# Describe the size and demographic composition of qualifying populations within the PJ's boundaries:

Information concerning the size and demographics of the sheltered and unsheltered homeless can be obtained from the 2020 PIT Count. There were 510 sheltered in emergency shelters or transitional housing. Of those, 152 were female and 358 were male. Of those, 311 were non-hispanic and 199 were Hispanic. Of those, 14 were multiple races, 2 were American Indian, 148 were Black, and 346 were White. There were 14 unsheltered of which 2 were female and 12 were male, 10 were non-hispanic and 4 were Hispanic, 6 were multiple races, 2 were Black, and 6 were White.

No specific data exists on the size and demographic composition of the following qualifying populations: at risk of homelessness; fleeing, or attempting to flee, domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, staking, or human trafficking; or other populations. The County's Emergency Rental Assistance Program has received over 3,900 applications and one could assume these households are at risk of homelessness.

# Describe the unmet housing and service needs of qualifying populations, including but not limited to:

- Sheltered and unsheltered homeless populations;
- Those currently housed populations at risk of homelessness;
- Other families requiring services or housing assistance or to prevent homelessness; and,
- Those at greatest risk of housing instability or in unstable housing situations:

The County currently has sufficient social service organizations and programs to meet the service needs of the qualifying populations. Similar to many communities, it is the lack of affordable housing that poses the most significant challenge. While the County's use of HOME-ARP funds will not eliminate the need for affordable housing, it will aid in reducing the number of units required.

# Identify and consider the current resources available to assist qualifying populations, including congregate and non-congregate shelter units, supportive services, TBRA, and affordable and permanent supportive rental housing:

The County currently has sufficient social service organizations and programs to meet the service needs of the qualifying populations. Currently the community has 320 emergency beds, 276 transitional housing beds, 60 rapid re-housing beds, and 349 permanent supportive housing beds. The County is utilizing funds from the Emergency Rental Assistance (ERA) Program to assist people who are at risk of homelessness. Yearly, the County utilizes HOME Program funds to add to the inventory of affordable housing, both rental and homeowner. Yearly, the County utilizes ESG Program funds to for emergency shelter, homelessness prevention and rapid re-housing. Currently there are no TBRA programs except for the Housing Choice Voucher Programs operated by the Reading Housing Authority and the Berks County Housing Authority. For both Programs, the issue is finding landlords willing to rent their units.

# Identify any gaps within the current shelter and housing inventory as well as the service delivery system:

The only gap within the current shelter system is units of non-congregate shelter and affordable rental units for homeless veterans. Once housed, there are sufficient services to assist families and indivduals.

Identify the characteristics of housing associated with instability and an increased risk of homelessness if the PJ will include such conditions in its definition of "other populations" as established in the HOME-ARP Notice:

There are no general characteristics of housing associated with instability and an increased risk of homelessness. It is a lack of sufficient funds to pay rent that creates instability and risk of being homeless.

#### Identify priority needs for qualifying populations:

Non-congregate emergency shelter for homeless families and affordable rental units for homeless veterans.

Explain how the level of need and gaps in its shelter and housing inventory and service delivery systems based on the data presented in the plan were determined:

The County will utilizes HOME-ARP funds to create additional affordable housing units and non-congregate shelter units. While not eliminating the needs and gaps, the proposed units will aid in addressing the lack of affordable units.

#### **HOME-ARP** Activities

The County maintains a list of unfunded or underfunded affordable housing projects. From this list, the County selected projects that serve the qualifying populations. The Redevelopment Authority of the County of Berks will administer the HOME-ARP grant and will enter into subrecipient agreements with the entities that will undertake the funded projects.

Describe how the characteristics of the shelter and housing inventory, service delivery system, and the needs identified in the gap analysis provided a rationale for the plan to fund eligible activities:

The community has sufficient emergency shelter beds for single adults and single adults with children. What is lacking are beds or units for intact homeless families. According to the CoC, the service delivery system is sufficient to provide the necessary services for the qualifying populations. What is lacking are sufficient affordable rental units for homeless veterans and non-congregate shelter units for intact homeless families.

HOME-ARP funding outlined in the above table is estimated to develop eighteen (18) affordable rental housing units.

The County of Berks has allocated HOME-ARP funding to address the overall lack of affordable rental housing for homeless veterans. The addition of eighteen (18) units of affordable rental housing will assist in reducing the lack of such units in the community.
