Describe the consultation process including methods used and dates of consultation:

Ocean County Department of Planning's consultation process included an in-person meeting with the HOME-ARP Steering Committee. This meeting was held on May 17, 2022 to generate feedback. The agencies in attendance were asked to provide feedback on their needs for shelter, housing and/or services. The Department of Planning also requested the most recent Point-In-Time (PIT) count and Needs Assessment data. In addition to the HOME-ARP Steering Committee meeting, the Department of Planning met with other various providers on multiple occasions to gather feedback and data presented in our HOME-ARP Allocation Plan.

Summarize feedback received and results of upfront consultation with these entities: Ocean County Department of Planning's consultation process included:

An in-person meeting with the HOME-ARP Steering Committee. This meeting was held on May 17, 2022 to generate feedback. Ocean County Department of Human Services, Monarch Housing and Ocean Partnership for Children were present at this meeting. Rose Marie Bulbach, representing Ocean County Department of Human Services, provided the Needs Assessment survey and results. The use of funds for a non-congregate shelter was suggested. Kasey Vienckowski from Monarch Housing provided the Point-in-Time (PIT) data for 2022 and suggested the use of funds for a non-congregate shelter. Katie Colhoun from Ocean Partnership for Children suggested the use of funds for a non-congregate shelter.

On January 27, 2023, the Ocean County Planning Department met virtually with Scott Parsons, Executive Director of Lakewood Housing Authority. Mr. Parsons detailed the various programs available with Lakewood Housing Authority and stated housing vouchers are being provided, however, many clients are unable to obtain units, as there is a shortage of available affordable rental housing. Lakewood Housing Authority serves all Qualified Populations (QP's) and currently there is a waitlist for their programs. Lakewood Housing Authority has 1,119 clients on their program. The average time a client spends on their program(s) is nine (9) years. There are 142 clients that have been on their program for over twenty (20) years but less than thirty (30) years. Twenty (20) clients have been on the program for over thirty (30) years. The amount of clients that have been on the program for less than one year is 131. Mr. Parsons expressed interest in collaborating with Ocean County to carry out the activities detailed in the HOME-ARP Allocation Plan.

On January 27, 2023, Ocean County Planning Department also met with Brick Housing Authority. Jake Naszimento, Executive Director and Nancy Nicholson, Administrative Assistant were present at the virtual meeting. Jake Naszimento detailed the programs Brick Housing Authority offers. There is a waitlist for both programs. For their Tenant Based Rental Assistance Program, there is a need for affordable rental units. He stated the need for supportive services as well as emergency housing. Mr. Naszimento expressed interest in collaborating with Ocean County to carry out the activities detailed in the HOME-ARP Allocation Plan.

Ocean County reached out to Berkeley Housing Authority on multiple occasions and was unable to receive comment.

On February 2, 2023, Ocean County met virtually with Catholic Charities Diocese of Trenton. Catholic Charities offers various programs relating to all Qualified Populations (QP's). Providence House of Catholic Charities serves domestic violence victims. Currently, Providence House is operating at full capacity as COVID-19 has exacerbated domestic violence. In 2022, Providence House Domestic Violence Services (PHDVS-Ocean) provided 34,618 nights of shelter to 405 unduplicated survivors (221 adults and 184 children). Most recently, Catholic Charities has established a program for human trafficking victims, both adults and children under the age of 18. The representatives present for Catholic Charities, Arnold Valentin and Nick

Koumarianos, detailed the lack of affordable rental units available as well as the need for additional units for domestic violence victims. Catholic Charities long-term goals include building affordable rental housing units. Mr. Valentin and Mr. Koumarianos expressed interest in collaborating with Ocean County to carry out the activities detailed in the HOME-ARP Allocation Plan.

On February 3, 2023, Ocean County Department of Planning met in-person with representatives from the Ocean County Veterans Service Bureau. Ocean County has the highest population of veterans in the State of New Jersey. There is currently an unmet need of affordable rental units. Veterans are being placed in extensive hotel/motel stays until permanent rental housing is available. It is imperative to ensure the veteran population has access to the supportive services needed. The Ocean County Veterans Service Bureau has expressed interest in collaborating with Ocean County to carry out the activities detailed in the HOME-ARP Allocation Plan.

Public Participation

Describe the public participation process:

A public notice was published in the Asbury Park Press and on the County website on February 6, 2023, with a public comment period from February 6, 2023 to February 23, 2023. In addition, a copy of the HOME-ARP Allocation Plan was available on the Ocean County Department of Planning Website and at the Ocean County Planning Department, 129 Hooper Avenue, First Floor, Toms River, NJ 08754. During the public comment period, a public hearing was held on February 22, 2023 at 6:00pm with the option to attend virtually.

Describe efforts to broaden public participation:

To broaden public participation, Ocean County shared the public notice and Allocation Plan on our webpage. The public hearing was held on February 22, 2023 at 6:00pm at the Ocean County Planning Department, 129 Hooper Avenue, First Floor, Toms River, NJ 08754 which is easily accessible by public transportation. The public hearing was in-person and had a virtual participation opportunity with the link provided in the public notice as well as our website.

Summarize the comments and recommendations received through the public participation process either in writing, or orally at a public hearing:

Ocean County did not receive any comments in writing, or orally during the public comment period or at the public hearing where the HOME-ARP Allocation Plan was presented for citizen participation.

Describe the size and demographic composition of qualifying populations within the PJ's boundaries:

Homeless as defined in 24 CFR 91.5

The data source for the number of County residents that are experiencing homelessness is the Ocean County Point-In-Time (PIT) count. The 2022 Point-In-Time (PIT) count took place on Tuesday, January 25, 2022. This annual community-wide survey showed 419 persons, in 269 households were experiencing homelessness. This number is higher than the 366 persons, in 239 households experiencing homelessness during the 2021 Point-In-Time (PIT) Count. It is likely that this increase is due to COVID-19 Point-In-Time (PIT) Count methodology adjustments. The 7-day outreach and service-based count used in 2022 targeted feeding programs, drop-in centers and other services.

Of the persons experiencing homelessness in 2022, 50.4% identified themselves as White, Non-Hispanic/Latino, 23.6% identified themselves as Black/African American, Non-Hispanic/Latino, 0.5% identified themselves as Asian, Non-Hispanic/Latino, 0.2% identified themselves as American Indian/Alaska Native, Non-Hispanic/Latino and 20.4% identified themselves as Hispanic/Latino.

Of the 269 homeless households counted in Ocean County in 2022, 199 households were without children, 65 households were adults and children and 5 households with only children. Of those experiencing homelessness, there were 140 children under 18 years old, 25 adults between 18 and 24 years old, 240 adults between 25 and 64 years old, and 9 adults over 64 years old. Respondents were experiencing one or more of the following disabling conditions: mental health issue, substance abuse disorder, physical disability, developmental disability, chronic health condition, and HIV/AIDS.

At Risk of Homelessness as defined in 24 CFR 91.5

According to the 2015-2019 Comprehensive Housing Affordability Strategy (CHAS) data, there are 14,305 Ocean County renter households that earn less than 30% of the Area Median Income (AMI). With a high percentage of senior citizens in Ocean County, 23,480 owner households earn less than 30% of the Area Median Income (AMI). Of the 14,305 renter households earning less than 30% of the Area Median Income (AMI), it is estimated that 79.66% of these households have one or more of the four housing unit problems: incomplete kitchen facilities, incomplete plumbing facilities, more than one person per room, or cost burden greater than 30%.

The data for the number of households that do not have sufficient resources or support networks (family, friends, faith-based or other social networks) immediately available to prevent them from moving to an emergency shelter or another place is qualitative. As prepared by the Ocean County Department of Human Services, Ocean County's 2020 Needs Assessment Survey, dated January 15, 2021, showed access to transportation, long waitlists, a lack of awareness of services, stigma, and cultural or language barriers hindered consumers

in obtaining needed services. Geographical barriers affecting access to services in the southern and western most areas of Ocean County has been considered a priority need. This need has influenced our local agencies to build satellite services sites including the expansion of the One-Stop Center in Manahawkin.

It is estimated there are 25 unaccompanied homeless youth persons in Ocean County. Ocean County's goal remains to achieve an accessible system to support promoting self-sufficiency, independence and wellness for all homeless populations.

