INTRODUCTION

The City of Dayton and Montgomery County are both entitlement communities and participating jurisdictions (PJ) for the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), receiving allocations of Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG), HOME Investment Partnerships (HOME) program, and Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds. Historically, the City of Dayton and Montgomery County jointly plan and coordinate the use of these funds to address homelessness and housing.

On March 11, 2021, President Biden signed the American Rescue Plan (ARP) into law, which provides over \$1.9 trillion in relief to address the continued impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on the economy, public health, State and local governments, individuals, and businesses. To address the need for homelessness assistance and supportive services, Congress appropriated \$5 billion in ARP funds to be administered through HOME to perform four activities that must primarily benefit qualifying individuals and families who are homeless, at risk of homelessness, or in other vulnerable populations. These activities include: (1) development and support of affordable housing, (2) tenant-based rental assistance (TBRA), (3) provision of supportive services; and (4) acquisition and development of non-congregate shelter units.

Montgomery County, Ohio has been allocated a total of \$3,868,913 of HOME-ARP funding. The City of Dayton has been allocated \$5,091,209 of HOME-ARP funding. The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development issued the Community Planning Division (CPD) Notice 21-010 which outlines the requirements for the use of funds in the HOME-American Rescue Plan Program. Requirements include funding limitations, including eligible and ineligible activities, uses and Qualifying Populations.

ARP defines qualifying individuals or families as those that are (1) homeless, as defined in section 103(a) of the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act, as amended (42 U.S.C. 11302(a)) ("McKinney-Vento"); (2) at risk of homelessness, as defined in section 401 of McKinney-Vento; (3) fleeing, or attempting to flee domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, stalking, or human trafficking; (4) part of other populations where providing supportive services or assistance would prevent a family's homelessness or would serve those with the greatest risk of housing instability; and veterans and families that include a veteran family member that meet the criteria in one of (1)-(4) in the paragraph above.

CONSULTATION

The jurisdictions of the City of Dayton and Montgomery County are part of the OH-505 Continuum of Care (CoC). Both jurisdictions participate in local joint funding processes, evaluation of community needs, and the development of community strategies to address homelessness, affordable housing, and other key community issues. With the approval of the HUD Field Office, the City of Dayton and Montgomery County worked collaboratively with each other and with the OH-505 CoC on the consultation, needs assessment and gaps analysis, preferences and priorities, and development of HOME-ARP activities for their respective HOME-ARP Allocation Plans.

Consultation for the HOME-ARP Allocation Plan was conducted in three different ways: 1) individual sessions with key stakeholders including the Continuum of Care, the Public Housing Authority, and persons with lived experience of homelessness, 2) virtual consultation sessions with homeless service providers, domestic violence service providers, Veterans' organizations, public agencies that address the needs of the qualifying populations, and public or private organizations that address fair housing, civil rights, and the needs of persons with disabilities, 3) surveys emailed to all of the groups listed above as well as other community policy makers/stakeholders.

Across groups and types of consultation, including surveys, several themes emerged as key needs or concerns. Top among them is the lack of available affordable housing in the community, impacting all 4 QPs. The lack of units is compounded by landlord unwillingness to accept vouchers or rental subsidies and too many housing units that do not meet housing quality standards. Other concerns highlighted the need for a more intentional, systemic approach to prevention and shelter diversion, primarily for QPs 1-2. Consulted groups also identified a need for mitigation funds, for diversion staff to conduct housing-focused problem solving to help keep people in housing rather than entering shelter (QPs 1-2), landlord navigation staff to cultivate new landlords, housing navigation staff to help people find housing and complete necessary paperwork and documentation, and expanded outreach to persons in QP1 who are sleeping unsheltered.

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION PROCESS

Montgomery County's advertisement for the public meeting was published in the *Dayton Daily News* on March 3, 2023. Citizens had the opportunity to review and comment on Montgomery County's HOME Investment Partnerships-American Rescue Plan Allocation Plan for a 15-day period beginning March 3, 2023, at www.mcohio.org or by requesting a copy from the Montgomery County Human Services Planning & Development Department. Public comments regarding the County's HOME Investment Partnerships-American Rescue Plan Allocation Plan were able to be submitted via email or mail. The participating jurisdictions followed applicable fair housing and civil rights requirements and procedures for effective communication, accessibility, and reasonable accommodations for persons with disabilities and providing meaningful access to participation by limited English proficient residents.

The City of Dayton held two public meetings regarding the HOME-ARP Allocation Plan. The advertisements for the public meetings and comment periods were published in the *Dayton Daily News* on January 29, 2023, and February 26, 2023. The public hearings were held at the regularly scheduled Community and Neighborhood Development Advisory Board (CNDAB) meetings at 4:30PM – individuals were able to participate via virtual Teams meeting or inperson in the City's Planning & Resource Center in City Hall. To request draft copies of the plan, obtain additional information, request a virtual meeting invitation, or submit a public comment, participants were able to email, call, or visit the Department of Planning, Neighborhoods, and Development.

Residents were provided with the opportunity to provide written comments on the City's planned use of HOME-ARP funding, as well as the consultation process with local entities involved in the support of Qualified Populations. The public comment period ran from February 6, 2023, until February 21, 2023. Public comments were also accepted during the public hearings.

EFFORTS TO BROADEN PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

In an effort to broaden public participation, the date and location of the public meeting and the dates of the 15-day comment period hosted by Montgomery County were announced at the public Board of County Commissioners meeting on February 21, 2023. The meeting was recorded and broadcasted.

The City of Dayton's public meetings and public comment period were announced via notification to the Community & Neighborhood Development Advisory Board (CNDAB) and the two publications in the *Dayton Daily News*. To further encourage public participation, the public hearings were held during a regularly scheduled CNDAB meeting, and the meeting was made available both in-person and virtually via Teams. To encourage participation from individuals with disabilities, the public hearing is held in City Hal, an ADA-accessible building, as well as virtually through Microsoft Teams, which provides transcription of the meeting and discussion during the public hearing.

SUMMARY OF PUBLIC COMMENTS RECEIVED

Representatives from the CoC and Montgomery County Workforce Development attended the Montgomery County public hearing on March 6, 2023. They supported the draft Allocation Plan and did not provide additional public comments. No other public comments were received.

The City of Dayton received 2 public comments during its public hearings. During the City of Dayton's second Public Hearing on March 13, 2023, a CNDAB member asked what the biggest challenge is in addressing homelessness. City staff provided an overview of the need to address

immediate, emergent concerns while also establishing long-term, permanent solutions to homelessness with the limited funding sources that are available. Another CNDAB member reiterated the dire need for supportive services, particularly for individuals experiencing mental health needs. CNDAB supported the draft Allocation Plan. No other comments were received during the first public hearing or the public comment period.

SUMMARY OF PUBLIC COMMENTS NOT ACCEPTED All public comments that were received were accepted.

NEEDS ASSESSMENT AND GAPS ANALYSIS

The City of Dayton and Montgomery County consulted with the OH-505 CoC to evaluate the size and demographic composition of qualifying populations within the City of Dayton and Montgomery County Cincinnati and assessed the unmet needs of those populations. Any gaps in the current shelter, service, and housing inventory were analyzed. The City of Dayton and Montgomery County also used current data, including Point-in-Time (PIT) count, Housing Inventory Count (HIC), and other data available through the CoC, along with consultations with service providers, to quantify the individuals and families in the qualifying populations and their need for additional housing, shelter, and/or services.





Description of the size and demographic composition of qualifying populations (QPs) within the participating jurisdictions of Dayton and Montgomery County.

HOMELESS as defined in 24 CFR 91.5

Montgomery County Homeless Solutions manages the implementation of the Dayton-Montgomery County Homeless Management Information System (HMIS). In 2021, 3,987 people in 3,397 households experienced homelessness in Dayton and Montgomery County, spending at least one night in one of the community's emergency shelters or sleeping unsheltered (Daybreak, Gettysburg Shelter for Men, St. Vincent Shelter for Women & Families, YWCA Domestic Violence Shelter) or sleeping unsheltered and engaged with PATH Outreach. The majority of households experiencing homelessness were single adults (88%). The complete breakdown by household type is displayed in the chart below. The second chart displays the racial disparity that exists in who experiences homelessness in our community. Persons who are Black are three times more likely to experience homelessness compared to persons who are White.





