GREETINGS FROM THE ADMINISTRATOR





COVID-19 Crisis. Everyone is aware the United States is currently in a crisis attempting to blunt and reduce the effect of the highly contagious COVID-19 pandemic. This has led to many Tribes issuing emergency shutdowns, travel bans and requirements limiting contact between TDHE/Tribal staff and their tribal members through physical contact or near proximity. Please keep ONAP informed of when your TDHE and Tribal Housing Departments who administer NAHASDA funds are open and able to

transact business. ONAP understands that many offices are closed or have limited hours

which makes it difficult to provide the support you need. Don't hesitate to call us during regular work hours if you need assistance.

ONAP is also limiting contact between staff and all employees are currently working via telework. What this means for you is that while all staff are working from home, they are checking their office phones regularly to see if they have calls from Grantees who have questions or need help with operating their programs. There may be a delayed response to your inquiries, but the EWONAP staff will get back to you. <u>Here</u> is a list of Frequently Asked Questions or FAQs that outline HUD's positions on how these issues effect ONAP's delivery of services, etc.

HUD Jobs. HUD is looking for good employees who know the field of Indian Housing and have a focus on helping Tribal members achieve stability through safe, decent and affordable housing. Eastern Woodlands is looking to fill two positions this year. Two are currently open: both are **Grants Management Specialists**. Each of these is a skilled position requiring a strong working knowledge of HUD ONAP programs, strong oral and writing skills and an ability to work with Tribal officials and to work as a team toward achieving success in issuing, monitoring and evaluating grants by HUD to Tribes and TDHEs. One GM specialist will be listed as a limited appointment in that their role will be tied specifically to assisting monitoring of the Indian Housing Block Grant Competitive Grants. So while technically limited, the position is expected to continue so long as the competitive grants are open. Their duty station will be in Chicago and the process for hiring may involve some imaginative work arounds, as our HUD office is staffed via telework, but the hiring process will continue. The new hires will be eligible for telework due to the COVID-19 outbreak but still will need to live in the greater Chicago area in order to be in the office every week once that crisis has passed, except when traveling.

The new IHBG Competitive Grant NOFA is expected to be published sometime this summer but may take a back seat to the CARE Act funding just approved by Congress and signed by the President. NOFA stands for **Notice of Funding Availability** and is published in the Federal Register. Our ONAP Office in Washington has its workload cut out for it getting the appropriate clearance lined up for the CARES Act but it is a priority for ONAP in its mission to assist TDHEs and Tribes during this Pandemic crisis.

In closing, I wish you good health and urge you to stay well by limiting contact with others, washing your hands frequently and seeking medical assistance if you feel you may be suffering from this Virus.

IMPORTANT HUD REPORTING EXTENSION INFORMATION

HUD's Office of Native American Programs (ONAP) recognizes that, in addition to providing and maintaining affordable housing, Tribes and Tribally Designated Housing Entities are coordinating emergency health services, emergency housing services, law enforcement, and other essential governmental services in response to the Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic. ONAP also recognizes that these services are being provided while offices are closed, or staff is significantly reduced or teleworking.

In an effort to provide some relief for Tribes impacted by COVID-19, ONAP is extending the due dates for certain reports. Effective immediately, ONAP is extending, <u>by 90 calendar days</u>, the original due date for the following:

- · IHBG Annual Performance Reports
- Quarterly and Final Federal Financial Reports (SF-425) for all ONAP managed grants:
 - o IHBG Formula and Competitive
 - o ICDBG and ICDBG IT
 - o ROSS
 - o Tribal HUD VASH
- Tribal HUD VASH Reports (HUD-50058)
- · ICDBG Closeouts and Final Status and Evaluation Reports

The 90-days extension currently applies to original due dates through June 30, 2020.

ONAP is taking these actions pursuant to a March 19, 2020, the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) Memorandum M-20-17, entitled, "Administrative Relief for Recipients and Applicants of Federal Financial Assistance Directly Impacted by the Novel Coronavirus (COVID-19) due to Loss of Operations."

Through this memo, OMB has also automatically extends the due date for audits required by Single Audit Act (chapter 75 of title 31, United States Code), implemented by 2 C.F.R. part 200, subpart F, by six (6) months from the normal due date. This applies to grantees that have fiscal year-ends through June 30, 2020.

The U.S. Department of the Interior and U.S. The Department of Treasury announced today through a <u>Dear Tribal</u> <u>Leader Letter</u> from the Assistant Secretary of Indian Affairs that they will be holding at least two Tribal Leader Consultations to determine how to distribute \$8 billion in funds set aside for tribal governments and tribal entities in the <u>Coronavirus Relief Fund</u> within <u>The CARES Act</u>. The Section 184 Indian Home Loan Guarantee Program is a home mortgage specifically



designed for American Indian and Alaska Native families, Alaska Villages, Tribes, or Tribally Designated Housing Entities. Section 184 loans can be used both on and off native lands for new construction, rehab, the purchase of an existing home, or for refinancing.

Section 184 is synonymous with home ownership in Indian Country. As of March 2016, the Section 184 program has guaranteed over 33,728 loans, which represents over \$5.4 billion dollars in guaranteed funds.

Within the Eastern Woodlands region, over 3,938 loans have been made

bringing \$565 million in private capital directly to Tribal Members. Tribes and TDHEs can also use Section 184 loans to achieve their housing development goals. Some benefits include:

- Low residential mortgage interest rates
- Lower monthly fees than standard PMI
- One time loan guarantee fee (1.5%)
- May utilize up to 15% of loan funds for site infrastructure costs
- Low down payment
- No household income restrictions
- Buy, Rehab, Refi or Build
- Finance up to 20 units at a time.

HUD ONAP Title VI Loan Guarantee Program- Title

VI loans enable Indian Housing Block Grant recipients to leverage up to 5 times their IHBG 'Need' funding to finance affordable housing development by pledging future IHBG grant funds as security for repayment of the loan. A private lender provides the financing and HUD provides the guarantee to the lender. To visit the Title VI website, click here. ONAP's Office of Loan Guarantee has advised that Title VI loans are limited this fiscal year, so the first funded loans will go to applicants whose loan package is the most complete first.