Fleeing, or Attempting to Flee, Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, Sexual Assault, Stalking, or Human Trafficking, as defined by HUD in the Notice

The Point-In-Time (PIT) count report, from January 25, 2022, identified 163 persons, in 81 households fleeing domestic violence. Of the 163 persons, 115 were living in emergency shelters and 48 were living in transitional housing. Of the 81 households, 42 were households with adults and children and 39 were without children.

Other populations requiring services or housing assistance to prevent homelessness and other populations at greatest risk of housing instability, as defined by HUD in the Notice The data for other populations requiring services or housing assistance to prevent homelessness and other populations at greatest risk of housing instability is qualitative. According to the 2015-2019 Comprehensive Housing Affordability Strategy (CHAS) data, there are 14,305 Ocean County renter households that earn less than 30% of the Area Median Income (AMI). This figure represents 31.57% of the total number of renter households in Ocean County, or approximately 1.5 in 5.

According to the 2021 Out of Reach Report produced by the National Low Income Housing Coalition, the annual household income required to afford a two-bedroom unit at FMR in Ocean County is \$66,080. For a two-person family, that would be approximately 67.81% AMI. For a three-person family, that would be approximately 60.26% AMI.

As noted in the 2021 True Poverty Report, childcare is the second largest item in a family budget and in some families, it exceeds housing cost. Monthly childcare in Ocean County ranges from \$924 for a family with one preschooler, to \$2,225 for a family with two schoolage children and one preschooler. With this being said, households with income above 50% AMI may still experience financial pressures.

Describe the unmet housing and service needs of qualifying populations:

Homeless as defined in 24 CFR 91.5

It has been determined that sheltered and unsheltered populations experiencing homelessness need continued access to current emergency shelter and transitional housing inventory as well as access to supportive services provided by non-profit organizations. These supportive

services include but are not limited to food, mental health services, employment assistance and job training, housing search and counseling services, outreach services, transportation and substance abuse treatment services. Development of permanent affordable rental housing would aide individuals and families in obtaining affordable housing stability.

At Risk of Homelessness as defined in 24 CFR 91.5

For individuals and families at risk of homelessness, early intervention via homeless prevention services is a priority. Assistance is provided in the form of Ocean County's Tenant Based Rental Assistance Program.

Fleeing, or Attempting to Flee, Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, Sexual Assault, Stalking, or Human Trafficking, as defined by HUD in the Notice

The 2022 Point-in-Time (PIT) count identified that on the night of January 25, 2022, 163 Victims of Domestic Violence were identified, representing 38.9% of the total identified homeless population in Ocean County. As stated in the 2022 Point-in-Time (PIT) count report, Domestic Violence is defined as any household that is fleeing domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, stalking, or other dangerous or life-threatening conditions that relate to violence against the individual or family member, including a child, that has taken place in their home, or has created a situation in which the individual or family is afraid to return to their home. One of Ocean County's providers for victims of Domestic Violence, Providence House of Catholic Charities, expressed that Domestic Violence facilities are operating at full capacity and there is a need for affordable rental units in Ocean County.

Other populations requiring services or housing assistance to prevent homelessness and other populations at greatest risk of housing instability as defined by HUD in the Notice It has been determined that families requiring services or housing assistance to prevent homelessness would benefit from the development of affordable rental housing.

Identify any gaps within the current shelter and housing inventory as well as the service delivery system:

The gaps within the current shelter and housing inventory include affordable rental housing. The number of units available to low-income renters is limited. According to the New Jersey Guide to Affordable Housing 2022, there are fewer than 6,500 affordable rental units in Ocean County, but over 14,000 people make less than 30% AMI. Of the 14,000 people making less than 30% AMI, over 11,000 of them have one or more housing problems. This gap supports the need for development of affordable rental housing.

As per the data, supportive services for qualifying populations are also needed. Currently, existing non-profit agencies in Ocean County provide necessary support to qualifying populations. Since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic, there has been an increased number of clients and a growing need.

Ocean County will not exercise this option.

