PY 21 Substantial Amendment
HOME-ARP Allocation Plan**

Introduction

The City was allocated \$1,627,488 in American Rescue Plan HOME-ARP funding. The HOME ARP funds must primarily benefit qualifying families and individuals that are homeless, at risk of becoming homeless, victims of domestic violence or in other vulnerable populations. Eligible program activities include the development of affordable rental housing, acquisition and development of non-congregate shelter, tenant based rental assistance and the provision of supportive services.

Consultation

The City used several methods of consultation. An informational session was held on June 30, 2022 to provide an overview of HOME ARP eligible activities, qualifying populations and answer questions about the program. A survey was sent to member agencies of the Saginaw County Consortium of Homeless Assistance Providers on November 30, 2022. Informal meetings and conversations with staff from the Community Services Division have been held on a continual basis since June 30, 2022.

Summarize feedback received and results of upfront consultation with these entities:

Based on survey responses there was a general consensus that the City is lacking quality affordable rental housing. Service providers also agree there is a need for those young adults exiting the foster care system.

A public hearing was held December 21, 2022. 10 residents were in attendance along with 2 staff persons. A public notice was printed in the Saginaw News inviting comments from the public for 15 days on January 26, 2023.

The public hearing was advertised in The Saginaw News. Service agencies were invited to the public hearing. Announcements were made to the Board of Directors of the Saginaw County Consortium of Homeless Assistance Providers.

Describe the size and demographic composition of qualifying populations within the PJ's boundaries:

Homeless as defined in 24 CFR 91.5

Every year it is required by HUD for the Saginaw County Consortium of Homeless Assistance Providers to do a Point in Time Count which is a physical count of the homeless population in the community. Based on the last Point in Time count there were 255 households that were homeless in the City of Saginaw. This number included 47 households with at least one child. The annual homeless count for 2021 was 1,275.

At Risk of Homelessness as defined in 24 CFR 91.5

According to data provided by the Saginaw County Consortium of Homeless Assistance Providers there were 666 families experiencing 1st time homelessness in 2021. Although determining exactly how many people are at risk of homelessness is near impossible this number is a true representation of the amount of people who are at risk of becoming homeless.

Fleeing, or Attempting to Flee, Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, Sexual Assault, Stalking, or Human Trafficking, as defined by HUD in the Notice

Based on the last Point in Time count there were 38 homeless victims of domestic violence. Using the Underground Railroad of Saginaw's 2021 annual report they served 98 households with over 36,000 nights of housing assistance.

Other populations requiring services or housing assistance to prevent homelessness and other populations at greatest risk of housing instability, as defined by HUD in the Notice

There were 22 Veterans counted in the Point in Time Count.

Identify and consider the current resources available to assist qualifying populations, including congregate and non-congregate shelter units, supportive services, TBRA, and affordable and permanent supportive rental housing (Optional):

There are seven homeless shelters in the City of Saginaw. One specifically serves victims of domestic violence as defined in the notice. There is one that solely serves the youth population aged 12-17 and one that serves chronically homeless males. There are two motel voucher projects, five transitional housing projects and one safe haven. There are three agencies that offer an eviction diversion program in an effort to prevent homelessness. Saginaw also has nine rapid rehousing projects and six permanent supportive housing projects. The shelters have experienced capacity issues.

Describe the unmet housing and service needs of qualifying populations:

Homeless as defined in 24 CFR 91.5

The Point in Time count gap analysis identified a gap of nine beds and three units.

At Risk of Homelessness as defined in 24 CFR 91.5

\$15 million of Covid Emergency Rental Assistance funds were invested in the City of Saginaw to help families avoid eviction thereby decreasing the number of those at risk of becoming homeless and proving the need of that population. During the last program year the City assisted 25 families in its own homeless prevention programs.

Fleeing, or Attempting to Flee, Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, Sexual Assault, Stalking, or Human Trafficking, as defined by HUD in the Notice

The Underground Railroad of Saginaw serves this population specifically. Since 2020 they have noted a 37% increase in denials due to a full emergency shelter. In 2022 1,121 adults and 1,376 children were turned away. The Underground Railroad also provides supportive services that include transitional housing, permanent supportive housing and rapid rehousing assistance. Finding quality affordable rental housing and other available shelter beds is an issue.

Other populations requiring services or housing assistance to prevent homelessness and other populations at greatest risk of housing instability as defined by HUD in the Notice

According to the City of Saginaw's master plan 63.6 % of renters are cost burdened which is a characteristic associated with instability and an increased risk of homelessness.

Identify any gaps within the current shelter and housing inventory as well as the service delivery system:

With the shelters at capacity one barrier is the lack of quality affordable rental housing for those exiting the shelter. According to the City Housing Analysis 2021-2026 there is an undersupply of 3,368 affordable rental units. Based on consultation with the service providers it is believed having more affordable rental housing would decrease the recidivism.

Consultation and survey responses identified gaps in the inventory.

The City of Saginaw will solicit applications from qualified homeless assistance providers. Applications will be reviewed by staff for agency capacity, activity eligibility and compliance with all applicable guidelines. Accepted applications will be presented to the Human Planning commission for further review. The applicants will present orally to the Human Planning Commission by invitation and those selected for further consideration will go to City Council for final approval.

 The City will administer eligible activities through sub recipient agreements.

Describe how the PJ will distribute HOME-ARP funds in accordance with its priority needs identified in its needs assessment and gap analysis:

With the information reviewed there is a need for all of the activities. It was determined the funds would be split equally among the activities. All applicants will be required to apply to the State of Michigan for additional funds that were allocated to Region 5. More opportunities for additional funds will be available with future CDBG, ESG, and HOME entitlement awards.

Describe how the characteristics of the shelter and housing inventory, service delivery system, and the needs identified in the gap analysis provided a rationale for the plan to fund eligible activities:

The need for additional quality affordable rental housing has been expressed by every service provider. The City of Saginaw's housing analysis states 93% of homes in Saginaw are aged over 50 years. This makes the maintenance and upkeep cost prohibitive and energy inefficient which leads to repeat homelessness. Due to the capacity issues and circumstances created from the pandemic additional non congregate shelter is needed. Eliminating barriers to supportive housing was also stated by all responding to the survey.

Six new rental units are estimated to be completed by the HOME ARP allocation. Additional funds will be sought from the State of Michigan for the project.

Describe the specific affordable rental housing production goal that the PJ hopes to achieve and describe how the production goal will address the PJ's priority needs:

The amount of HOME ARP dollars awarded to the City of Saginaw is not enough to resolve the issue of homelessness but with six new affordable rental housing units families can exit homelessness and have a better chance of sustaining outside of the homeless system. Families will be provided supportive services to assist with other needs,

The PJ intends to give preference to those that are homeless as defined 24 CFR 91.5. There will be no preference given to subpopulations.

The City of Saginaw intends to give preference to homeless individuals to address the gap in beds available for homeless individuals as seen in the Point in Time gap analysis.
