- ❖ The **Administration for Native Americans (ANA)** was created in 1974 with the enactment of the **Native American Programs Act (NAPA)**.

- ❖ **ANA supports tribal self-sufficiency by providing:**
 - Grant funding, and training and technical assistance to Native American tribal governments, Native Hawaiians, and to Native Pacific Islanders in Guam, American Samoa, and the Northern Mariana Islands.

- ❖ **ANA Funding Program Areas:**
 - Social and Economic Development Strategies (SEDS)
 - SEDS for Alaska (SEDS-AK)
 - Native Language Preservation and Maintenance (P&M)
 - Native Language Preservation and Maintenance – Esther Martinez Immersion (EMI)
 - Environmental Regulatory Enhancement (ERE)
 - American Rescue Plan (ARP) Emergency Funding for Native Language Preservation and Maintenance

75 Tribes & Native Organizations Awarded with \$19.9 Million in New FY 2021 Grant Funding

ANA Strategic Goal: Economic Development

□ Strategic Priority:

- Advance **economic opportunity, economic mobility, and quality of life** for Native American communities through interagency collaboration

□ Ongoing Efforts:

- ANA participates in the multi-agency White House Council on Native American Affairs (WHCNA) Committee on Economic Development, Energy and Infrastructure
- Initial meetings with U.S. Treasury and BIA to collaborate on economic development efforts

Economic Development Priority Areas for Grant Funding

Prioritizing financial assistance for ANA projects that seek to develop:

1. **Tribal code or courts system** for purposes of economic development, including commercial codes, training for court personnel, and the development of nonprofit subsidiaries or other tribal business structures;
2. **Native community development financial institution (CDFI)**, including training and administrative expenses;
3. **Tribal master plan** for community and economic development and infrastructure.
