ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEWS: 24 CFR § 58 – Acronym Library

- **RE:** Responsible Entity
- **ER:** Environmental Review
- **ERR:** Environmental Review Record

CENST: Categorically excluded, not subject to 58.5

- **CEST:** Categorically excluded, subject to 58.5
- **EA:** Environmental Assessment
- **RROF:** Request for Release of Funds
- HEROS: HUD's online system to complete ERRs

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEWS: 24 CFR § 58 – KEY TERMS / ONAP POC

- Office of Native American Programs Points of Contact in ONAP Area Office
 - Grants Management Specialist (GMS) and Grants Evaluation Specialist (GES)
- GMS & GES provide guidance on:
 - HUD rules and regulations
 - Contact with other agencies
 - Forms and documentation required by HUD

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEWS: WHY DO WE DO THEM?

National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (NEPA):

- Promote efforts that would prevent or eliminate damage to the environment and biosphere
- Formal process of review that examines the potentially negative or beneficial effects that result from an activity

Goals of an ER:

- Consider environmental consequences of actions
- Provide the public and government entities opportunity for input on findings
- Protect residents, neighborhoods, communities, land, air, and water

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEWS: WHO DOES WHAT?


- ICDBG Tribes assume Federal environmental decision-making (24 CFR § 58) (<u>https://www.ecfr.gov/current/title-24/subtitle-</u> <u>A/part-58</u>)
- Tribe assumes responsibility for compliance with NEPA and all related laws and authorities (24 CFR § 58.5/ § 58.6)
- Tribe is Responsible Entity (RE) TDHE/CBDO/Tribal Entity may be the grant recipient, but <u>only the</u> <u>Tribe can be the RE</u>

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEWS

- What requires an Environmental Review?
 <u>EVERY</u> HUD-funded activity requires an ERR
- What does an Environmental Review include?
 - HUD checklist and supporting compliance documentation
 - Every compliance analysis needs supporting documentation
 - Recommend using HEROS to complete the review or HEROS Partner Worksheets (discussed in later slides)

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEWS: OVERVIEW

Step 1: Develop a Meaningful Project Description



Step 2: Determine the Level of Review



Step 3: Conduct Review for Compliance with Laws, Authorities, and EA Analysis



Step 4: Finalize Review

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW: STEP ONE – PROJECT DESCRIPTION

- Basis for determining the level of Environmental Review
- Include the funding source, estimated budget, timeline, and a detailed description of the activities/work
- Include non-HUD funded activities that are part of the project

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW: STEP TWO – LEVEL OF REVIEW

"Exempt" <u>24 CFR § 58.34</u> and "Categorically Excluded <u>NOT</u> subject to 58.5" (CENST) <u>24 CFR § 58.35(b)</u>:

- Non-physical activities: development of plans and strategies, architecture + engineering, administrative, tenant based rental assistance, supporting services, operating costs
- ✓ Maintenance (very limited activities see <u>CPD Notice</u> <u>16-02</u>)

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW: STEP TWO – LEVEL OF REVIEW (cont.)

"Categorically Excluded subject to 58.5" (24 CFR § 58.35(a))

- Rehabilitation of existing buildings and infrastructure that meet specific criteria
- Acquisition of existing buildings for same use
- Demolition and/or new construction of single-family houses that meet specific criteria ("individual action")

"Environmental Assessment"

 Generally, new construction and all activities that are not exempt or categorically excluded

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW: STEP TWO – LEVEL OF REVIEW (cont.)

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ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEWS: STEP THREE – HUD CONDUCTS PART 50 ANALYSIS

Use HUD's <u>Programmatic Part 50 – PIH</u> <u>Notice 2024-24</u> to document compliance for:

- Soft costs (including administration, operations, maintenance, and planning)
- Tenant-based rental assistance (rarely permissible using ICDBG funds)
- Public & support services
- Certain activities to assist homebuyers

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEWS: STEP THREE -TRIBE CONDUCTS PART 58 ANALYSIS

- Use HUD recommended format:
 - ✓ <u>Exempt/CENST</u> (not needed if relying on HUD's Programmatic Part 50 to document compliance)
 - ✓ <u>CEST</u>
 - <u>Environmental Assessment</u>
- Recommend using HEROS or using HEROS Partner Worksheets for each law/authority - you answer questions about activity, HEROS identifies what laws apply & how to analyze them
 - Information on HEROS: access, training, how to videos
 - ✓ <u>HEROS Worksheets</u>

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEWS: STEP FOUR – FINALIZE REVIEW

