Dear Tribal Leader:

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I am writing to request your assistance in sharing information about the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) and free tax preparation services for your community.

One in five eligible workers does not claim the EITC, probably because they are unaware of it. This is unfortunate, because the EITC is an important tax benefit for working people who earn lower or moderate incomes.

The EITC offsets taxes, supplements very low wages, encourages work, and can help cover any federal income tax workers may owe at tax time. Besides offsetting taxes, workers earning lower wages may also get cash back through the EITC refund. Eligible workers who claim the EITC on their tax return can receive a refund even if they do not owe income tax.

Single and married people who worked full- or part-time at some point during 2017 can qualify for the EITC, if their income is below the following limits:
