

Office of Lead Hazard Control & Healthy Homes

HUD's Office of Lead Hazard Control and Healthy Homes has announced the availability of \$33,363,080 million *for* States and federally recognized Native American Tribes (that have an U.S. EPA-authorized lead abatement certification program), cities, counties/parishes. Also, other units of local government who are currently not an active direct recipient of a Lead-Based Paint Hazard Control or Lead Hazard Reduction Demonstration (with capacity needs), are eligible to apply. In addition, jurisdictions that have served on any active grant as a subgrantee but not a direct recipient, are eligible for the program.

The LHR Capacity Building Program will prepare communities to apply for future rounds of full lead hazard grant program funding. The LHR Capacity Building Program will focus on developing the infrastructure to identify and control lead-based paint hazards in privately-owned rentals or owner-occupied housing. The capacity building program focus areas include training staff and contractors, building partnerships and local coalitions, identifying, and assessing potential target areas, develop and implement outreach and marketing, and develop program data sharing and referrals.