- Exempt/CENST or CEST and converts to exempt When you have completed your review, notify your GMS via email
- Your GMS will then remove the LOCCS edit so you can begin making drawdowns
- CEST that does not convert to exempt; or Environmental Assessment
 - Public notification
 - Send Request for Release of Funds to HUD (7015.15) (<u>https://www.hud.gov/sites/dfiles/OCHCO/documents/701</u> <u>5.15.pdf</u>); and
 - Receive Authority to Use Grant Funds from HUD (7015.16)

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEWS: STEP FOUR – FINALIZE REVIEW Public Comment Period

Finding of No Significant Impact (FONSI) – EAs	15 days when published, or if no publication, 18 days when mailing and posting
Notice of Intent to Request Release of Funds (NOI-RROF) – EAs and CESTs that do not covert	7 days when published, or if no publication, 10 days when mailing and posting <u>NOI-RROF publication template</u>
Concurrent or combined notices – commonly used for EAs	15 days when published, or if no publication, 18 days when mailing and posting <u>Combined FONSI and RROF publication</u> <u>template</u>

Send the draft notice to your AONAP for review **prior to publication**. Be sure to include enough time for the public to comment! If you are even one day short, you will need to republish.

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEWS: STEP FOUR – FINALIZE REVIEW (cont.)

- Next, complete the Request for Release of Funds (RROF) HUD Form 7015.15 (https://www.hud.gov/sites/documents/DOC_11812.pdf)
- Send RROF package to HUD with:
 - ✓ RROF
 - Statement no comments were received, or copy of comments and resolution
 - Affidavit of publication, or photograph of posting
 - Copy of the notice
 - Copy of mailing list or distribution list (do not forget to send to regional EPA)
- HUD will then adhere to 15-day objection period, and send you an Authority to Use Grant Funds (AUGF)

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEWS: FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS #1

How do I avoid a regulatory or statutory violation of spending non-HUD or HUD funding on a project before the Environmental Review is complete?

- Generally, **stop all actions on project** until the Environmental Review is complete
- After you apply for ICDBG funds, you must not use HUD or non-HUD funds until you receive either an Authority to Use Grant Funds (7015.16) (for CEST/EA projects) or determine the project is Exempt/CENST
- Note: You may continue to use any non-HUD funds that were committed under a contract that was executed before you applied for HUD funds

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEWS: FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS #2

Can I use an ASTM Phase I Environmental Site Assessment for a HUD ER?

- No, an ASTM Phase I Environmental Site Assessment is not equivalent to a HUD ER
- You must complete the HUD-formatted checklist
- Contractors will sometimes assume they can complete an ASTM Phase I for HUD's ER requirements, but this is NOT the case
- An ASTM Phase I Environmental Site Assessment analyzes contamination, does not address or analyze the other laws and authorities

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEWS: WHAT IS HEROS?



HUD Environmental Review Online System (HEROS):

- Is an enterprise system that can be used to complete Environmental Reviews for all HUD programs (Part 50 & Part 58)
- Replaced HUD's current paper-based process in 2014
- Walks users through the entire Environmental Review process, including compliance with related laws and authorities

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEWS: BENEFITS OF USING HEROS



HEROS makes compliance easier



Increases transparency



Simplifies the process, saves time, and saves paper



Keeps the environmental review records

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEWS: WHO USES HEROS?

- HEROS allows the Environmental Review procedures users already have in place now to be performed online
- Grantees DO NOT need to change their process
- HEROS can now be used by everyone involved in the Environmental Review process including:
 - HUD Staff
 - Responsible Entities (local, state, and Tribal governments)
 - Partners (consultants, PHAs, TDHEs, lenders, nonprofits, and non-RE recipients)

HEROS IS <u>STRONGLY RECOMMENDED</u> BUT IS NOT MANDATORY

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEWS: ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF TRIBES AND TDHES

Tribe – Responsible Entity

- Complete analysis and documentation
- Make findings and determinations
- Submit Request for Release of Funds

TDHE/Consultants- Partner

- Complete analysis and documentation
- Cannot complete findings and determinations

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEWS: HOW DO TRIBES AND TDHEs/CONSULTANTS REQUEST HEROS ACCESS?

Tribes

- Requests are submitted through the <u>HEROS Access Form</u>
- Users are linked with a Tribe
- Tribal Users can request specific privileges utilizing the HEROS
 Access form including administrative and certification

Partner Users (including TDHEs and Consultants)

- Requests are submitted through the <u>HEROS Access Form</u>
- Users are linked with a Partner Organization which is linked with one or more Tribes, HUD, or Both
- Partner Users can request accounts for their organization and must link their accounts to a Tribe