Identify priority needs for qualifying populations:

The priority needs for qualifying populations are affordable rental housing opportunities, supportive services and non-profit operating. By developing affordable rental housing opportunities and increasing funding to supportive services, the County will effectively reduce the effects of homelessness. Supportive services include but are not limited to food, mental health services, employment assistance and job training, housing search and counseling services, outreach services, transportation and substance abuse treatment services. There are currently 458 emergency shelter or transitional housing beds available. There are also various hotel/motel voucher programs within Ocean County. Individuals and families should seek to be moved to permanent affordable rental housing. To promote self-sufficiency, the development of permanent affordable rental housing would assist qualifying populations.

Explain how the PJ determined the level of need and gaps in the PJ's shelter and housing inventory and service delivery systems based on the data presented in the plan:

Ocean County has determined the level of need and gaps in shelter and housing inventory through careful consideration and evaluation of the data provided by various sources. The HOME-ARP Steering Committee meeting, held on May 17, 2022, identified the need as a non-congregate shelter. The non-congregate shelter would have appropriately sized separate spaces for individuals and families. As stated previously in the HOME-ARP Allocation Plan, 79.66% of rental households whose income is below 30% AMI are living in households with at least one of four housing problems.

The 2021 True Poverty report has shown that even households with an income greater than 30% AMI may not afford rental units with more than one bedroom. When qualifying populations are placed in temporary housing, it remains difficult to find permanent affordable rental housing given the inventory gap.

HOME-ARP Activities

Describe the method(s)that will be used for soliciting applications for funding and/or selecting developers, service providers, subrecipients and/or contractors and whether the PJ will administer eligible activities directly:

Upon approval of the HOME-ARP Allocation Plan, Ocean County will initiate the first step of the process, a Request for Proposal (RFP) to announce a new project opportunity to interested parties through bidding for development of affordable rental housing. For non-profit operating

and supportive services, Ocean County will open applications for funding. A committee will make recommendations to the Ocean County Board of Commissioners for funding to qualified non-profits and supportive services agencies.

Describe how the PJ will distribute HOME-ARP funds in accordance with its priority needs identified in its needs assessment and gap analysis:

Ocean County will fund \$729,854 for supportive services, \$3,392,560 for the development of affordable rental housing, \$243,284 for non-profit operating expenses and \$500,000 for administration and planning, totaling \$4,865,698.

Describe how the characteristics of the shelter and housing inventory, service delivery system, and the needs identified in the gap analysis provided a rationale for the plan to fund eligible activities:

This funding breakdown is supported by the data provided and the recognized gap in permanent affordable rental housing. By developing affordable rental housing, Ocean County aims to keep individuals and families housed before homelessness is experienced. By developing permanent affordable rental housing, unaccompanied youth can transition to self-sufficiency, individuals currently experiencing homelessness will be transitioned to permanent affordable rental housing and reduce the risk of homelessness for low-income households.

To expand capabilities of Ocean County's non-profit organizations, HOME-ARP funding will be used for operating assistance. Many non-profit organizations within Ocean County have expanded their services since COVID-19. To increase funding to their services provided, Ocean County will fund operating assistance for employee salaries, rent, utilities, equipment, materials and supplies. Additionally, Ocean County is funding supportive services in an effort to expand the assistance provided to the qualifying populations.

Administration and planning will be funded to carry out the proposed actions as previously described.

HOME-ARP Production Housing Goals

Estimate the number of affordable rental housing units for qualifying populations that the PJ will produce or support with its HOME-ARP allocation:

Ocean County plans to post an RFP for the development of affordable rental housing. Utilizing the HOME-ARP Housing Production Goal Calculation, it has been determined Ocean County will produce approximately 14 two-bedroom units. The development of these units will allow Ocean County to produce permanent rental housing for approximately 42 members of qualifying populations on a first-come, first-serve basis.

Describe the specific affordable rental housing production goal that the PJ hopes to achieve and describe how the production goal will address the PJ's priority needs:

Upon award of the RFP, Ocean County will identify contractor(s) and have specifics for the development of permanent affordable rental housing based on the submittals.

