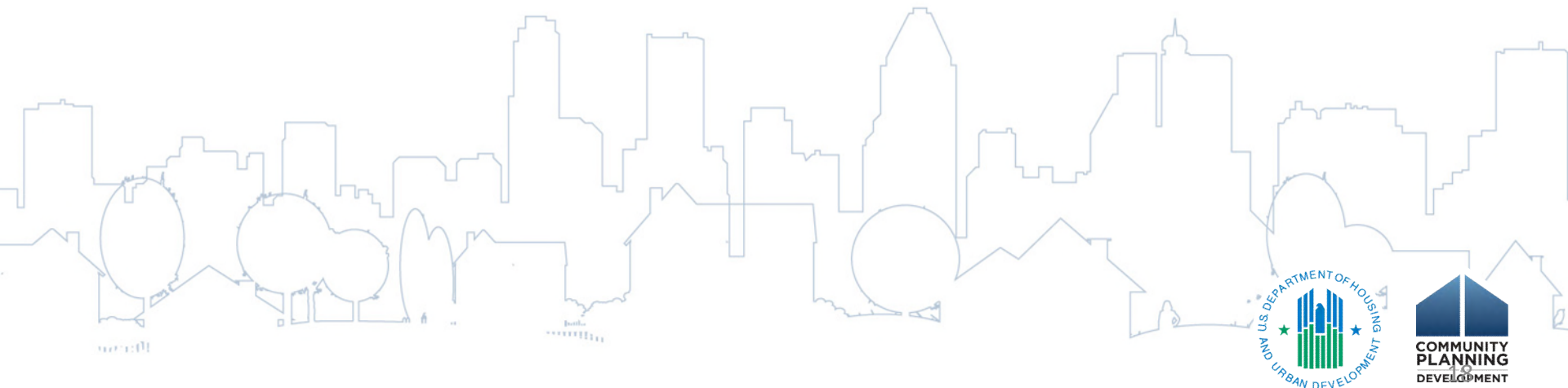

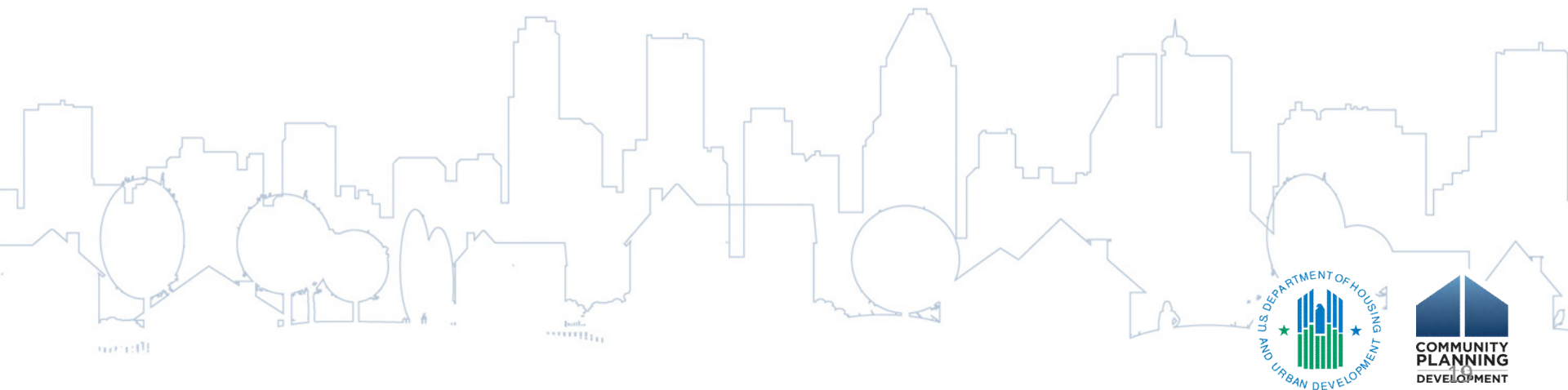

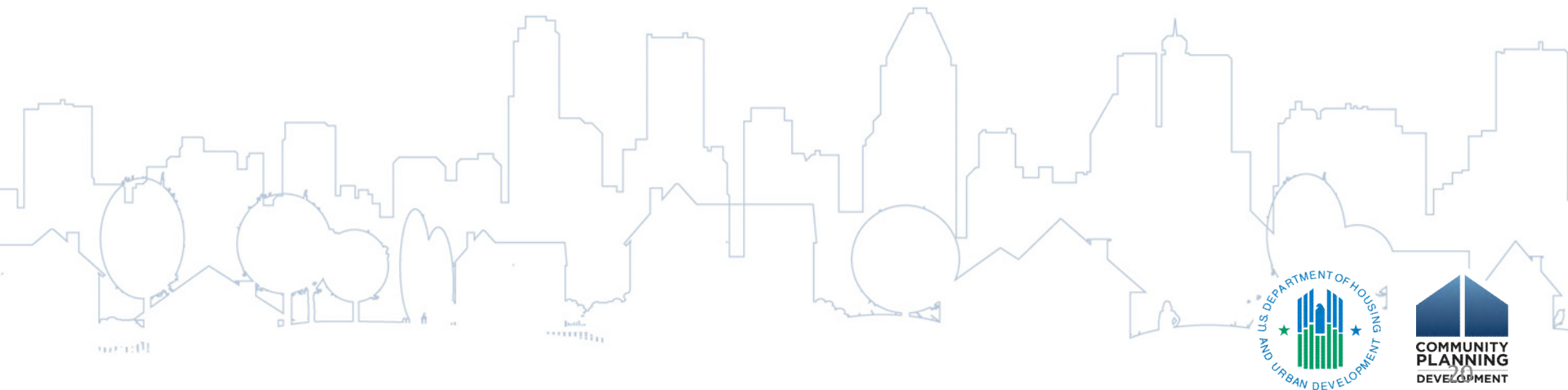


How Tribes can Participate in YHDP



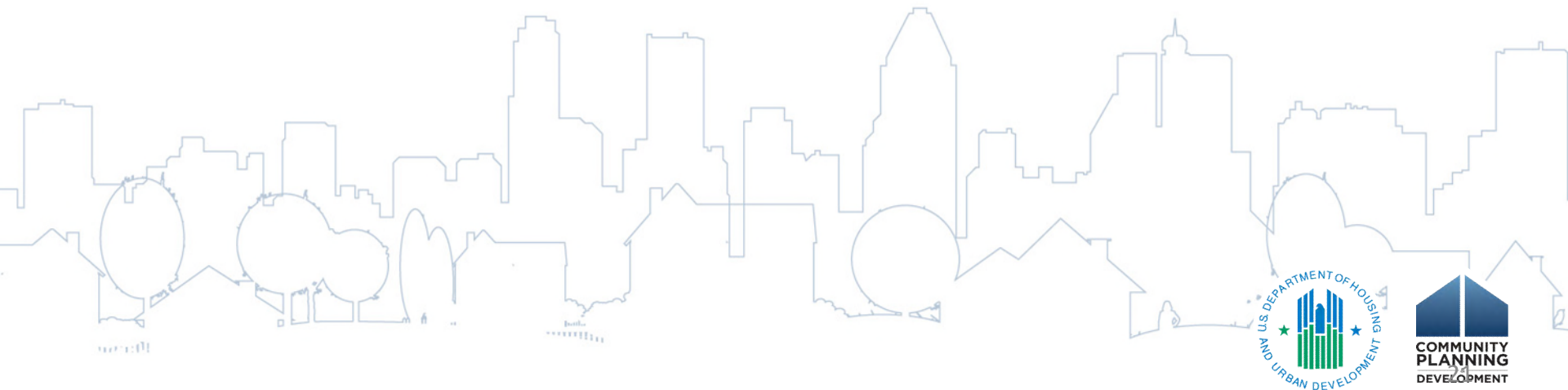
Designated as YHDP community

- Tribal CoC or CoC that partners to cover tribal areas can be designated a YHDP community via YHDP NOFO
- Requires tribal areas be associated with a CoC registered for the FY 2022 CoC competition
- May be a promising option for future YHDP competitions as well