AT-RISK OF HOMELESSNESS as defined in 24 CFR 91.5

Per 24 CFR §91.5, an individual or family is considered at risk of homelessness if their income is below the 30% of the Area Median Family Income (AMI), they do not have sufficient resource or support networks, and have experienced housing instability. Data from the Comprehensive

Housing Affordable Strategy (CHAS for the years of 2015 through 2019 was used to determine the size and demographics of QP 2, households at risk of homelessness. There are 35,830 households in Dayton and Montgomery County with income equal to or below 30% of the Area Median Income; 10,345 are owner households (29%) and 25,485 are renter households (71%). Of the extremely low-income renter households, those with income at or below 30% of AMI, 18,715 (73%) are experiencing at least 1 of four housing problems: incomplete kitchen facilities, incomplete plumbing facilities, more than 1 person per room, and cost burden greater than 30%.

We do not have local demographic data for this group of households so are operating under the assumption that their demographics would be similar to extremely low-income renter households across the country. According to data from the National Low Income Housing Coalition, 48% of renter householders with extremely low incomes are seniors or persons with disabilities; 42% are employed, in school, or single adult caregivers. Of those in the labor force, 39% usually work 40 or more hours per week. Black, American Indian or Alaska Native, and Latino households are more likely than white households to be extremely low-income renters. Nineteen percent of Black households, 17% of American Indian or Alaska Native households, and 14% of Latino households are extremely low-income renters, compared to 6% of White households.

FLEEING, OR ATTEMPTING TO FLEE DOMESTIC VIOLENCE, DATING VIOLENCE, SEXUAL ASSAULT, STALKING, OR HUMAN TRAFFICKING, as defined by HUD for the HOME-ARP Program. The CoC collected data from the community's DV shelter, two DV hotlines, and programs serving persons fleeing or attempting to flee domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, stalking, or human trafficking to estimate the size of QP 3. The number of survivors who need housing or services is estimated to be 1,800. While we do not have unduplicated demographic data for the community's domestic violence crisis hotlines, we do have data for those households fleeing DV who access the community's DV Shelter. All of the households are headed by women. A slight majority 54% are families with children; 46% are single women. 56% of the households are Black, 33% are White, and 11% are other races or multi-racial.

OTHER POPULATIONS REQUIRING SERVICES OR HOUSING ASSISTANCE TO PREVENT HOMELESSNESS AND OTHER POPULATIONS AT GREATEST RISK OF HOUSING INSTABILITY, as defined by HUD for the HOME-ARP Program.

Other populations requiring services or housing assistance to prevent homelessness and/or those at greatest risk of housing instability fall into one of two categories. The first is formerly homeless households who are maintaining their housing with the temporary rental assistance and case management services. In 2021, there were 590 households who fell into this category. The second group are those households with annual income between 31%-50% of the Area Median Income and are experiencing at least 1 of four housing problems: incomplete kitchen facilities, incomplete plumbing facilities, more than 1 person per room, and cost burden greater than 30%. While less demographic information is available about this QP, US Census data indicates a racial disparity. 64% of White households are at or above AMI in Montgomery County compared to only 47% of Black households.

Description of the unmet housing and service needs of qualifying populations (QPs) within the participating jurisdictions of Dayton and Montgomery County.

HOMELESS

The primary unmet housing need for this QP is affordable housing. A variety of service needs were identified through the consultation process, including but not limited to expanded outreach, diversion, housing navigation, behavioral health, and case management.

AT-RISK OF HOMELESS as defined in 24 CFR 91.5

The primary unmet housing need for this QP is affordable housing and improved quality of housing in order to prevent homelessness. This group of very low-income households need rental assistance or an increase in their income in order to lessen their risk of homelessness. A variety of service needs were identified through the consultation process, including but not limited to housing navigation, diversion, legal services, transportation, and increased employment opportunities.

FLEEING, OR ATTEMPTING TO FLEE DOMESTIC VIOLENCE, DATING VIOLENCE, SEXUAL ASSAULT, STALKING, OR HUMAN TRAFFICKING, as defined by HUD for the HOME-ARP Program. The primary unmet housing need for this QP is safe, affordable housing. A variety of service needs were identified through the consultation process, including but not limited to housing navigation, legal services, behavioral health, and case management

OTHER POPULATIONS REQUIRING SERVICES OR HOUSING ASSISTANCE TO PREVENT HOMELESSNESS AND OTHER POPULATIONS AT GREATEST RISK OF HOUSING INSTABILITY, as defined by HUD for the HOME-ARP Program.

