Executive Summary

The City of Pasadena has been allocated \$3,042,435 of HOME American Recovery Plan Act (HOME-ARP) funding from the US Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). To receive the HOME-ARP allocation, the City must develop a HOME-ARP Allocation Plan that will become part of the PY2021 Annual Action Plan through a substantial amendment.

HOME-ARP Eligible Qualifying Populations and Activities

CPD Notice 21-10 establishes requirements for funds appropriated under section 3205 of the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 for the HOME Investment Partnerships Program (HOME) to provide homelessness assistance and supportive services. The American Rescue Plan Act (ARP) defines qualifying populations as:

- 1. Homeless, as defined in section 103(a) of the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act;
- 2. At risk of homelessness, as defined in section 401 of the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act;
- 3. Fleeing, or attempting to flee domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, or stalking (as defined by HUD in 24 CFR 5.2003) or human trafficking (as outlined in the Trafficking Victims Protection Act of 2000 as amended [22 USC 7102]; and
- 4. Part of other populations, where providing supportive services or assistance under section 212(a) of the National Affordable Housing Act 42 USC 12472(a) would:
 - a. Prevent a family's homelessness;
 - b. Serve those with the greatest risk of housing instability.

HOME-ARP funds may be used to benefit qualifying populations through:

- 1. Tenant-based Rental Assistance (TBRA);
- 2. Development and support of affordable housing;
- 3. Provision of supportive services;
- 4. Acquisition and development of non-congregate shelter;
- 5. Nonprofit capacity building and operating assistance; and
- 6. Program planning and administration.

The needs assessment and gap analysis identified the following needs and gaps that may be addressed using HOME-ARP funds:

To ensure broad input into the HOME-ARP Allocation Plan from stakeholders and the public, the City engaged in consultation with stakeholders and the public, including virtual consultation sessions, direct contact with HUD-required organizations, a 25-day public comment period, and a public hearing.

In accordance with CPD Notice 21-10, before developing its HOME-ARP allocation plan, at a minimum, the City must consult with:

- CoC(s) serving the jurisdiction's geographic area,
- Homeless service providers,
- Domestic violence service providers,
- Veterans' groups,
- Public housing agencies (PHAs),
- Public agencies that address the needs of the qualifying populations, and
- Public or private organizations that address fair housing, civil rights, and the needs of persons with disabilities.

Describe the consultation process including methods used and dates of consultation:

Consultation with community-based organizations, commissions, city departments, and other local stakeholders were conducted, which contributed to the assessment of community needs regarding homeless prevention services. The City is both the local entitlement jurisdiction, as well as the Continuum of Care (CoC) Collaborative Applicant. The City collaborated with the Pasadena CoC, also known as the Pasadena Partnership to End Homelessness, to respond to the needs of people experiencing homelessness locally through coordinated planning for and allocation of funding. City staff engaged in collaborative efforts to consult with commissions, city departments, County department, service providers, and beneficiaries of entitlement programs in order to develop strategic priorities and strategies for the allocation of HOME-ARP funding. This consultation process allowed the City to avoid duplication of services regarding homeless prevention. City staff facilitated a comprehensive outreach to enhance coordination and discuss new approaches and efficiencies with assisted housing, governmental health, mental health, service agencies, and other stakeholders that utilize funding for eligible activities, projects and programs.

Consultation includes: feedback on local need and funding priorities; review and comment on proposed funding allocations prior to funding award; direct input in performance and evaluation measures; direct input in the establishment of a universal intake and assessment tool; sharing of data collection; and guidance on best practices for utilizing HOME-ARP funds in the best manner.

Summary of feedback received from consulted organizations

Consultation revealed strong support for eviction prevention services, and legal services for tenants. Stakeholders expressed concern of the ending of the State's rental assistance program, and the lack of continued help for those that may still help paying their rent. Multiple participants encouraged the development of a tenant-based rental assistance program due to the sunset of the local eviction moratorium. Fair housing service providers reported an increase in 30-90 day eviction notices. All qualifying populations were mentioned as having a need, and want considerations of priorities towards those with the highest risk of homelessness.

Public Participation

The City provided a 25-day public comment period beginning November 18, 2021 and ending December 13, 2021, and held a public hearing on December 13, 2021. A combined notice of public comment period and public hearing were published in local newspapers of general circulations. In addition, the public notice was posted to the City's Housing Department website.

Efforts to Broaden Public Participation

The City of Pasadena has established advisory bodies to assist in the allocation and monitoring of federal entitlement funds. The two (2) advisory boards are the Human Services Commission, which consists of fifteen participating members, and the Northwest Commission, which consists of eleven participating members. All participating members represent various segments of the community including: 1) low/moderate income residents; 2) minority groups; 3) residents from area where community development activities are ongoing or proposed; 4) elderly; 5) handicapped; and 6) businesses. Meetings with these two bodies was helpful to gather input on how to allocate funding that best serves the community.