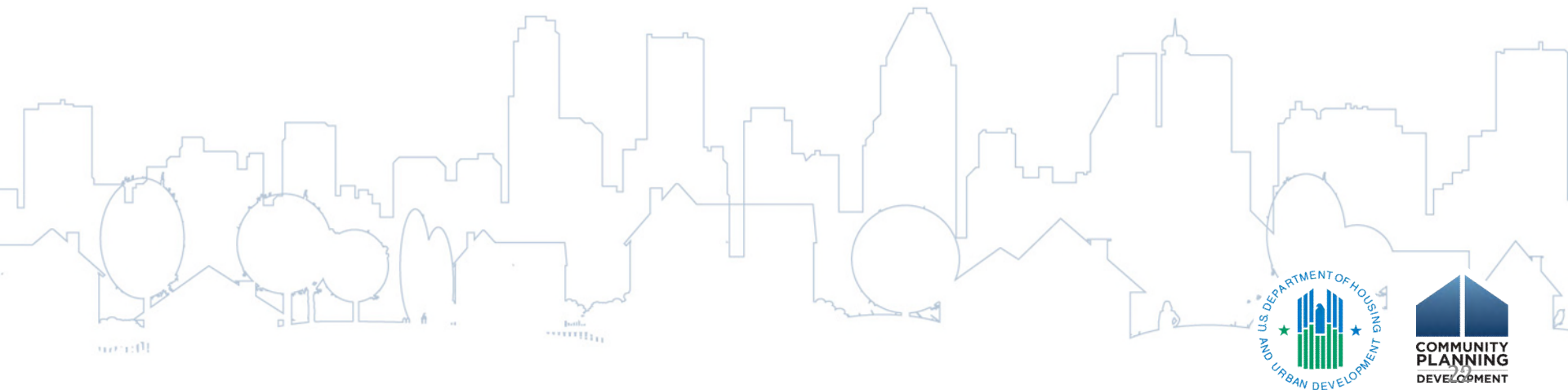
Join YHDP planning group

- YHDP requires intensive planning amongst a diverse group of stakeholders
- Tribes and TDHEs can be key stakeholders to ensure the needs of tribal youth are identified and addressed in the Coordinated Community Plan

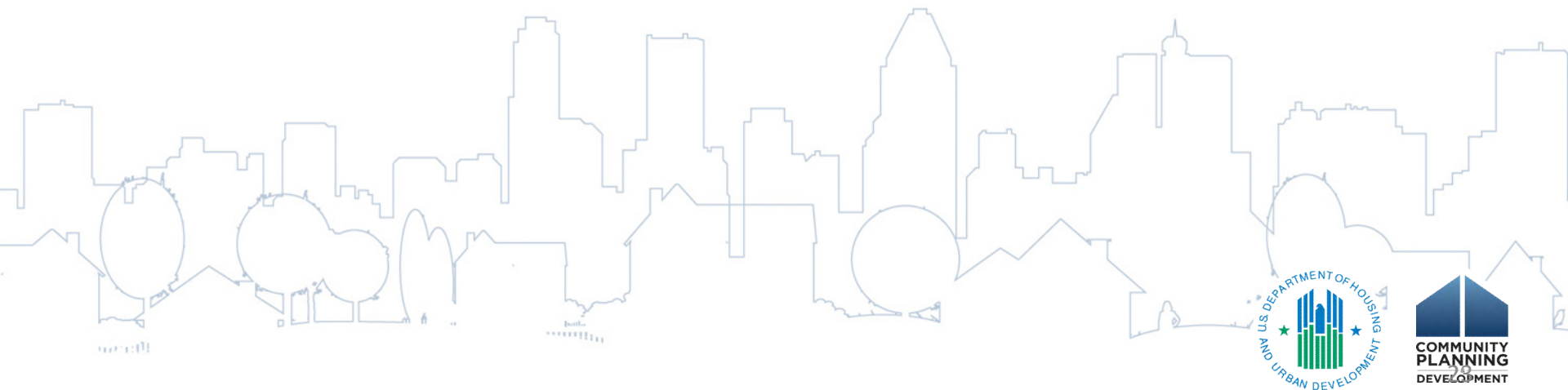


Recipient of YHDP project

- YHDP projects developed through Coordinated Community Plan (CCP) and applied for after CCP approval
- Tribes and TDHEs are eligible applicants for YHDP projects
- Projects can target youth based on identified needs



What support is available?