The primary unmet housing need for this QP is affordable housing and improved quality of housing. This group of low-income households needs rental assistance or an increase in their income in order to lessen their risk of homelessness. A variety of service needs were identified through the consultation process, including but not limited to housing navigation, transportation, prevention, legal services, and increased employment opportunities.

Identify any gaps within the current shelter and housing inventory as well as the service delivery system.

Neither the OH-505 CoC nor any of the organizations that participated in the consultation process indicate a need for additional non-congregate emergency shelter, with the exception of one survey respondent who noted a need for more crisis beds for persons fleeing DV. The gap related to shelter is the lack of a system-wide shelter diversion program to provide housing-focused problem solving and financial assistance when needed to keep people housed and prevent entry into shelter and homelessness. Other service gaps identified include navigation services to help qualifying populations effectively utilize housing vouchers or rental assistance and legal assistance to help prevent evictions.

The greatest gaps that exist are in the affordable housing inventory. The lack of affordable housing is greater today than it was 15 years ago. This gap is exhibited in several ways including the total number of available units, the quality of the units, and an unwillingness by some landlords to rent to people with vouchers or rental assistance. The community is still facing the consequences of the 2019 Memorial Day tornadoes that impacted 2,633 apartment units. 944 units were destroyed; another 567 suffered major damage. The loss of those units is exacerbated by rising housing costs, inflation, higher food costs, and comparatively stagnant wages. Rising rents make it more likely that households will lose their housing and the lack of available units lengthens the time that people stay in shelter. In Ohio in 2021, there were 44 available and affordable units for every 100 very low-income renters. The loss of those affordable housing units has resulted in an extremely high occupancy rate of 95%-97%, with too many households competing for the small percentage of available units at any point in time.

Identify the characteristics of housing associated with instability and an increased risk of homelessness if the participating jurisdictions will include such conditions in their definition of "other populations" as established in the HOME-ARP Notice.

Neither the City of Dayton nor Montgomery County will include such conditions in their definitions of "other populations" as established in the HOME-ARP Notice.

Identify priority needs for qualifying populations.

Priority needs across all qualifying populations include the development and preservation of affordable housing, rental assistance, navigation assistance to identify landlords and complete all documentation requirements for housing vouchers and rental assistance, and a system-wide diversion strategy to stabilize people in housing and prevent entry into emergency shelters. An additional priority need for QP 1, those experiencing homelessness, is expanded outreach to engage persons who are sleeping unsheltered and connect them to shelter, services, and housing.

The need for additional affordable housing, improved quality of the housing, landlord willingness to accept vouchers, and the challenges faced by all QPs in using vouchers is evident in a review of data from Greater Dayton Premier Management, the Public Housing Authority in Dayton and Montgomery County. As of January 2023, there are 488 households who have been issued a voucher who are searching for housing. The success rate is 20%. For those who are successful in using the voucher, the average time from voucher issuance to leasing is 2.5 months.

Explain how the participating jurisdictions determined the level of need and gaps in the shelter and housing inventory and service delivery systems based on the data presented in the plan.

Montgomery County Homeless Solutions, the CoC Lead in Dayton and Montgomery County, operates the CoC's homeless management information system (HMIS), which has 100% coverage of street outreach, emergency shelter (with the exception of the domestic violence shelter), and temporary and permanent supportive housing projects for people experiencing homelessness. The domestic violence shelter enters data into a comparable database. In

addition to the point-in-time data presented in an earlier table, the CoC analyzes HMIS data over time, reviewing annual totals of households experiencing homelessness, demographics, and key system performance measures such as the length of time homeless and exits to permanent housing. The jurisdictions used HMIS data, census data, and the results of the consultation sessions and surveys to compare the level of need to the shelter, temporary housing and permanent supportive housing inventory listed on the CoC's Housing Inventory Chart to determine the level of need and gaps in the shelter and housing inventory and service delivery systems in the community.

HOME-ARP ACTIVITIES

The method for soliciting applications for funding for the development or preservation of affordable housing and/or implementing services will be through a Request for Proposals or Request for Qualifications process. The CoC's Affordable Housing Options Committee will play a role in the review of applications requesting funding for the development or preservation of affordable housing. The CoC's Program Performance & Evaluation Committee will play a role in the review of applications requesting funding for the implementation of services. Before selecting a provider and committing funds to a project, the participating jurisdiction will evaluate the project in accordance with the criteria it has adopted to ensure the provider has the necessary capacity and experience and that the proposed budgeted costs are reasonable and allowable.

If any portion of the HOME-ARP administrative funds are provided to a subrecipient or contractor prior to HUD's acceptance of the HOME-ARP allocation plan because the subrecipient or contractor is responsible for the administration of the participating jurisdiction's entire HOME-ARP grant, identify the subrecipient or contractor and describe its role and responsibilities in administering all of the jurisdiction's HOME-ARP program.

The City of Dayton has not utilized a subrecipient or contractor to administer the HOME-ARP funding prior to HUD's acceptance of the HOME-ARP allocation plan. The City of Dayton will be responsible for the administration of its HOME-ARP funds.

Describe how the participating jurisdiction will distribute HOME-ARP funds in accordance with its priority needs identified in its needs assessment and gap analysis.

The needs assessment and gaps analysis indicated that there is a significant need for additional affordable housing units and the supportive services that will help people access affordable housing and remain stably housed. Affordable housing and services were identified as priority needs for all four HOME-ARP qualifying populations.

Describe how the characteristics of the shelter and housing inventory, service delivery system, and the needs identified in the gap analysis provided a rationale for the plan to fund eligible activities.

Neither the review of the shelter and housing inventory nor the consultation process identified a need for additional shelter beds. However, both the consultation process and the gaps analysis identified a need for more affordable housing in the community and key services including housing location, housing navigation, a system-wide diversion strategy, legal services, and expanded outreach.

HOME-ARP PRODUCTION HOUSING GOALS

Estimate the number of affordable rental housing units for qualifying populations that the participating jurisdiction will produce or support with its HOME-ARP allocation.

The City of Dayton does not anticipate using its HOME-ARP allocations to produce new affordable rental housing units solely funded with HOME-ARP funds. However, the City of Dayton does intend to use a portion of their HOME-ARP allocation to fill funding gaps in new affordable housing projects. Montgomery County estimates that their HOME-ARP allocation will result in the production of 150 new affordable rental housing units for qualifying populations. The City of Dayton anticipates its HOME-ARP funding will support the addition of approximately 200 units of new, affordable rental housing for qualifying populations.

Describe the specific affordable rental housing production goal that the participating jurisdiction hopes to achieve and describe how the production goals will address the participating jurisdiction's priority needs.

The priority need for all four qualifying populations is affordable housing. Establishing a production goal for developing up to 200 new affordable rental housing units with HOME-ARP funds helps address this priority need.

Under the Supportive Services category, preference will be given to individuals and households who are eligible under the homeless and at-risk of homelessness Qualifying Populations. Because the City of Dayton will use Coordinated Entry assessment and referral for HOME ARP Supportive Services projects within the aforementioned preferences, there will be prioritization for chronically homeless households, households with the most severe needs and levels of vulnerability, including vulnerability from violence/safety concerns, medical/behavioral health vulnerability, and age (youth 18-24 and seniors 55+). Activities to address affordable housing, and non-profit operations and capacity building will likely require more flexibility and fluidity as projects develop and will not have preferences established.

The establishment of the preferences herein comply with all applicable fair housing, civil rights, nondiscrimination and equal opportunity laws and requirements, including but not limited to those requirements listed in 24 CFR 5.105(a) (e.g., Fair Housing Act, Title VI of the Civil Rights Act, section 504 of Rehabilitation Act, HUD's Equal Access Rule, and Americans with Disabilities Act). The City of Dayton will not establish limitations on eligibility for a HOME-ARP project or activity.

If a preference was identified, explain how the use of a preference or method of prioritization will address the unmet need or gap in benefits and services received by individuals and families in the qualifying population or subpopulation of qualifying population, consistent with the PJ's needs assessment and gap analysis.

The preferences established by the City of Dayton in certain funding areas will help ensure that the most vulnerable residents who meet the HOME-ARP QP definitions, those who are literally homeless or at greatest risk of experiencing homelessness, will be assisted. Any individual or family who meets the criteria for any of the four qualifying populations is eligible to receive assistance or services funded through HOME-ARP.

If a preference was identified, describe how the PJ will use HOME-ARP funds to address the unmet needs or gaps in benefits and services of the other qualifying populations that are not included in the preference.

While preference will be given to those experiencing homeless and those at risk of homelessness in certain funding areas this will not prohibit the other Qualifying Populations from accessing services. Preferences associated with the HOME-ARP funds will help meet the greatest needs for the most vulnerable persons in the City of Dayton and throughout the

Dayton-Kettering-Montgomery County Continuum of Care who meet the HOME-ARP Qualifying Population's definitions.

REFERRAL METHODS

The City of Dayton intends to utilize the OH-505 CoC Coordinated Entry system for referrals to HOME-ARP Supportive Services. The CE will expand to accept all HOME-ARP qualifying populations and will implement the preferences and prioritization established by the City of Dayton in its HOME-ARP Allocation Plan. The CoC's Coordinated Entry system covers 100% of the participating jurisdiction's' geography. The CoC's Coordinated Entry system uses a standardized assessment tool, focused on housing history and barriers to stabilization in housing – including recent DV history, sexual assault, stalking and human trafficking – organized around the domains used in Critical Time Intervention. The CoC will manage the referral process to openings/vacancies for HOME-ARP services.

All qualifying populations eligible for HOME-ARP services will be included in the CE process.

CE assessment and referral includes a prioritization for chronically homeless households and prioritizes households with the most severe needs and levels of vulnerability, including vulnerability from violence/safety concerns, medical/behavioral health vulnerability, and age (youth 18-24 and seniors 55+).

AMI - Area Median Income

Cost burden – Monthly housing costs (including utilities) exceeding 30% of monthly income.

ESG: Emergency Solutions Grants program. ESG funds may be used for these five program components: street outreach, emergency shelter, homelessness prevention, rapid re-housing assistance, Homeless Management Information System (HMIS).

HAMFI – HUD Area Median Family Income. This is the median family income calculated by HUD for each jurisdiction, in order to determine Fair Market Rents (FMRs) and income limits for HUD programs. HAMFI will not necessarily be the same as other calculations of median incomes (such as a simple Census number), due to a series of adjustments that are made (For full documentation of these adjustments, consult the HUD Income Limit Briefing Materials). If you see the terms "area median income" (AMI) or "median family income" (MFI) used in the CHAS, assume it refers to HAMFI.

Household (HH) – All people living in a housing unit. Members of a household can be related (see family) or unrelated.

Household Income – Adjusted household income, which includes the income of all members of the household at the time of the survey, adjusted for inflation to reflect the most recent year of the data release (e.g., 2013 dollars in the 2009-2013 CHAS data).

Severe cost burden – Monthly housing costs (including utilities) exceeding 50% of monthly income

PJ: participating jurisdiction

U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD): One of the executive departments of the U.S. federal government that administers federal housing and urban development laws and programs.

HOME Investment Partnerships program (HOME): The HOME Investment Partnerships Program (HOME) provides formula grants to states and localities that communities use - often in partnership with local nonprofit groups - to fund a wide range of activities including building, buying, and/or rehabilitating affordable housing for rent or homeownership or providing direct rental assistance to low-income people.

Community Development Block Grant (CDBG): The Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program supports community development activities to build stronger and more resilient communities.

Continuum of Care (CoC): The Continuum of Care (CoC) Program is designed to promote communitywide commitment to the goal of ending homelessness; provide funding for efforts by nonprofit providers, and State and local governments to quickly rehouse homeless individuals and families while minimizing the trauma and dislocation caused to homeless

individuals, families, and communities by homelessness; promote access to and effect utilization of mainstream programs by homeless individuals and families; and optimize self-sufficiency among individuals and families experiencing homelessness.

QUALIFYING POPULATIONS

Homeless, as defined in 24 CFR 91.5 Homeless (1), (2), or (3):

- (1) An individual or family who lacks a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence
- (2) An individual or family who will imminently lose their primary nighttime residence
- (3) Unaccompanied youth under 25 years of age, or families with children and youth, who do not otherwise qualify as homeless

At risk of Homelessness, as defined in 24 CFR 91.5 At risk of homelessness:

- (1) An individual or family
- (2) A child or youth who does not qualify as "homeless" under this section, but qualifies as "homeless" under additional sections listed
- (3) A child or youth who does not qualify as "homeless" under this section but qualifies as "homeless" under the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act, and the parent(s) or guardian(s) of that child or youth if living with her or him.

