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## ANNOUNCEMENTS

### **New Choice Neighborhoods Planning Grants Announced**

On June 28, 2016, HUD [announced](#) ten new Choice Neighborhoods Planning Grants. These awards will help local leaders kick-start housing and economic development in distressed neighborhoods.

### **Choice Neighborhoods Promising Practice Guide on Neighborhood Safety**

HUD, DOJ and LISC have jointly published a new Promising Practice Guide entitled [Choice Neighborhoods are Safe Neighborhoods: Tackling the Drivers of Crime in the South End of Springfield, MA](#). The Springfield story offers an example of how HUD's Choice Neighborhoods program and DOJ's Byrne Criminal Justice Innovation (BCJI) program can build on each other for better collective outcomes.

### **Promise Zone Designations Announced**

On June 6, 2016, the Obama Administration [announced](#) the nine final Promise Zones designations. The new Promise Zones include communities in: Atlanta, GA; Nashville, TN; Evansville, IN; South Los Angeles, CA; San Diego, CA; Southwest Florida Regional Planning Commission, FL; Spokane Tribe of Indians, WA; Turtle Mountain Band of Chippewa Indians, ND; and Roosevelt Roads, PR. The Promise Zones in Atlanta and Nashville include Choice Neighborhoods.

## FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES

### **Funding for Early Head Start Expansion and Partnerships**

The Administration for Children and Families (ACF) has announced the availability of approximately \$135 million for expanding access to high-quality, comprehensive services to low-income infants and toddlers and their families through Early Head Start-Child Care (EHS-CC) Partnerships, or through the expansion of Early Head Start services. Eligible entities include local governments, housing authorities, certain for-profit organizations, and non-profit organizations, including community-based and faith-based organizations. ACF expects to award approximately 75 grants, ranging from \$750,000 to \$8,000,000 each. ACF's [Grant Application Toolkit](#) contains

several resources for potential applicants, including an archived webinar. Applicants must apply through [grants.gov](https://www.grants.gov) by August 24, 2016.

### **Brownfields Area-Wide Planning Grant**

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has announced the availability of funding for developing an area-wide plan for brownfields assessment, cleanup, and reuse. Funding is for research and/or technical assistance activities directed to one or more brownfield site(s) located in an area, such as a neighborhood, business district, local commercial corridor, or waterfront. EPA anticipates awarding approximately 20 grants of up to \$200,000 each. The announcement, a recorded webinar, and other resources can be viewed [here](#).
