## Describe the size and demographic composition of qualifying populations within the PJ's boundaries:

Within the geographic area, approximately 700 individuals experience homelessness on any given night and over 4,500 persons are served by the homeless system each year. This includes persons in approximately 3,650 adult only households, 200 adult and child households, and 130 child only households.

Demographically, approximately 65% identify as White, 28% as Black or African American, 4% as Multi-Racial, and 3% as other racial groups. Approximately 5% identify as Hispanic/Latino. About 60% are male and 40% are female. Nearly 60% are adults ages 25-54 with unaccompanied youth (ages 18 to 24) comprising about 8% and about 25% being seniors (ages 55+).

## Describe the unmet housing and service needs of qualifying populations, including but not limited to:

- Sheltered and unsheltered homeless populations;
- Those currently housed populations at risk of homelessness;
- Other families requiring services or housing assistance or to prevent homelessness; and,
- Those at greatest risk of housing instability or in unstable housing situations:

There are approximately 620 households (727 persons) experiencing homelessness presently awaiting a housing resource within the PJ's boundaries. This includes 595 adult only households (647 persons) and 25 adult and child households (80 persons). Of adult only households, 40 households are youth ages 18 to 24.

Approximately 390 households (465 persons) are sheltered and 230 households (260 persons) are unsheltered.

## Identify and consider the current resources available to assist qualifying populations, including congregate and non-congregate shelter units, supportive services, TBRA, and affordable and permanent supportive rental housing:

At the time of its most recent Housing Inventory Count, the PJ's resources included: 384 year-round shelter beds (351 congregate, 33 non-congregate) and 97 seasonal shelter beds (all non-congregate); 97 rapid re-housing beds; and 425 permanent supportive housing units. Approximately 25 additional rapid re-housing beds have been added to the system since the time of the HIC.

Numerous supportive services programs operate within the PJ, including 4 street outreach teams and 3 drop-in centers. The PJ operates two tenant-based rental assistance programs with HOME dollars. The PJ's PHA commits nearly 250 MTW voucher to special partners serving those experiencing homelessness.

Identify any gaps within the current shelter and housing inventory as well as the service delivery system:

Utilization rates indicate that the PJ's primary need is for housing resources. On the night of the PJ's 2021 PIT Count and throughout much of the year, shelter beds have gone underutilized, with more individuals choosing not to access congregate shelter. This has led to an increase of persons identified as experiencing unsheltered homelessness, who require affordable and permanent housing options.

Approximately 300 persons in the PJ are awaiting a housing resource which can provide long-term rental assistance and intensive supportive services. Many of these individuals do not meet HUD's chronic homeless definition, but require permanent supportive housing in order to successfully be housed and remain housed.

Another 250 persons await a shorter term resource with less intensive service needs. As openings become available more frequently with the PJ's rapid re-housing units as participants transition on, this gap is less significant.

At all levels, the PJ's primary need is for housing resources for adult only households. The PJ was able to leverage its allocated Emergency Housing Vouchers to transition families from shelters and the streets to permanent housing, effectively ending family homelessness.

The PJ will focus on homeless populations; those at risk will not be included in our definition of "other populations" for HOME-ARP.

### Explain how the level of need and gaps in its shelter and housing inventory and service delivery systems based on the data presented in the plan were determined:

Several data sources were assessed in determining the PJ's resource inventory and gaps. This includes Point-in-Time Count, Housing Inventory Count, Longitudinal Systems Analysis and HMIS APR data. The PJ also relied heavily upon its By-Name List for Coordinated Entry in assessing unmet needs. All sources were consulted to ensure that data was current, representative and consistent.

### **HOME-ARP** Activities

## Describe the method for soliciting applications for funding and/or selecting developers, service providers, subrecipients and/or contractors and whether the PJ will administer eligible activities directly:

Applications accepted through the LFUCG Office of Affordable Housing on a rolling basis will be required to set aside permanent supportive housing units for households meeting requirements of the qualifying population. These applicants will also be required to identify a partner organization to receive supportive services funding through HOME ARP in support of the project. In this way, HOME ARP funds will be leveraged with funds from the LFUCG's Affordable Housing Fund by using HOME ARP to buy in to developments and ensure units are set aside for the qualifying population. Applications will be initially reviewed by the city's Affordable Housing Manager and staff in the Division of Grants and Special Programs. Applicants will be required to have a letter of support from the Continuum of Care. Funds will ultimately be awarded by the LFUCG's Affordable Housing Board. By coupling HOME ARP with larger Affordable Housing Fund developments, the program will be able to ensure the longterm sustainability of these units which are otherwise difficult to cash flow when serving only the qualifying population.

#### **Use of HOME-ARP Funding**

Additional narrative, if applicable:

After Administration & Planning funds are removed, remaining HOME ARP funds will be allocated in an 80/20 split between Development of Affordable Rental Housing (80%) and Supportive Services (20%) to support those units. This is expected to generate approximately 25 HOME units at an average investment of \$132,344.32 per unit.

## Describe how the characteristics of the shelter and housing inventory, service delivery system, and the needs identified in the gap analysis provided a rationale for the plan to fund eligible activities:

On average, a person experiencing homelessness in Lexington requires supportive services totaling approximately \$8,500 in year one, according to the Lexington-Fayette Continuum of Care. By allocating \$827,152 for Supportive Services, the LFUCG aligns those costs with the average experienced by the CoC for serving 25 households through the duration of the grant.

In addition, as idenfified above in the Needs and Gap Analysis, Lexington Fayette County is short nearly 22,000 units of affordable housing for households at or below 50% of area median income. The need for affordable units in Lexington is so overwhelming that the Urban County Council recently approved an appropriation of \$10 million from the American Rescue Plan Act's State & Local Recovery Funds to the city's affordable housing efforts. Coupling HOME ARP with those projects allows the city to target the HOME ARP qualifying population while not trying to finance entire developments serving a 30% AMI population that otherwise would be difficult to maintain over a long period of time. This minimizes the need for large numbers of housing vouchers and other forms of rental assistance to make the projects viable.

### **HOME-ARP** Production Housing Goals

The LFUCG estimates HOME-ARP funds will support the production of 25 HOME units and anticipates leveraging these funds with other resources to generate another 475 units for a total of 500 units.

### Describe the specific affordable rental housing production goal that the PJ hopes to achieve and describe how it will address the PJ's priority needs:

As described above, by pairing HOME ARP with the LFUCG's Affordable Housing Fund, the city will be able to produce 500 units. Of those units, 25 will be HOME ARP dedicated units for the qualifying population.
