As communities combat the coronavirus outbreak, HUD is highlighting stories of communities coming together to help their neighbors in need.

<u>Kansas City, MO</u> – A number of Kansas City (KCMO) nonprofits and service agencies have teamed up to serve the homeless population during the coronavirus outbreak. A portion of a street in downtown KCMO was blocked off to make room for large white tents where the homeless can pick up a meal, shower, and get a health check in an environment that allows for more social distancing requirements. While the area was set up primarily to serve the homeless, agencies are serving more low-income and families in need due to job loss or decrease in resources due to the pandemic. <u>Des Moines, IA</u> – The City of Des Moines, Central Iowa Shelter & Services (CISS) and eight local restaurants have partnered to help feed Des Moines residents in need during the COVID-19 pandemic. The City provided \$350,000 in CDBG COVID relief funding

for the *Mulberry Street Café Initiative* that pays each of the eight metro-area restaurants to prepare hot grab and go meals to distribute at various locations across Des Moines. The initiative also supports these small businesses to bring laid off restaurant staff back to work. <u>Minneapolis, KS</u> - Personal protective equipment is in high demand across the country. Virginia Proctor, a resident of the Minneapolis Housing Authority in Kansas is doing her part to help with the shortage. For Proctor, making masks is personal. Her daughter is a healthcare worker at the Salina Regional Hospital. As a seamstress, Proctor is used to sewing clothes for family and friends. Recently, however, she turned her dining room into a makeshift sewing factory, cranking out lots of masks.

Proctor's daughter reached out to for her help to support the need for masks at the hospital. With the state's stay at home order in place, Proctor couldn't think of a better way to utilize her time. With material donated by the hospital, Proctor has sewn over 400 masks. "I'm so proud that I can help healthcare workers who need it the most," she said.

Omaha, NE – At last count, Youth Emergency Services (YES) says there are nearly 3,000 homeless or near homeless youth in Omaha. YES is concerned that many of them are no longer coming to their center for food or resources, as they normally have. So, with their mobile pantry full, staff are going out and looking for youth in need. YES staff are calling and using social media to find youth, to ensure they don't end up on the streets. "We don't want the number of homeless youth to go up because of this, so If we can get them food and other resources, then they will be fine," said, Mary Fraser Mients, YES Executive Director. <u>St. Louis, MO</u> - As newly designated HUD EnVision Centers, Friendly Temple and Better Family Life, Inc. provide resources and a holistic approach to help St. Louis residents achieve self-sufficiency. Recognizing the need for more resources to assist families impacted by COVID-19, both agencies sought out philanthropic support. Friendly Temple and Better Family Life were awarded \$20,000 and \$15,000 grants, respectively, from the Deaconess Foundation COVID-19 Equitable Relief and Recovery fund to help families in need.

Recently, the two EnVision Centers joined forces with the CARESTL Foundation for a food give away, including vegan meals, for individuals and families who have been economically impacted by COVID-19. In January, Jack did a similar walk for Shelter Houses, raising almost \$4,000. With the heat index reaching 105 degrees in July, Jack just kept walking and thinking about his goal. <u>Bird City, KS</u> - While individuals with sewing skills have been hard at work making masks for donation to area hospitals and healthcare workers, Deb Smith is making headbands for essential workers. Smith is the Executive Director of the Bird City Housing Authority in the NW corner of Kansas.

It all started when Smith's daughter, a respiratory therapist in Superior, NE told her mom that the masks protecting against the virus were hurting the back of co-workers' ears. From there, Smith decided to sew headbands that attach to the masks and make them more comfortable.

The headbands are made from colorful material and ribbons and have buttons that say, "homemade with love." Smith and two public housing residents (who wish to remain anonymous) have made over 100 headbands for healthcare workers and family in Nebraska, California, and a nursing home in Texas where Smith's in-laws reside. Smith adds, "Just a small gesture for those on the front lines."