The City extended the comment period to 25 days, sent e-mails to the community stakeholders requesting comments, and provided staff reports to the public on eligible uses of HOME-ARP funding. The public hearing was held virtually, which allows the public option for closed caption for the hearing impaired, and Spanish translation.

Summary of comments and recommendations received

The City received comments from the Human Service Commission to increase eviction prevention services in anticipation of the lifting eviction moratorium.

Size and Demographic Composition of Qualifying Populations

Homeless

Based on recent homeless count there are 512 people experience homelessness. People of color continue to be disproportionately represented among people experiencing homelessness across the country. In Pasadena, 32% of our unhoused residents identify as Black or African American despite only representing 8% of Pasadena's general population. Similarly, people identifying as Hispanic or Latino in Pasadena experience homelessness at disproportionate rates. In 2022, the Hispanic/Latino subpopulation comprised 44% of people experiencing homelessness compared to 37% in 2020, while the overall population of Pasadena is only 33%.

At-risk of Homelessness

There are 8,845 households that earn 0% - 30% AMI, of which 80% experience at least one housing problem. Of the 7,080 households in this income bracket that experience at least one housing problem, White households make up 37.1%, Black/African American households make up 18.3%, and Asian households make up 14.7%. Twenty-eight percent of the households are of Hispanic ethnicity.

<u>Fleeing, or Attempting to Flee, Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, Sexual Assault, Stalking, or Human Trafficking</u>

In the recent homeless count, 130 persons were identified as fleeing domestic violence. Twenty-four were unsheltered.

Other Populations

Other populations, as defined by HOME-ARP include those who:

- 1. Are currently housed and at risk of repeat homelessness;
- 2. Have incomes below 30% AMI and are experiencing severe housing cost burden; or
- 3. Otherwise meet the definition of at risk of homelessness and have incomes between 30% and 50% AMI.

Data collected by HUD, over 21% of households in Pasadena that are 80% AMI or less experience at least one severe housing problem. There are 6,010 households that earn 30% - 50% AMI, 56.1% experience at least one severe housing problem. Of the 3,375 households in this income bracket that experience at least one severe housing problem, White households make up 35.9%, Black/African American households make up 11.3%,

and Asian households make up 10.5%. Over 37% of the households are of Hispanic ethnicity.

Unmet Housing and Service Needs of Qualifying Populations

The City of Pasadena currently partners with local homeless service providers to provide outreach and housing placement. A gap analysis shows that there is a 267 homeless shelter gap in the City for homeless adults. The need for more shelters is high, but locations and space is limited. A review of community data shows a lack of affordable housing for household earning less than 30% AMI. There are 7,080 households that earn less than 30% AMI and are at risk of homelessness, however there are only 1,711 affordable units for this income level. 5,369 more affordable units are needed to meet the needs of this demographic. There is a need for legal services for households who are currently in the eviction process. The City of Pasadena currently partners with local homeless service providers to provide outreach and housing placement. An analysis of the community shows 130 persons fleeing domestic violence are homeless in Pasadena. However, 104 of those person are in some type of shelter, while 24 are unsheltered. This demographic is relatively small however, there is a need for 10 housing units for persons fleeing DV. Data shows that 80% (8,845) of households earning less than 30% AMI are experiencing at least one housing burdens. This demographic is at greatest risk of housing instability. There is a need for legal services for households who are currently in the eviction process and have received illegal eviction notices.

Current Resources Available to Assist Qualifying Populations

Department of Housing, with increased local and state funding, has expanded investments in critical services to address homelessness in our city. This funding has enabled the creation of street outreach teams to ensure people are getting connected to services and resources within the community and housing location programs to assist with locating apartments and building relationships with local landlords in order to house people faster. In 2021, 277 people (214 households) experiencing homelessness in Pasadena were permanently housed through programs operated in Pasadena and other parts of the County. Pasadena supportive housing projects demonstrate a 93% housing retention rate among participants, even among those with serious mental illness and substance use disorders. Supportive housing is an intervention best suited for people with higher service needs, particularly those who have experienced chronic homelessness. To live stably in their communities and prevent returns to homelessness, these individuals need long-term support. Supportive housing provides a safe and stable living environment coupled with on-site services for as long as people are living in their homes. People living in supportive housing contribute 30% of their income towards rent, with the remainder subsidized. Informed by the Housing First framework, supportive housing is a proven solution for some of the most vulnerable people experiencing homelessness,

