Please accept this letter as the annual certification of the State of Delaware's compliance with the Keys Amendment (Section 1616(e) of the Social Security Act; 45 CFR Part 1937) and the regulations enacted pursuant thereto.

The State of Delaware has designated the Department of Health & Social Services (DHSS) with authority over the development, administration, and enforcement of standards for the licensure of the health care facilities and homes referenced below and attached to this correspondence. As required by the Amendment, the State creates statutes and regulations, conducts statewide inspections, writes appropriate reports, and takes enforcement actions as necessary. The covered providers include skilled and intermediate care nursing facilities, rest (residential) homes, assisted living agencies/facilities, rest (family care) homes, group and neighborhood homes and boarding homes, and all institutions and organizations for children. This list encompasses residential care facilities in which a significant number of SSI and/or SSDI recipients may reside.

I am pleased to report that DHSS certifies that the State of Delaware and the applicable facilities are in compliance with the Keys Amendment. DHSS strives to improve and ensure that SSA recipients live in safe and healthy environments and remain an integral part of our community.

ATTACHMENT STANDARDS FOR SSI RESIDENTIAL FACILITIES

Because of concern in Congress that Supplemental Security Income (SSI) funds might be utilized in support of substandard facilities, an Amendment to Public Law 94-566 (Keys Amendment) requires that States establish and enforce standards for facilities where a significant number of SSI recipients reside or are likely to reside.

Enforcement Procedures

Enforcement procedures include periodic inspection of facilities, provision of technical assistance, and use of a warning system to provide deficient facilities a chance to comply and for residents to move out if the facilities fail to do so. In Delaware, these facilities have been treated as four groups, which are described below.

Group I - Skilled and Intermediate Care Nursing Facilities

Nursing Home Regulations for Skilled and Intermediate Care were amended by the State Board of Health in July 1977 and periodically revised thereafter. These amended regulations provide standards appropriate to the needs of residents who, in accordance with a physician's orders, need medical services and care requiring the competence of a registered professional nurse. The regulations cover the licensing requirements and procedures and include the following:

Group II - Rest (Residential) Homes, Assisted Living Agencies, and Rest (Family Care) Homes

Rest (Residential) Homes (4 or more residents) - Regulations covering Rest (Residential) Homes were amended in August 1977 and subsequent revisions include standards appropriate to the needs of persons who are normally able to manage activities of daily living, but require some personal care services to ensure their safety, comfort, nutritional needs, and well-being. These regulations are based on the common needs of the residents and minimal health standards. These regulations were further revised in February 1979, requiring the Rest (Residential) Homes to have a licensed administrator when the home has more than 8 residents. Many changes have occurred in this field especially in the type of care and the delivery of care. The January 2012 revisions updated the regulations to the current standard of care for the population served. These regulations include the following:

Assisted Living Facilities

Regulations covering Assisted Living Agencies were adopted on October 10, 2002 and provide a comprehensive community-based residential long-term care continuum that provides the necessary level of services to a dependent elderly person or persons with disabilities in the appropriate environment. These regulations are to promote and ensure the health, safety and well-being of all residents of assisted living facilities. These regulations are also meant to ensure that service providers will be accountable to their residents and the Department and to differentiate assisted living care from skilled nursing care. The essential nature of assisted living is to offer living arrangements to medically stable persons who do not require skilled nursing services and supervision. The regulations establish the minimal acceptable level of services for residents of assisted living facilities. These regulations include the following:

Group Home Facilities for Persons with AIDS

The following regulations were adopted by DHSS on November 10, 2001.

The regulations are designed specifically for Group Homes for 16 or less persons with AIDS and establish the minimal acceptable level of living and programmatic conditions in such homes. Only those residents shall be admitted with an established diagnosis and disease progression such that the resident requires a routine and frequent combination of physician, professional nursing, and supportive services. Provisions shall be made for the transfer and/or discharge of residents when acute care (hospital) services are required or requested.