CoC Technical Assistance

- Tribes and tribal organizations may request technical assistance from HUD to help create or implement Continuums of Care (CoC) or projects within existing CoCs
- YHDP communities will receive robust technical assistance to develop Coordinated Community Plan and projects

What is HUD Technical Assistance?

HUD's technical assistance is designed to provide resources, tools, and support for recipients of HUD funding, such as state and local government grantees, public housing authorities, tribes and tribally-designated housing entities, Continuums of Care, and nonprofits.

HUD's technical assistance resources include:

- Information and "how to guides" through online resources, guidebooks, FAQs, and other information
- Training and knowledge-building through online courses and webinars
- Responses to basic program, policy and system questions via the Ask A Question virtual help desk
- In-depth, program assistance and capacity building to improve the design and delivery of programs and services funded by HUD

This request form is for in-depth, one-on-one program assistance and capacity building. For other technical assistance needs, grantees should visit the program topics page, the resource library, or the AAQ helpdesk.

What is In-Depth Program Assistance?

In-depth program assistance involves coordination with HUD Headquarters and Field Office staff and TA consultants over a period of weeks or months. It may be one-on-one assistance or assistance delivered to a cohort of grantees.

Steps for Requesting and Receiving In-Depth Program Assistance

Step 1

Prior to submitting a request, please review available guidance and training and consult with your local HUD Field Office for assistance.

Step 2

Create a HUD Exchange Account / Log in.

Who is Eligible to Receive In-Depth Program Assistance?

Organizations that receive funds directly from HUD are eligible, including:

- State and local governments
- Tribes, Tribally-Designated Housing Entities, and Tribally-Designated Housing Authorities
- Public Housing Authorities
- Participating Jurisdictions
- Housing Counseling Agencies
- Multifamily owners/operators
- Nonprofit organizations

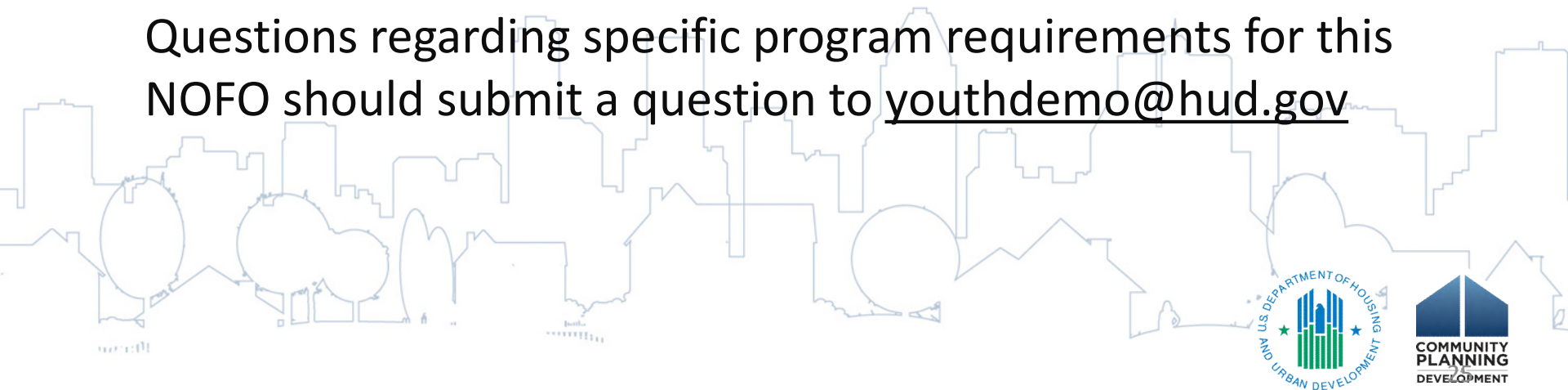