Fleeing, or Attempting to Flee, Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, Sexual Assault, Stalking, or Human Trafficking, as defined by HUD:

- (1) **Domestic violence**, which is defined in 24 CFR 5.2003 includes felony or misdemeanor crimes of violence committed by:
 - a. A current or former spouse or intimate partner of the victim (the term "spouse or intimate partner of the victim" includes a person who is or has been in a social relationship of a romantic or intimate nature with the victim, as determined by the length of the relationship, the type of the relationship, and the frequency of interaction between the persons involved in the relationship);
 - b. A person with whom the victim shares a child in common;
 - c. A person who is cohabitating with or has cohabitated with the victim as a spouse or intimate partner;
 - d. A person similarly situated to a spouse of the victim under the domestic or family violence laws of the jurisdiction receiving HOME-ARP funds; or
 - e. Any other person against an adult or youth victim who is protected from that person's acts under the domestic or family violence laws of the jurisdiction.
- (2) Dating violence which is defined in 24 CFR 5.2003 means violence committed by a person:
 - a. Who is or has been in a social relationship of a romantic or intimate nature with the victim; and

- b. Where the existence of such a relationship shall be determined based on a consideration of the following factors:
- I. The length of the relationship;
- II. The type of relationship; and
- III. The frequency of interaction between the persons involved in the
- IV. Relationship
- (3) **Sexual assault** which is defined in 24 CFR 5.2003 means any nonconsensual sexual act proscribed by Federal, Tribal, or State law, including when the victim lacks capacity to consent.
- (4) **Stalking** which is defined in 24 CFR 5.2003 means engaging in a course of conduct directed at a specific person that would cause a reasonable person to:
 - a. Fear for the person's individual safety or the safety of others; or
 - b. Suffer substantial emotional distress.
- (5) Human Trafficking includes both sex and labor trafficking, as outlined in the Trafficking Victims Protection Act of 2000 (TVPA), as amended (22 U.S.C. 7102). These are defined as:
 - a. Sex trafficking means the recruitment, harboring, transportation, provision, obtaining, patronizing, or soliciting of a person for the purpose of a commercial sex act, in which the commercial sex act is induced by force, fraud, or coercion, or in which the person induced to perform such act has not attained 18 years of age; or
 - b. Labor trafficking means the recruitment, harboring, transportation, provision, or obtaining of a person for labor or services, through the use of force, fraud, or coercion for the purpose of subjection to involuntary servitude, peonage, debt bondage, or slavery.

Other Populations where providing supportive services or assistance under section 212(a) of NAHA (42 U.S.C. 12742(a)) would prevent the family's homelessness or would serve those with the greatest risk of housing instability:

- (1) Other Families Requiring Services or Housing Assistance to Prevent Homelessness is defined as households (i.e., individuals and families) who have previously been qualified as "homeless" as defined in 24 CFR 91.5, are currently housed due to temporary or emergency assistance, including financial assistance, services, temporary rental assistance or some type of other assistance to allow the household to be housed, and who need additional housing assistance or supportive services to avoid a return to homelessness.
- (2) At Greatest Risk of Housing Instability is defined as household who meets either paragraph (i) or (ii) below:

- a. has annual income that is less than or equal to 30% of the area median income, a determined by H and is experiencing severe cost burden (i.e., is paying more than 50% of monthly household income toward housing costs)
- b. has annual income that is less than or equal to 50% of the area median income, as determined by HUD, AND meets one of the following conditions from paragraph (iii) of the "At risk of homelessness" definition

Two public comments were received during the public hearing on March 13, 2023.

A CNDAB member asked what the biggest challenge is in addressing homelessness. City staff provided an overview of the need to address immediate, emergent concerns while also establishing long-term, permanent solutions to homelessness with the limited funding sources that are available.

Another CNDAB member reiterated the dire need for supportive services, particularly for individuals experiencing mental health needs. CNDAB supported the draft Allocation Plan, and no further comments were received.