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allowing them to not only live but thrive in their communities. Rapid rehousing is a strategy also informed by Housing First which quickly re-houses people experiencing homelessness through time-limited financial assistance and targeted supportive services. This intervention is designed to help individuals and families who do not necessarily need ongoing and intensive supportive services to exit homelessness and regain stability. Rapid rehousing is an intervention best suited for populations that are lower acuity and do not have long-term barriers that impact employment or the ability to retain private rental housing after assistance terms out. The goal of these programs is to minimize the harmful outcomes of homelessness by helping people regain self-sufficiency and return to stable housing as soon as possible. Research on rapid-rehousing and its efficacy is still emerging, however preliminary findings show the model has been most successful among family and veteran populations. Emergency shelter plays an effective role in the housing crisis response system because it enables people to take refuge from the streets and begin to stabilize and regain health while connecting to needed services and permanent housing. Pasadena's emergency shelter programs support the flow from a housing crisis to housing stability by promoting linkages to necessary supportive services and connections to appropriate permanent housing so that people can move through the system more quickly. Motel vouchers prove to be a valuable resource in working with people who have higher barriers to engagement so they are able to get connected to the existing Coordinated Entry System (CES) and start on the path towards stability in permanent housing. Increased emergency shelter capacity through motel vouchers reduces the time households spend unsheltered on the streets and provides a safe space for people who may be reluctant or unable to live in a traditional congregate shelter setting.

Shelter, Housing and Service Delivery System Gaps

The gaps in shelter identify a need of 267 beds, however homeless shelter in the area are at their capacity and there is a need for additional locations to increase the bed count. This would address the need for qualifying populations' need for shelter. The bigger need is in affordable housing. The current gap in Pasadena shows 7,098 affordable units are needed to meet the needs of the community.

The shelter gap methodology utilized the January point-in-time count of sheltered individuals and individuals in families, using the number of unsheltered persons subtracted from the number of shelter beds available in the City. Using data from the ACS and CHAS, the number of people in the City who cannot affordable housing subtracted from the number of avaiablibe affordable housing units.

To identify gaps in the services delivery system, the City consulted stakeholders and drew on experience with organization city-wide. Consultation revealed gaps in legal services for renters who have received eviction notices prior to the lifting of the eviction moratorium.

Characteristics of Housing Associated with Increased Rick of Homelessness for Other Populations

The Pasadena Housing Department has identified over 50 affordable housing units with City deed restrictions that are set to expired within 3-6 months. As a result, landlords will set current rents at market rates, essential making units unaffordable for current occupying tenants. As a result, tenants who are living in expiring deed restricted housing face the greatest housing instability with household AMI below 50%. Without the deed restriction, housing cost burdens raise well above 50% of household income making tenants high risk for homelessness.

Priority Needs for Qualifying Populations

The top priority needs identified for qualifying populations are affordable housing, and supportive services including legal representation and legal service to assist with proceeding associated with eviction.

HOME-ARP Activities

The City has surveyed service provider to assess their capacity to provide eviction prevention services, and found that virtually all service providers are at their capacity due to staffing shortages. The City determined to administer eligible activities directly to the community and will not solicit any applications for funding. The City has developed a strategy utilizing HOME-ARP, CDBG-CV and Treasury-ARP funds, known as the eviction prevention program. The City has the capacity and funding to create a program for rental assistance, increase legal services, and payment of back rent.

Use if HOME-ARP Funding

The City will utilize 100% of its HOME-ARP funding towards the implementation of a Tenant-Based Rental Assistance Eviction Prevention TBRA-EP Program, with \$2,586,070 towards TBRA, and \$456,365 for administration

Rationale for Uses of HOME-ARP Funding

The City has allocated over \$3m towards shelters, and service delivery systems. The City's affordable housing gap is at historic highs, and there are no funds allocated toward increasing the affordable housing in the short-term. As our local eviction moratorium sunsets, we expect an increase in evictions. The TBRA-EP program will help to assist those who continue to struggle paying their rent as has receive notice of eviction from their current residence.

Home-ARP Housing Production Goals

The City plans to assist 50 households through tenant based rental assistance eviction prevention program. Support will include \$150,000 from Treasury-ARP for legal services including legal representation, and \$250,000 in CDBG-CV funds for payment of back rent for those enrolling in the TBRA-EP program.

HOME-ARP Activities

Program Eligibility

The TBRA-EP Program will accept applications for enrollment from all qualifying populations that meet the following criteria:

- Household income does not exceed 50% AMI
- Has insufficient resources immediately available to attain housing stability; and
- Has written notification from landlord/owner that right to occupy their current housing will be terminated.

Preferences

City staff will evaluation each applications to ensure eligibility. Eligible applications will receive a score based on the following preference points:

- Currently Living in Expiring Deed Restricted Rental Housing (6 points)
- Households with Single Income Source (5 points)
- Current Rental Unit Located in CDBG Census Tract (4 points)
- Household Income 30 50% AMI (3 points)
- Households with 4 or more members (2 points)

HOME-ARP Refinancing Guidelines

The City will not use HOME-ARP funding for refinancing.