Preferences

A preference provides a priority for the selection of applicants who fall into a specific QP or category (e.g., elderly or persons with disabilities) within a QP (i.e., subpopulation) to receive assistance. A *preference* permits an eligible applicant that qualifies for a PJ-adopted preference to be selected for HOME-ARP assistance before another eligible applicant that does not qualify for a preference. A *method of prioritization* is the process by which a PJ determines how two or more eligible applicants qualifying for the same or different preferences are selected for HOME-ARP assistance. For example, in a project with a preference for chronically homeless, all eligible QP applicants are selected in chronological order for a HOME-ARP rental project except that eligible QP applicants that qualify for the preference of chronically homeless are selected for occupancy based on length of time they have been homeless before eligible QP applicants who do not qualify for the preference of chronically homeless.

Please note that HUD has also described a method of prioritization in other HUD guidance. Section I.C.4 of Notice CPD-17-01 describes Prioritization in CoC Coordinated Entry (CE) as follows:

"Prioritization. In the context of the coordinated entry process, HUD uses the term "Prioritization" to refer to the coordinated entry-specific process by which all persons in need of assistance who use coordinated entry are ranked in order of priority. The coordinated entry prioritization policies are established by the CoC with input from all community stakeholders and must ensure that ESG projects are able to serve clients in accordance with written standards that are established under 24 CFR 576.400(e). In addition, the coordinated entry process must, to the maximum extent feasible, ensure that people with more severe service needs and levels of vulnerability are prioritized for housing and homeless assistance before those with less severe service needs and lower levels of vulnerability. Regardless of how prioritization decisions are implemented, the prioritization process must follow the requirements in Section II.B.3. and Section I.D. of this Notice."

If a PJ is using a CE that has a method of prioritization described in CPD-17-01, then a PJ has preferences and a method of prioritizing those preferences. These must be described in the HOME-ARP allocation plan in order to comply with the requirements of Section IV.C.2 (page 10) of the HOME-ARP Notice.

Adding a preference or limitation not previously described in the plan requires a substantial amendment and a public comment period in accordance with Section V.C.6 of the Notice (page 16).

Identify whether the PJ intends to give preference to one or more qualifying populations or a subpopulation within one or more qualifying populations for any eligible activity or project:

Ocean County intends to give preference to individuals that meet the criteria as defined in the Qualifying Populations section of CPD Notice 21-10. Ocean County and its subgrantees must comply with all applicable fair housing, civil rights, and nondiscrimination requirements including but not limited to those requirements listed in 24 CFR 5.105(a). It is further noted that persons who are eligible for this preference must have the opportunity to participate in all HOME-ARP activities of the PJ in which they are eligible under this Notice, including activities that are not separate or different, and cannot be excluded because of any protected characteristics or preferential status.

If a preference was identified, explain how the use of a preference or method of prioritization will address the unmet need or gap in benefits and services received by individuals and families in the qualifying population or subpopulation of qualifying population, consistent with the PJ's needs assessment and gap analysis:

Ocean County offers a wide variety of supportive services for those experiencing homelessness. These supportive services include but are not limited to mental health services, food and nutrition resources, housing counseling, substance use disorder services and various forms of emergency assistance from various sources. Ocean County's system includes 397 emergency shelter beds and 61 transitional housing beds for a total of 458 beds. This data can be found in the Needs Assessment and Gaps Analysis Table on Page 4 of this plan. Ocean County's 2022 Point-in-Time count revealed 406 of the above mentioned beds were filled on the night of January 25, 2022.

Currently, there are 424 affordable, permanent supportive housing beds for persons experiencing homelessness. The supportive data for this statistic can be found in the Needs Assessment and

Gaps Analysis Table on Page 4 of this plan. There is a shortage of affordable permanent supportive housing for individuals and families within Ocean County. The *Out of Reach 2021* report identifies the housing wage (the amount a household must earn per hour working 40 hours per week, 52 weeks a year in order to pay less than 30% of their income on rent) is \$31.77 in Ocean County.

The application of Ocean County's use of HOME-ARP funds for supportive services and development of affordable rental housing for persons experiencing homelessness will support a continued need for supportive services as well as address an unmet need of affordable rental housing that is detailed in the Needs Assessment and Gaps Analysis.

The addition of 14 HOME-ARP rental units will assist to ease the burden of housing costs for residents of Ocean County that are experiencing homelessness and seeking opportunities for housing stability. These units will offer the additional advantage of being more accessible than traditional affordable housing units. In addition to self-referrals, providers will make referrals for supportive services to get the overall assistance needed by homeless individuals to obtain and maintain self-sufficiency. This will also ensure permanency and a better quality of life for homeless populations of Ocean County.

Limitations in a HOME-ARP rental housing or NCS project

Limiting eligibility for a HOME-ARP rental housing or NCS project is only permitted under certain circumstances.

- PJs must follow all applicable fair housing, civil rights, and nondiscrimination requirements, including but not limited to those requirements listed in 24 CFR 5.105(a). Ocean County will address the unmet needs and gaps in benefits and services of the other qualifying populations that are not included in the preferences through the use of other dedicated affordable rental housing funding including the Community Development Block Grant and the HOME Investment Partnership Program. We will continue to support collaboration between public and private partnerships as well as offer support for affordable rental housing projects.

HOME-ARP Refinancing Guidelines

Ocean County does not intend to use HOME-ARP funds to refinance existing debt secured by multifamily rental housing that is being rehabilitated with HOME-ARP funds.

Additional efforts made by the PJ through the American Rescue Plan Act funding:

Ocean County will use approximately \$25 million of American Rescue Plan Act Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (SLFRF) program to assist with the negative effects left by the COVID 19 pandemic. Of those funds, \$9.5 million will be used to combat the negative economic impacts of the pandemic. Ocean County is implementing the Housing Insecurities and Homelessness Services project. This project is a full spectrum program providing temporary/transitional housing support through rapid re-housing strategies, and fiscal aid and wraparound services to those experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessness. The program will seek to address the housing stabilization needs of individuals and families, and offer financial assistance through rental security deposits, temporary rental assistance, rental application fees, moving expenses and other associated costs on a case-by-case basis. The County is also instituting the Eviction, Foreclosure, and Homelessness Prevention Legal Services Program to prevent the unhousing of seniors. Ocean County will also expand the already instituted Aging and Disability Resource Center (ADRC) program as well as allocate funding to address public health issues including negative mental health and behavioral health impacts resulting from and exacerbated by the pandemic. The On Point co-responder program will divert individuals experiencing mental illness from the criminal justice system and will provide critical professional partnership support to law enforcement operations. The child and adolescent grief and trauma programs will treat immediate complicated grief instances as well as prevent future concerns such as mental illness and substance misuse in adulthood.





 (1) development and support of affordable housing,
 (2) tenant-based rental assistance (TBRA),
 (3) provision of supportive services; and
 (4) acquisition and development of non-congregate shelter units.

A participating jurisdiction may use up to 10% of the award for Nonprofit Operating and Capacity Building Assistance and 15% of the award for Administration and Planning.



Supportive Services

 ${\sf HOME\textsc{-}ARP}$ funds may be used to provide services that help households maintain housing stability and quality of life.

These may include support with finding and applying for:

- Housing
 Financial assistance for moving costs
- Childcare
 Legal services
 Mental health
- 6. Substance use services, and more

Supportive services may be provided to individuals and families who are not already receiving the services (limited) through another program. PJs may establish a separate supportive services activity or activities or may combine supportive services with other HOME-ARP activities.

Development and Support of Affordable Housing

For affordable rental assistance only, beneficiaries are expanded to include low-income (LI) households in addition to targeted qualifying populations. The rationale for this is to make affordable rental housing projects financially viable.

HOME ARP will help reduce debt service and cover operating costs to make projects financially viable over the compliance period, which is 15 years, regardless of amount of investment or activity.

HOME ARP funds may not be used for home buyer housing or homeowner rehab.

Tenant-Based **Rental Assistance**


A rent subsidy to help households afford housing costs, such as rent and security deposits. "Tenant-based" means the subsidy is attached to the household, and they can use it to rent any rental unit that meets program guidelines and whose landlord is willing to accept the subsidy payment.

- Eligible costs:

 1. Rental assistance
 2. Security deposits
 3. Utility payments, as part of rental assistance
 4. Utility deposit payments, as part of rental assistance or security deposit assistance
 5. Cost of housing inspections
 6. Administration of HOME ARP TBRA

A county may provide up to 100% of rent and utility costs (a difference between HOME ARP and HOME Program).
