The <u>Eastern Woodlands Office</u> (EWONAP) serves 66 Tribes within 16 states and 6 HUD regions. EWONAP administers over \$90 million in IHBG funds, over \$60 million in Section 184 Native American Home Mortgages, and approximately \$5 million in ICDBG funds in its region annually.



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Aho!

Greetings at the end of a long and trying summer. Your ONAP office has been extremely busy getting out CARES Act grants for both the IHBG abbreviated IHP's that as of this writing total 55 grantees, three who have declined to apply and four that are in the process of applying. In addition, the ICDBG-Imminent Threat Competitive Grants that were issued on a first come-first served basis should all have received their grants or denial letters. All of the ICDBG-IT Grants have been issued that ONAP had funding for, but our HQ Grants Management

Office hopes that with the demonstration of overwhelming requests, that Congress might see the need to fund more such grants as over \$200 million was applied for but only \$100 million was available.

FY 2020 IHBG Competitive NOFA Published. Additional funding was recently announced on August 20, 2020 with the publication of the NOFA for the FY 2020 round of IHBG Competitive Grants with an application date of December 18, 2020. This lead time is deemed necessary to give Grantees sufficient time to gather data in a COVID-19 environment when it is difficult to convene meetings and staff to plan projects. It may be the right time for those grantees who have not been funded in recent years as previously successful grantees in the last round may not be applying because they must complete the grants they have on the books. Always remember your Grants Management Specialist is there to assist you with questions about how to prepare your Competitive application by offering a training to all potential applicants.

The Regional Administrator for Region V, Joseph Galvan made a special effort to highlight one of the grants to the Grand Traverse Band of Chippewa and Odawa Indians in late August. He has been very supportive of our EWONAP efforts in the upper Midwest but had to do this appearance remotely due to the distance and difficulty of getting everyone together. Usually at this time of year as we approach the end of the Federal fiscal year, ONAP would like to preview the budget for the coming year. However, Congress is largely in recess in August, it being an election year, and no details of a budget have been discussed publicly, which means that it is likely there will be a Continuing Resolution proposed to fund operations until after the election the first Tuesday in November 3^{rd} .

This office would also like to commend several of our grantees as they approach the completion of some long awaited projects: Mashpee Wampanoag is completing seven new tax credit homes this month, the Lumbee Tribe of North Carolina is well on its way to completing 24 homes as part of its Dreamcatcher project and Pokagon Potawatomi is also completing infrastructure capacity in Hartford, Michigan which includes roads and utilities for future homes.

Dear Tribal Leader Letter- Announcing the FY20 Indian Housing Block Grant Competitive Grant Program NOFA

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) published the FY20 Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) for the Indian Housing Block Grant (IHBG) - Competitive Grant Program earlier today. It announced the availability of approximately \$91 million in competitive grants to eligible Indian tribes and tribally designated housing entities (TDHEs). This program provides competitive grant funding to Tribes and TDHEs to carry out affordable housing activities for the benefit of low-income Native American families. In accordance with the FY20 Further Consolidated Appropriations Act, projects that will spur housing construction and rehabilitation will be prioritized. HUD recognizes the many challenges faced by Tribes and TDHEs during the ongoing COVID-19 National Emergency. Accordingly, this year, HUD is providing a longer application period than the application period in last year's competition to allow applicants additional time to develop and submit applications. Therefore, applicants will have until **11:59:59 EST on December 10, 2020**, to submit applications via <u>https://www.grants.gov</u>. Apply <u>Here</u> **Continue reading**.

PIH Announces Fiscal Year 2020 Resident Opportunity & Self-Sufficiency (ROSS) Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA)

The ROSS grant program is designed to assist residents of Public and Indian Housing make progress towards economic and housing self-sufficiency by removing the educational, professional and health barriers they face. To help residents make progress towards self-sufficiency, HUD provides ROSS grant funding to eligible applicants to hire a Service Coordinator who assesses the needs of Public and Indian housing residents and links them to training and supportive services that will enable participants to move along the self-sufficiency continuum. In the case of elderly/disabled residents, the Service Coordinator links them to supportive services which enable them to age/remain in place. Eligible Applicants are:

- Public Housing Authorities
- Tribes/Tribally Designated Housing Entities
- Non-Profit Organizations
- Resident Associations

The Section 184 Indian Home Loan Guarantee Program is a home mortgage specifically



designed for American Indian and Alaska Native families, Alaska Villages, Tribes, or Tribally Designated Housing Entities. Section 184 loans can be used both on and off native lands for new construction, rehab, the purchase of an existing home, or for refinancing.

Section 184 is synonymous with home ownership in Indian Country. As of March 2016, the Section 184 program has guaranteed over 33,728 loans, which represents over \$5.4 billion dollars in guaranteed funds.

Within the Eastern Woodlands region, over 3,938 loans have been made

bringing \$565 million in private capital directly to Tribal Members. Tribes and TDHEs can also use Section 184 loans to achieve their housing development goals. Some benefits include:

- Low residential mortgage interest rates
- Lower monthly fees than standard PMI
- One time loan guarantee fee (1.5%)
- May utilize up to 15% of loan funds for site infrastructure costs
- Low down payment
- No household income restrictions
- Buy, Rehab, Refi or Build

HUD ONAP Title VI Loan Guarantee Program- Title

VI loans enable Indian Housing Block Grant recipients to leverage up to 5 times their IHBG 'Need' funding to finance affordable housing development by pledging future IHBG grant funds as security for repayment of the loan. A private lender provides the financing and HUD provides the guarantee to the lender. To visit the Title VI website, click here. ONAP's Office of Loan Guarantee has advised that Title VI loans are limited this fiscal year, so the first funded loans will go to applicants whose loan package is the most complete first.
